An Act to extend the time for polling at Parliamentary Elections. [Assented to, 8th July, 1898.]


B^E it enacted by the Queen's Most Excellent Majesty, by and with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council and Legislative Assembly of New South Wales in Parliament assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows :—

1. Section seventy-nine of the Parliamentary Electorates and Hours of polling at Elections Act of 1893 (56 Vic. No. 38) is hereby repealed, and in lieu parliamentary thereof it is enacted that every polling shall commence on the day appointed for the same at eight o'clock in the forenoon, and shall, unless lawfully adjourned, finally close at six o'clock in the afternoon of the same day.

2. This Act may be cited as the "Parliamentary Elections short title. (Polling) Act, 1898."


2. This Act may be cited as the "Parliamentary Elections short title. (Polling) Act, 1898."
