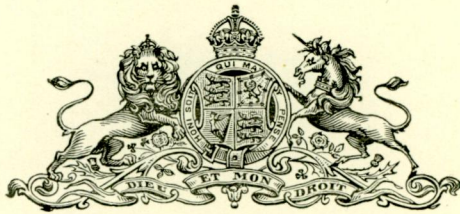

An Act to vest in His Majesty certain land, being the site for the Newcastle Trades Hall ; to amend the Act 56 Vic. No. 35, and to repeal the Act No. 27, 1905 ; and for other purposes. [Assented to, 11th December, 1914.]

**B**E it enacted by the King's Most Excellent Majesty, by and with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council and Legislative Assembly of New South Wales in Parliament assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows :—

**1.** This Act may be cited as the " Newcastle Trades Hall Site Vesting Act, 1914." Short title.

**2.** (1) The land described in Schedule B to the Act 56 Vic. No. 35 is hereby vested in His Majesty, free from any estate, right, title, interest, trust or condition, statutory or otherwise, in or affecting the same, and is hereby declared to be Crown lands within the meaning and for the purposes of the Crown Lands Consolidation Act, 1913. Lands in Schedule B to 56 Vic. No. 35 vested in His Majesty.

(2) So much of the Act 56 Vic. No. 35 as relates to the land described in Schedule B to that Act, and the whole of the Act No. 27, 1905, are hereby repealed.
