A BILL

To regulate certain proceedings under the Masters and Servants Act, 1902, and appeals from orders under that Act by certain persons under age.

[COLONEL MACKAY ;—22 *July*, 1903.]

BE it enacted by the King's Most Excellent Majesty, by and with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council and Legislative Assembly of New South Wales in Parliament assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows :—

- 5 1. This Act may be cited as the “ Masters and Servants (Amend- Short title.
ment) Act, 1903.”
2. Any complaint under Part III or under section thirteen of ^{Complaint by} Part IV of the Masters and Servants Act, 1902, by a servant who is ^{servant under full} under the age of twenty-one years may be made, heard, and determined, ^{age.} and any proceedings thereon may be taken, and any order thereon may
10 be made and enforced, as if such servant were of the full age of twenty-one years.
3. When a servant who is under the age of twenty-one years ^{Appeal from order.} has a right of appeal against an order made under the Masters and
15 Servants Act, 1902, such servant may exercise such right in the same manner as if he were of the full age of twenty-one years.
