An Act to amend the law with respect to Sunday trading in certain shops; and for that purpose to amend certain Acts. [Assented to, 19th April, 1916.]

B^E it enacted by the King's Most Excellent Majesty, by and with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council and Legislative Assembly of New South Wales in Parliament assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows :—

1. This Act may be cited as the "Sunday Trading Short title (Refreshment Rooms) Act, 1916." It shall commence and commencement. and take effect on and from the first day of July, one thousand nine hundred and sixteen. 2.

I have examined this Bill, and find it to correspond in all respects with the Bill as finally passed by both Houses.

6. Any person who on any Sunday-

- (a) at any time other than within the hours above prescribed opens, or keeps open to the public for purposes of trade any shop described in Schedule One, or offers for sale, or sells therein any article, commodity, or thing; or
- (b) offers for sale or sells in any such shop within the hours above prescribed any article, commodity, or thing not authorised by this Act to be sold; or
- (c) offers for sale or sells in any such shop any article, commodity, or thing named in Part I of Schedule Two for consumption otherwise than on the premises of the vendor; or
- (d) employs in any shop any person under sixteen years of age,

shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding five pounds, or in default to be imprisoned for a period not exceeding one month.

7. No restaurant or dining-room keeper shall be customer guilty of the said offence by reason only that within one waiting to be served. half-hour after the said closing time goods have been offered or sold to a customer who at the said closing time was in the said restaurant or dining-room being served or waiting to be served.

8. On payment of the prescribed fee licenses called Applications "Sunday Trading Licenses" may be granted under this for licenses. Act in the prescribed form to the occupier of any shop described in Schedule One hereto. Applications for such licenses shall be made to the court of petty sessions in the police district within which the shop in respect of which the application is made is situated.

9. Penalties under this Act may be imposed by a Recovery of stipendiary or police magistrate, or by any two justices penalties. of the peace in petty sessions.

10. (1) It shall be lawful for the Governor from Regulations. time to time to frame regulations not being inconsistent with the provisions of this Act for any of the following purposes, namely :---

(a) For prescribing the forms of applications, licenses, and other documents not provided for by the Schedules to this Act, and for correcting or varying any such form when necessary.

- (b) For prescribing the fees to be paid for licenses granted under this Act, and the person or persons to whom such fees shall be paid and for the due accounting therefor.
- (c) And generally for the purpose of giving effect to the provisions of this Act.
 - (2) Such regulations shall—
- (a) be published in the Gazette;
- (b) take effect from the date of publication or from a later date to be specified in such regulations; and
- (c) be laid before both Houses of Parliament within fourteen days after publication if Parliament is in session; and if not, then within fourteen days after the commencement of the next session.

If either House of Parliament passes a resolution at any time within fifteen sitting days after such regulations have been laid before such House disallowing any regulation, such regulation shall thereupon cease to have effect.
