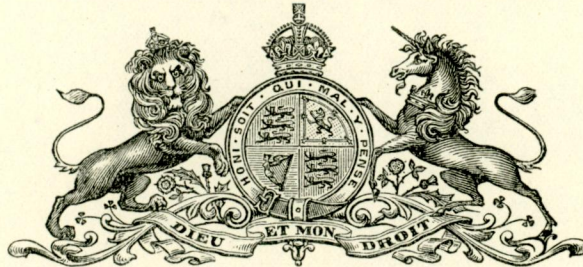

Act No. 110, 1902.

An Act to provide for the removal of night-soil, and to amend the Police Offences Act, 1901. [Assented to, 24th December, 1902.]

BE it enacted by the King's Most Excellent Majesty, by and with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council and Legislative Assembly of New South Wales in Parliament assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:—

1. This Act may be cited as the "Public Health (Night-soil Removal) Act, 1902." Short title.

In any by-laws made by the council of any municipality under the Nuisances Prevention Act, 1897, and in any regulations made by the Health Board under subsection (2) of section seventy-one of the Public Health Act, 1902, for the removal of night-soil in air-tight receptacles, the Council or the Board, as the case may be, may authorise such removal at any time by day or night mentioned in the by-laws or regulations; and while such by-laws or regulations are in force the operation of the provisions of the first paragraph of section ninety, and the first paragraph of section ninety-one of the Police Offences Act, 1901, shall, as to any removal of night-soil in accordance with such by-laws or regulations, be suspended: Provided that the air-tight receptacles so used are of a pattern or description approved by the Board of Health. 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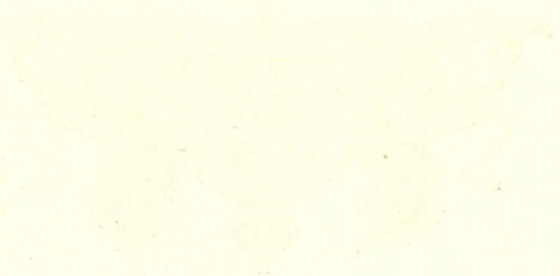

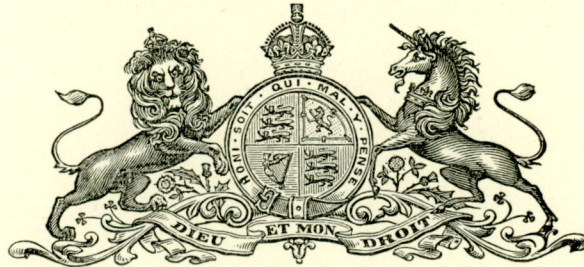

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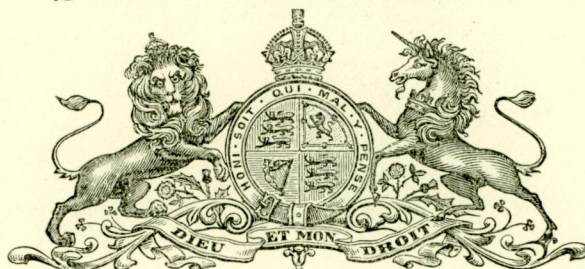
