ARTICLE

OF THE CONSTITUTION OF THE STATE OF NEW YORK

CHAPTER 1

SECTION 1

1. The executive power shall be vested in the Governor of this State.

2. The Governor shall hold his office for a term of four years, and shall be eligible for re-election to the same office.

3. The Governor shall have the honor and respect due his office.

4. The Governor shall be commander-in-chief of the land and naval forces of this State.

5. The Governor shall have the power to pardon and commute sentences in all cases, except in cases of impeachment.

6. The Governor shall have the power to grant reprieves and commutations of sentence, and to suspend the execution of sentences, in all cases, except in cases of impeachment.
