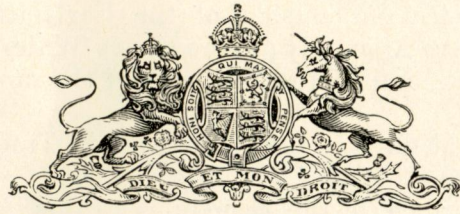

An Act to vest certain lands at Broken Hill in trustees on trust for the purposes of and in connection with a trades hall; to amend the Broken Hill Trades Hall Site Act of 1898; and for purposes incidental thereto.

WHEREAS by the Broken Hill Trades Hall Site Act of 1898 certain land described in the Schedule to that Act was vested in trustees on certain conditions for the erection of a trades hall: And whereas on the second day of August, one thousand nine hundred and five, the Governor, by notice in the Gazette, dedicated the land described in the First Schedule

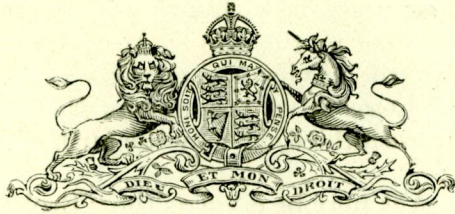
