## A BILL

To limit the tenure of office of Fellows of the Senate of the University of Sydney; and to regulate the method of voting at elections of such Fellows; and for other purposes connected therewith.

[DR. CULLEN ;-8 July, 1896.]

B<sup>E</sup> it enacted by the Queen's Most Excellent Majesty, by and with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council and Legislative Assembly of New South Wales in Parliament assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows :-

1. This Act shall come into operation on the first day of Commencement and 5 January, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-seven. In this Act interpretation. the word "Fellow" means Fellow of the Senate of the University of Sydney, and does not include those Professors who are ex-officio members of the said Senate.

2. No person elected after the commencement of this Act to be Tenure of office of a Fellow shall hold office for a longer time than five years from the Fellow. date of his election.

3. The persons who are Fellows at the commencement of this Retirement of present Act shall retire from office in the manner following, that is to say :- Fellows. 15

(a) Four of such Fellows shall cease to hold office on the first day of March, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-seven, and three on the first day of March in each succeeding year, until all such Fellows shall have retired from office.

(b) The Fellows who are to retire in any year shall be those who have then been longest in office.

- (c) Where two such Fellows shall have held office for the same length of time, it shall, if necessary, be determined by lot at a meeting of the Senate which of the two shall retire.
- (d) The retirement of Fellows as aforesaid shall take effect notwithstanding, and in addition to, any determination of office 5 occurring from time to time through death or any other cause.
- (e) If, at any period hereinbefore prescribed for the retirement of such Fellows, there shall only be a smaller number than that prescribed, who have not previously ceased to hold office, the 10 provisions of subsection (a) shall be deemed to apply to such smaller number.

4. Every person who shall have held office as Fellow shall be eligible for re-election.

5. At every contested election of Fellows, every person entitled 15 to vote shall vote by letter (and not otherwise) in accordance with such by-laws as may be made and approved in the manner prescribed by the Act of Council, fourteenth Victoria number thirty-one.

6. Every person who votes at any election of Fellows shall vote for the full number of persons to be elected at such election; and 20 every voting paper which is not in accordance with the provisions of this section shall be rejected.

7. This Act may be cited as the "University Senate Elections Act of 1896."
