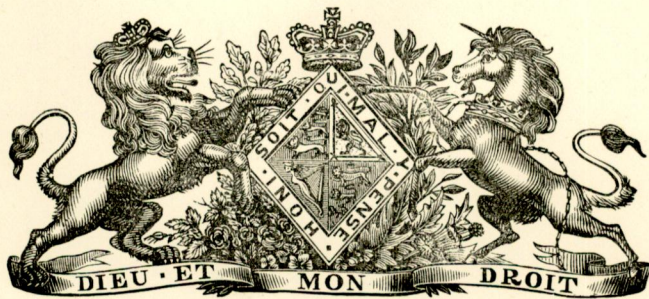

An Act to impose a Tax in respect of Land, of Mortgages on Land, and of Leasehold, and other interests therein.

BE it enacted by the Queen's Most Excellent Majesty, by and with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council and Legislative Assembly of New South Wales in Parliament assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:—

- 5 1. From and after the first day of July, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-five, there shall be annually assessed, levied, and paid under the provisions, and subject to the exemptions enacted in the Assessment Act of 1895, and in the manner therein prescribed, a land tax of one penny in the pound of the unimproved value of all
10 lands, mortgages, and other taxable interests in the said Act specified.

2. This Act may be cited as the "Land Tax Act of 1895." Short title.
