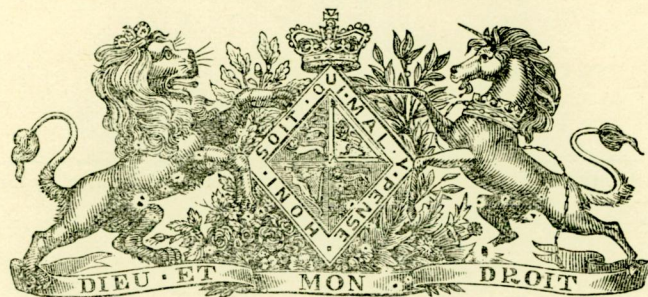

Act No. 80, 1900.

An Act to enable banks and branch banks to be closed on certain afternoons ; to provide that such afternoons shall not be banking or business hours for the purpose of any business at such banks and branches ; and to amend the Bills of Exchange Act, 1887. [Assented to, 11th December, 1900.]

BE it enacted by the Queen's Most Excellent Majesty, by and with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council and Legislative Assembly of New South Wales in Parliament assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows :—

1. This Act may be cited as the "Banks Half-holiday Act, Short title 1900."

2. (1) Any bank, on obtaining the permission in writing of the Colonial Treasurer, and on giving the public notice hereinafter mentioned, may close the bank, or any branch of the bank, to business on any day after noon. Public notice of such closing shall be given by

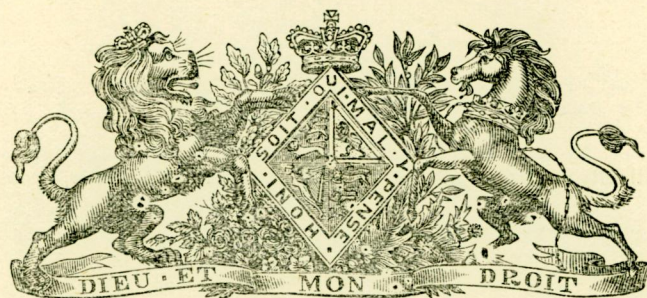
Effect of such closing.

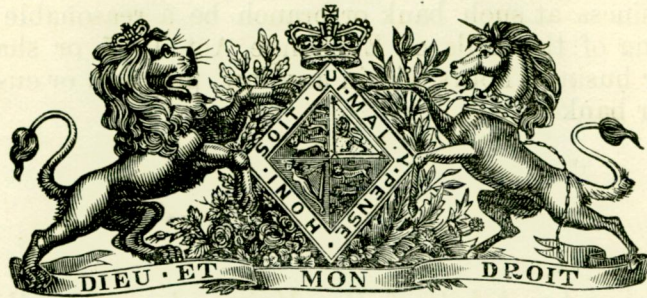

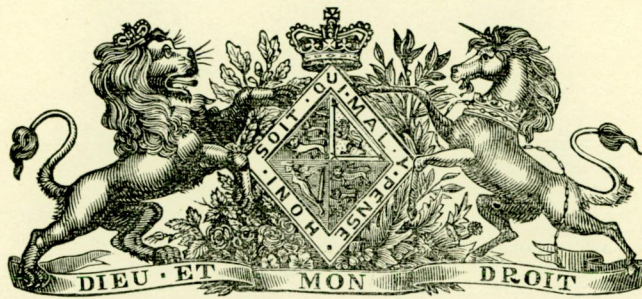
