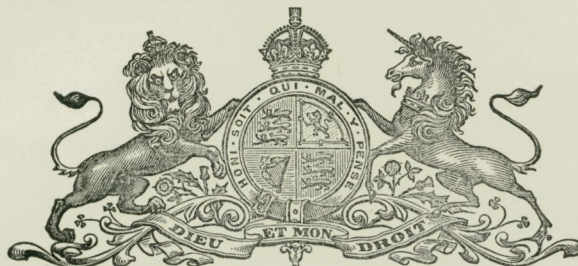

### Act No. 50, 1902.

An Act to consolidate the enactments relating to the closing of butchers' shops on Sundays. [Assented to, 26th August, 1902.]

**B**E it enacted by the King's Most Excellent Majesty, by and with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council and Legislative Assembly of New South Wales in Parliament assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:—

1. This Act may be cited as the "Butchers' Shops Sunday Closing Act, 1902."

2. The Act forty-seventh Victoria number eight is hereby repealed.

3. (1) No person within the metropolitan police district exercising, or employed in the trade or calling of, or acting with the privity or consent of a butcher, shall keep open, or allow to be kept open, his shop or premises for the sale of meat, or sell or expose for sale any meat, at such shop or premises between the hours of twelve on Saturday night and twelve on Sunday night.

Butchers' shops within metropolitan police district not to be open on Sunday. 47 Vic. No. 8, s. 1.

(2) Any person offending against this Act shall, on conviction of any such offence before the nearest court of petty sessions within seven days from the commission thereof, be liable to a penalty not exceeding three pounds, nor less than twenty shillings.

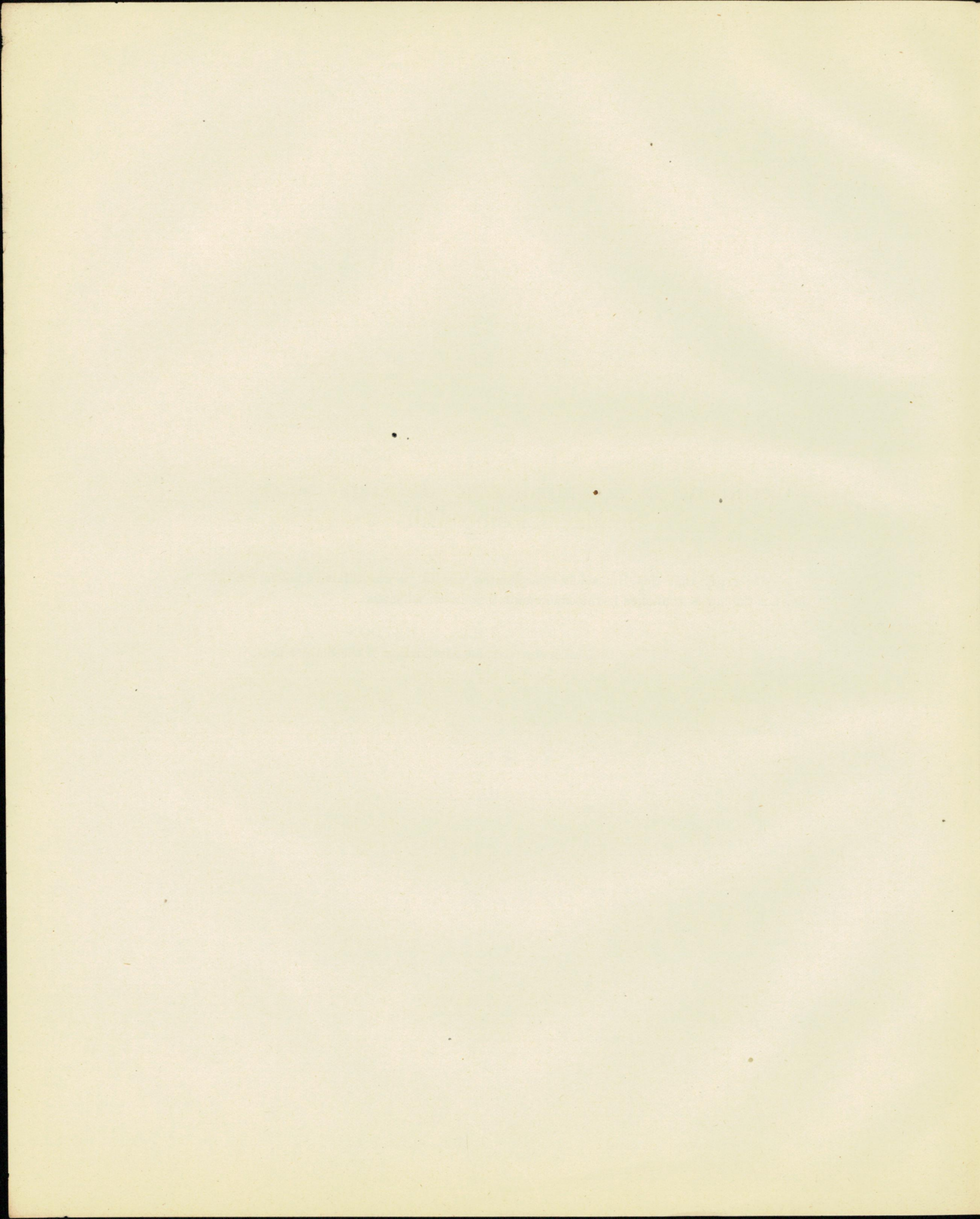

Act No. 1902

An Act to consolidate the enactments relating to the closing of shops on Sundays.

Enacted by the King's Most Excellent Majesty, by and with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council and Legislative Assembly of the Straits Settlements in Parliament assembled, and by the authority of the same as follows:-

1. This Act may be cited as the "Sundays Shopping Act, 1902."

2. The Act forty-seventh Victoria number eight is hereby repealed.

3. (1) No person within the metropolitan police district who is employed in the trade or calling of or acting with the view of or in connection with the carrying on of a business, or who is employed in the trade or calling of or acting with the view of or in connection with the carrying on of a business, shall keep open, or allow to be kept open, his shop or premises for the sale of goods, or for any other purpose, at such shop or premises between the hours of twelve on Sunday night and twelve on Sunday night.

(2) Any person offending against this Act shall, on conviction for any such offence before the expiration of twelve months after the date from the commission thereof, be liable to a penalty not exceeding three pounds, or less than twenty shillings.
