CLAIM OF MR. T. D. RICHARDS.

(PETITION FROM WILLIAM JOHN MORRIS, REGARDING CLAIM OF MR. T. D. RICHARDS FOR COMPENSATION FOR SERVICES RENDERED THE RAILWAY COMMISSIONERS IN CONNECTION WITH THE SAVING OF OIL, AND PRAYING FOR LEAVE TO APPEAR BEFORE SELECT COMMITTEE ON, BY SOLICITOR OR COUNSEL, WITH THE RIGHT TO CALL, EXAMINE, AND CROSS-EXAMINE WITNESSES.)

To the Honorable the Speaker and Members of the Legislative Assembly of New South Wales in Parliament Assembled.

The humble Petition of William John Morris, on behalf of the Railway Commissioners of New South Wales—

RESPECTFULLY SHOWETH,—

1. That on the eleventh day of November, 1920, it was resolved that a Select Committee be appointed to inquire into and report upon the claim of Mr. T. D. Richards for compensation for services rendered in connection with the construction and supervision of a machine for the purpose of saving oil used in connection with the working of the New South Wales Government Railways.

2. That your Petitioner is desirous of being represented before such Select Committee.

3. Your Petitioner therefore humbly prays that your Honorable House will be pleased to grant him permission to appear before the said Select Committee in person, by Solicitor, or Counsel, or by an Officer of the Railway Department, to adduce such evidence, and send for such persons and papers, as your Petitioner may be advised, together with power to examine and cross-examine witnesses called before the said Committee.
