After the commencement of this Act it shall not be lawful to distrain any sewing-machine, type-writing machine, piano, or mangle, or household furniture (including bedding) up to the value of twenty pounds the property of or under hire to any female person for any rent claimed in respect of the premises or place in which such sewing-machine, type-writing machine, or mangle may be: Provided that any one such person shall not be entitled to have more than one sewing-machine, one type-writing machine, or one mangle protected from distress under the provisions of this Act.

Sewing-machines, type-writing machines, pianos, and mangles exempt from distress in certain cases.

2. This Act may be cited as the "Distress for Rent Restriction Act, 1898."

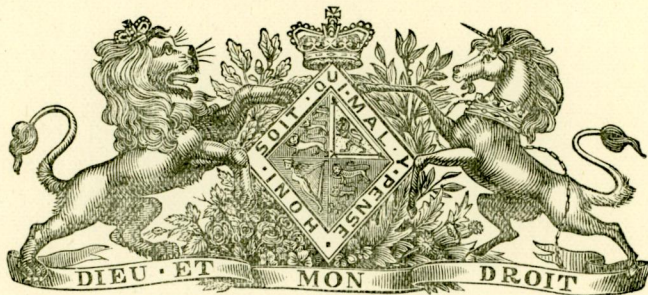

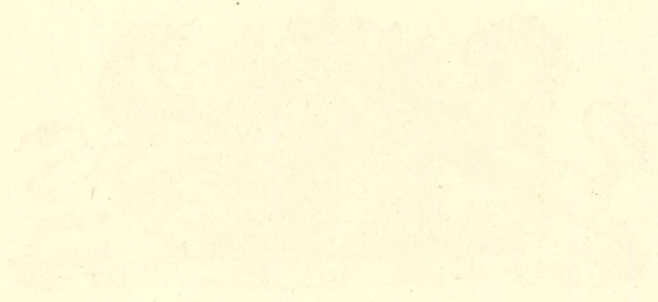

A BILL

To amend the law relating to Districts for Women

[Dr. Ganes;—24 March, 1952]

WHEREAS many women in poor circumstances are enabled to earn money for the support of themselves or their families by the use of sewing-machines or handlooms, but are unable to have the same secured and sold to their own satisfaction; and whereas it is expedient to protect such articles from distress for rent in the event of default of the tenants thereof; and whereas the Government of Madhya Pradesh, by and with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council and Legislative Assembly of New South Wales in Parliament assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:—

1. After the commencement of this Act it shall not be lawful to distress any sewing-machine or handloom the property of or under the control of any person for any rent claimed in respect of the premises on which such sewing-machine or handloom may be used; provided that any person shall not be entitled to have more than one sewing-machine or handloom attached to any premises under the provisions of this Act.
2. This Act may be cited as the "Districts for Women Act, 1952".
