\*1393 SOBERING UP CENTRES—Ms Jodi McKay asked the Deputy Premier, Minister for Justice and Police, Minister for the Arts, and Minister for Racing—

- (1) How many people have been held in the Government's sobering up centres between 1 July 2014 and 30 June 2015?
- (2) How much did it cost the Government to run the sobering up centres over the period from 1 July 2014 to 30 June 2015?
- (3) How many of these people were forced to re-pay the Government for their placement in these centres?

Answer—

Individuals can be held in the Sydney City sobering up centre from 9am until 6pm on Friday and Saturday nights.

Cost incurred by the NSW Police Force are met within the existing budget.

Cost recovery orders are managed by the State Debt Recovery Office.

\*1394 BILLBOARDS—Ms Jodi McKay asked the Minister for Transport and Infrastructure representing the Minister for Roads, Maritime and Freight, and Vice-President of the Executive Council—

- (1) How many billboards are located on Roads and Maritime Services (RMS) property as of 1 September 2015?
- (2) How many billboards were located on RMS property as of 1 September 2010?
- (3) What was the total revenue to RMS from billboards in each of the 2010-11 and the 2014-15 financial years?

Answer—

- (1) There are 138 billboard sites on Roads and Maritime Services property. Since 2009 Roads and Maritime has included a requirement in new contracts that billboards display a road safety message for a portion of each year.

- (2) Refer to my previous answer LA 4115.

- (3) Information regarding advertising revenue is available in the Roads and Maritime Services' annual report.

\*1395 TOLL AVOIDANCE PERCENTAGE—Ms Jodi McKay asked the Minister for Transport and Infrastructure representing the Minister for Roads, Maritime and Freight, and Vice-President of the Executive Council—

- (1) Has the Government completed any analysis on the possible toll avoidance percentage for the M4 extension?
  - (a) If so, what is the expected toll avoidance percentage for the M4 once the first stage of Westconnex is complete?

Answer—

The delivery of the M4 East will free up significant capacity for motorists who continue to use Parramatta Road.

The M4 East Environmental Impact Statement shows in 2021 traffic volumes on sections of Parramatta Road are expected to be cut by up to 53 per cent as a result of WestConnex, compared to a do nothing scenario.

\*1399 FOXGROUND TO BERRY BYPASS—Ms Anna Watson asked the Minister for Transport and Infrastructure representing the Minister for Roads, Maritime and Freight, and Vice-President of the Executive Council—

- (1) From where were the steel girders used as framework for the Foxground to Berry Bypass procured?
- (2) What is the name of the company which supplied these girders?
- (3) In which country is the company located?

Answer—

I am advised:

Procurement of goods and services is undertaken in line with the Government procurement guidelines. Australian-based companies are given every opportunity to tender for Government contracts through a fair and transparent process.

Roads and Maritime Services has processes in place to encourage competitive tendering to get the best value for money for the people of New South Wales.

The use of Australian products is a commercial decision made by companies delivering major road projects on behalf of Roads and Maritime Services. Roads and Maritime encourages its suppliers to source materials locally where possible.

Australian steel has been used for the majority of the Foxground and Berry bypass and the Gerringong upgrade, including steel produced by BlueScope.

\*1400 GERRINGONG UPGRADE—Ms Anna Watson asked the Minister for Transport and Infrastructure representing the Minister for Roads, Maritime and Freight, and Vice-President of the Executive Council—

- (1) From where were the steel girders used as framework for the Gerringong upgrade procured?
- (2) What is the name of the company which supplied these girders?
- (3) In which country is the company located?

Answer—

I am advised:

Procurement of goods and services is undertaken in line with the Government procurement guidelines. Australian-based companies are given every opportunity to tender for Government contracts through a fair and transparent process.

Roads and Maritime Services has processes in place to encourage competitive tendering to get the best value for money for the people of New South Wales.

The use of Australian products is a commercial decision made by companies delivering major road projects on behalf of Roads and Maritime Services. Roads and Maritime encourages its suppliers to source materials locally where possible.

\*1401 TOWN HALL RAILWAY STATION PUBLIC TOILETS—Mr Alex Greenwich asked the Minister for Transport and Infrastructure—

- (1) What stakeholder feedback did the Government receive about removing public access from the Town Hall Railway Station public toilets?
- (2) What feedback did disability and incontinence organisations provide?
- (3) What community consultation was carried out on this proposal and what feedback was provided?
- (4) What assessment was carried out about nearby alternative public toilets, and are these options available during the same times?
- (5) What consideration has the Government given to allowing full public access to these toilets?
- (6) What further plans does the Government have to provide full public access to these toilets?

Answer—

(1) to (3) Sydney Trains carried out consultation with key stakeholders including the City of Sydney Council, Guide Dogs NSW, Vision Australia and surrounding retailers. No issues were raised from Guide Dogs NSW, Vision Australia and retail stakeholders within the precinct.

(4) to (6) Town Hall Station is being refurbished to make it more user-friendly and appealing for customers. This \$8 million make-over is the biggest change in 30 years for one of Sydney's busiest stations. The ticket barriers at Town Hall Station have been moved to help improve customer flow. A customer with an Opal card can access the station's toilets at no cost by tapping on to enter and tapping off to exit within 30 minutes.

Other public toilets are available around the station precinct. Station customer service staff can provide details to members of the public if required.

\*1402 COMMUNITY BASED HOUSING—Ms Kate Washington asked the Minister for Family and Community Services, and Minister for Social Housing representing the Minister for Ageing, Minister for Disability Services, and Minister for Multiculturalism—

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Will the Minister or Department of Family and Community Services build community based housing for people living at the Stockton Centre?

Answer—

Yes.

\*1403 RELOCATION OF RESIDENTS FROM THE STOCKTON CENTRE—Ms Kate Washington asked the Minister for Family and Community Services, and Minister for Social Housing representing the Minister for Ageing, Minister for Disability Services, and Minister for Multiculturalism—

(1) When will the business case pertaining to the relocation of residents from the Stockton Centre to community based housing be funded?

(2) Why has this business case not been funded as at 17 September 2015?

Answer—

(1) The Government has allocated a total of \$58 million in the 2014-15 and 2015-16 Budgets to acquire land and construct the first homes for the redevelopment of the Hunter Large Residential Centres.

(2) Refer to Question 1.

\*1404 PRIVATISATION OF THE STOCKTON CENTRE—Ms Kate Washington asked the Minister for Family and Community Services, and Minister for Social Housing representing the Minister for Ageing, Minister for Disability Services, and Minister for Multiculturalism—

Is there a plan to privatise the operations of the Stockton Centre, possibly commencing in 2016?

Answer—

The Government is committed to closing all Large Residential Centres across New South Wales by mid-2018. The redevelopment of the Stockton Centre has been agreed to by both the Government and the former Labor Governments since 1998, and has broad support from carers, disability advocates and experts.

\*1405 TRANSITION FROM STOCKTON CENTRE—Ms Kate Washington asked the Minister for Family and Community Services, and Minister for Social Housing representing the Minister for Ageing, Minister for Disability Services, and Minister for Multiculturalism—

(1) Will the Minister commit to the smooth transition of the people living at the Stockton Centre to community based living?

(2) Will the Stockton Centre continue to operate until the transition to community based living is complete?

Answer—

(1) and (2) Yes.

\*1406 ESSENTIAL ENERGY ELECTRICITY PRICES—Ms Kate Washington asked the Minister for Industry, Resources and Energy—

With reference to the Minister's media release on 30 April 2015, outlining a \$313 saving on a household bill in the Essential Energy Network Distribution Area:

(1) What is the Minister doing to ensure energy providers are reducing household bills by \$313 in the Essential Energy Network Distribution Area?

Answer—

(1) We have appointed the Independent Pricing and Regulatory Tribunal (IPART) as the market monitor, who will report annually on competition in the market. IPART's Retail Market Monitoring Report 2015 (p.44) notes that: "In our view, the reduction in standing offer prices over the past year is broadly consistent with the reductions in the cost of supply due to the removal of the carbon price and lower network prices."

\*1407 NELSON BAY ROAD TRUCK MOVEMENTS—Ms Kate Washington asked the Minister for Transport and Infrastructure representing the Minister for Roads, Maritime and Freight, and Vice-President of the Executive Council—

Given that there was a traffic accident on Nelson Bay Road which caused traffic chaos for two hours on 16 September 2015, will the Minister require his Department to review its submission to the Department of Planning in relation to the application by Mackas Sands to increase truck movements from its sandmine onto Nelson Bay Road by 200 percent?

Answer—

Roads and Maritime Services reviewed the S75W Modification of access to Mackas Sand Project, including a Traffic Impact Assessment, and made a submission to the Department of Planning and Environment. The submission will be considered by that Department and is available on its website.

\*1408 PRIVATE BUSINESSES OPERATING WITHIN NEW SOUTH WALES TRAIN STATIONS—Mr Clayton Barr asked the Minister for Transport and Infrastructure—

Does the Government monitor the business practices of the private businesses operating within New South Wales train stations to ensure they are fair, reasonable and legal?

Answer—

This is a matter for the Minister for Innovation & Better Regulation.

\*1410 KOORAGANG RECYCLED WATER SCHEME—Mr Clayton Barr asked the Minister for Industry, Resources and Energy representing the Minister for Primary Industries, and Minister for Lands and Water—

With reference to the Kooragang Recycled Water Scheme owned by Hunter Water Corporation:

- (1) How much income has this facility generated for Hunter Water Corporation since it was commissioned in November 2014?
- (2) How much did this facility cost Hunter Water Corporation to construct?
- (3) How much is the sale of this facility expected to realise for Hunter Water Corporation?
- (4) What has been the net financial position for Hunter Water Corporation of this facility after costs for Veolia's management fees have been included?

Answer—

- (1) Between December 2014 and 30 June 2015, Kooragang Integrated Water Scheme (KIWS) generated \$2.1 million in revenue.
- (2) The cost of constructing entire KIWS was \$72.0 million however Hunter Water proposes to sell only part of the facility.
- (3) This information is commercial in confidence.
- (4) Since commissioning in December 2014 up until 30 June 2015, the Kooragang Recycled Water Scheme operated at a loss of \$4.38 million. This includes operating costs, depreciation, and significant financing expenses.

\*1412 UNDERGROUND ASSETS—Mr Clayton Barr asked the Minister for Transport and Infrastructure representing the Minister for Roads, Maritime and Freight, and Vice-President of the Executive Council—

What was the financial cost to Roads and Maritime Services (previously the Roads and Traffic Authority) to locate underground assets belonging to gas companies, electricity companies or telecommunication companies that were not registered or were incorrectly registered for location with "Dial Before You Dig" during road construction or road maintenance for each of the financial years from 2011-12 to 2014-15?

Answer—

Contractors engaged by Roads and Maritime Services must locate the utilities shown on the Dial Before You Dig plans on site as a verification process prior to starting excavation. It is the responsibility of contractors to ensure that excavation work is carried out safely and costs of locating and relocating utilities are included in overall project costs.

\*1413 HOUSING NSW PROPERTIES WITH SAME KEYS—Mr Clayton Barr asked the Minister for Family and Community Services, and Minister for Social Housing—

With reference to properties provided to tenants by Housing NSW where the Department has been made aware that multiple properties in a small radius can be accessed by the same door key:

- (1) Will Housing NSW replace all locks so that access is not provided to unauthorised people?
- (2) Will Housing NSW honour claims for stolen property if insurance companies reject these claims?
- (3) Will Housing NSW confirm to NSW Police Force and courts that non-residents may be breaking and entering premises when these premises are accessed with keys?

Answer—

The Department of Family and Community Services (FACS) is not aware of any of its multiple properties

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being accessible by the same door key.

Tenants are responsible for the keys used to access their individual property and copies are not held by the department. Any FACS tenant who has concerns about the security of their home is encouraged to contact the department.

\*1414 SANDSTONE BUILDINGS IN BRIDGE STREET, SYDNEY—Mr Clayton Barr asked the Minister for Finance, Services and Property—

With reference to the recently announced lease of sandstone buildings in Bridge Street, Sydney:

- (1) What Government agencies currently have a presence in these buildings?
- (2) Do any non-Government agencies have a presence in these buildings?
  - (a) If so, which agencies and what rental returns do they provide to the Government?
- (3) How many Government employees are currently located in these buildings?
  - (a) Based on current employee levels, what is the office floor space required for their normal business?
  - (b) Based on the current Sydney CBD office property rental/lease market, what would be the costs of housing this same number and configuration of employees at another site?
- (4) Will the in-house heritage specialist team providing guidance and assistance to the redevelopment of the sandstone buildings come from within the NSW Public Works?
- (5) On average, how much money has been spent on maintenance and upkeep for these sandstone buildings in each of the financial years from 2010-11 to 2014-15?
- (6) On average, how much money is typically spent annually on maintenance and upkeep for a more modern and contemporary building of similar size and scope?

Answer—

- (1) Nos 23 - 33 Bridge Street - Department of Planning and Environment (DPE). Nos 35 - 39 Bridge Street - Department of Education (DoE).
- (2) The buildings are wholly occupied by the DPE and DoE.
- (3) DPE has approximately 470 full time equivalent staff. DoE has approximately 650 full time equivalent staff.
  - (a) This question should be directed to the Minister responsible for those Departments, the Minister for Planning and the Minister for Education.
  - (b) The cost of housing this number of employees at another would depend on a number of factors, including timing of going to market, current market capacity, competing offers for office space and configuration requirements.
- (4) No.
- (5) 23 - 33 Bridge Street  
2013-14 - \$990K  
2014-15 - \$1.03M  
23-33 Bridge Street was vested to GPNSW on 1 July 2013. Financial expenditure prior to this date should be requested from the Minister for Planning. These costs exclude capital expenditure items.
- (6) The average operating costs for a similar contemporary sized building in the Sydney CBD are:  
23 - 33 Bridge Street equivalent to \$851K pa.  
35 - 39 Bridge Street equivalent to \$990 K pa.

Operating costs of heritage buildings are generally higher than modern comparable buildings due to their age and the characteristics of their design and construction.

\*1415 DEPRECIATION RESERVATION FOR STATE OWNED PROPERTIES—Mr Clayton Barr asked the Minister for Finance, Services and Property—

With reference to the sale of state owned properties and assets, through the auspice of Property NSW:

- (1) Does the State/Treasury carry a depreciation reservation or 'sinking fund' for state owned properties?
  - (a) If so, what is the total amount held by the fund as at 30 June 2015?
  - (b) If so, does the sale of state owned properties and assets release or free up funds from this pool of funding?
    - (i) If funds are released from the depreciation pool of funding, or 'sinking fund' as a result of a property asset or sale, what is the total funds that have been released as a result of all property and asset sales by Property NSW from 1 July 2011 to 30 June 2015?

- (2) Are funds from the sale of assets ordinarily channeled into Restart NSW?
- (3) As at 17 September 2015, what exceptions to the ordinary rule of funds going into Restart NSW, have been explored and accepted and what is the total value of these assets where funds have been otherwise diverted?
- (4) Do funds from the sale of property, through Property NSW, that are channeled into Restart NSW, appear on Restart NSW accounts as a form of income, or is there some other term or accounting tool used?

Answer—

- (1) The State/Treasury does not carry a depreciation reservation/reserve or 'sinking fund' for state owned properties. The Treasury has ongoing capital expenditure budget/funding for property refurbishment programs for state owned properties. By decreasing the number of properties held by the State, the sale of state owned properties decreases the funding requirements for property refurbishment programs.
- (2) Effective from 1 July 2015, net sale proceeds of property assets sold by all DFSI related entities are channelled directly into the Restart NSW Fund.
- (3) Voluntary contributions to the Restart NSW Fund under section 7(2) of the Restart NSW Fund Act 2011 have been explored and supported through the Expenditure Review Committee's decision to transfer the net sale proceeds of property assets sold by all DFSI related entities into the Restart NSW Fund from 1 July 2015. The value of the first transfer by Government Property NSW is expected to be approximately \$200 million.
- (4) The channelled funds will appear in the Restart NSW Fund accounts as Cash Receipts

\*1416 TRANSFORMATION OF AUSGRID—Mr Clayton Barr asked the Minister for Industry, Resources and Energy—

With reference to the 3,570 full-time equivalent positions protected during the transformation of Ausgrid:

- (1) What roles and positions will be preserved?
- (2) At what sites, centres or locations will these preserved positions be?
- (3) When will the positions to be preserved, on a site by site basis, be released to the workforce?
- (4) Are the predicted 1100 jobs to be reduced in phase 1 and phase 2 linked to the most recent Australian Energy Regulator determination?
  - (a) If so, how?

Answer—

- (1) Ausgrid is developing a comprehensive workforce plan to help identify the critical roles required to continue in Ausgrid. The company is consulting with employee and union representatives on this Workforce Plan. Significant efforts are being undertaken to determine positions which will be surplus to requirements and support the employees who as a result become redundant.
- (2) The sites where positions will remain are in offices and depots throughout the Ausgrid network area, which ranges from Southern Sydney to Muswellbrook.
- (3) A key element of the ongoing consultation with employee and union representatives is an analysis of ongoing and redundant positions by location. Initial data was provided to the unions on 9 September 2015 with further meetings scheduled through to mid-October 2015. Communication with employees will occur in the same time frame.
- (4) Yes. The 1,100 positions have been identified as unfunded due to the financial impact of the Australian Energy Regulator's reductions in approved capital and operating expenditure for the 2014-19 regulatory period.
  - (a) The AER determination has reduced the funding available (and therefore work to be performed) for capital expenditure by 63% and operating expenditure by 33 percent compared to the previous five year regulatory period. These significant reductions mean that Ausgrid is now borrowing \$12.6 million each month to help pay for jobs left unfunded by the AER since 1 July 2015. This is not a sustainable position for the organisation.

\*1418 BLUE MOUNTAINS LINE—Ms Trish Doyle asked the Minister for Transport and Infrastructure—

- (1) How many eight car services have been downgraded to six or four car services on the Blue Mountains line since 2011?
- (2) How many six car services have been downgraded to four car services on the Blue Mountains line since 2011?
- (3) How many four or six car services on the Blue Mountains line are presently being considered for an upgrade to a six or eight car service?



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- (a) If any, which timetabled services are being considered and how many extra carriages are to be added in each instance of a proposed upgrade?
- (4) How many services have operated in the past 18 months on the Blue Mountains line carrying (at any one time) more than an average across the train of 112 passengers (the seated capacity of a V-Set trailer carriage) per carriage on board?
- (5) How many 'Right to Way' staff have been removed since 2011?

Answer—

I am advised:

- (1) There has not been a decrease in the number of services operating with eight cars on the Blue Mountains Line.
- (2) The 2013 timetable provided a completely restructured timetable to provide Blue Mountains Line customers with a simpler timetable and more express services. Services operating today are operating at different times and with different stopping patterns.
- (3) Transport for NSW regularly monitors patronage on the Blue Mountains Line to ensure services reflect demand.
- (4) Load data is published on the Sydney Trains website.
- (5) None.

\*1419 CAR CLUBS IN THE BLUE MOUNTAINS—Ms Trish Doyle asked the Minister for Transport and Infrastructure representing the Minister for Roads, Maritime and Freight, and Vice-President of the Executive Council—

A number of car clubs operate in the Blue Mountains electorate and are authorised to participate in the RMS's historic vehicle plate scheme. The Minister has announced an opt-in, two year trial of 60 day log-books for operators of Historic Plated vehicles in New South Wales.

- (1) Under the existing arrangements, what is the actuarial basis for the fixed CTP payment collected by the RMS for historic plated vehicles?
  - (a) How many days use or kilometres driven is assumed in the existing actuarial analysis?
- (2) Is it a requirement that an operator of a historic plated vehicle receive permission from the authorised car club of which they are a member to opt-in to the log book trial?
  - (a) If no, are car clubs able to disallow participation in the trial by their members?
- (3) At the conclusion of the trial, if it is ultimately deemed successful, is it the Minister's ambition to compel all operators of historic plated vehicles to transition to a 60 day log book?
  - (a) Will any option be preserved for operators to retain the present arrangements?
- (4) Is the Minister considering a Modified Vehicle plate scheme such as that which exists in Victoria with their M-plate scheme, operated through authorised car clubs?

Answer—

Compulsory Third Party Insurance Premiums are a matter for the Minister for Finance, Services and Property.

Information on registration requirements for historic vehicles and the two year log book trial, as well as the proposed Modified Classic Vehicle Scheme, is available on the Roads and Maritime Services website.

An evaluation of the trial will be done as part of Roads and Maritimes' review of the overall Conditional Registration Scheme.

As the Roads and Maritime website states, this is a trial of an opt-in advantageous option. There is no intention of altering the successful H plate scheme during or after the trial.

\*1420 WOODVILLE JUNCTION INTERCHANGE SITE—Mr Tim Crakanthorp asked the Minister for Industry, Resources and Energy representing the Minister for Primary Industries, and Minister for Lands and Water—

How much of the land at the Woodville Junction Interchange Site is owned by crown lands?

Answer—

None.

\*1421 WILLIAMTOWN CONTAMINATION—Mr Tim Crakanthorp asked the Minister for Industry, Resources and Energy representing the Minister for Primary Industries, and Minister for Lands and Water—

What financial assistance is available to primary producers affected by the Williamstown Contamination?

Answer—

DPI Fisheries has collaborated with Biosecurity and Food Safety, and Crown Lands to provide a one month fee waiver for those fishers and oyster farmers impacted by the one month closure.

A single application form has been developed to streamline the application process and to avoid the need for fishers and oyster tamers to lodge three separate applications.

Affected fishers and oyster tamers were notified of the fee waiver on Tuesday 15 September 2015 and application forms were subsequently posted.

Additional assistance for Primary Producers includes free financial counselling services, household support payments and Local Land Services rate deferral where applicable.

The Government has also prepared and submitted a document to the Department of Defence dated 29 September 2015. This document outlines further levels of support and compensation that in accordance with the "polluter pays principle", the Department of Defence would be expected to meet for affected businesses and residents.

\*1423 BROADMEADOW RAILWAY STATION—Mr Tim Crakanthorp asked the Minister for Transport and Infrastructure—

(1) Given that the Broadmeadow Railway Station was identified for an Easy Access upgrade as part of the Transport Access Program and was due for completion by 2015, has this station received this upgrade?

(a) If not, what plans does the Government have to upgrade the accessibility of the Broadmeadow Railway Station?

Answer—

This information is publicly available.

\*1437 STADIUM UPGRADES—Ms Jenny Aitchison asked the Minister for Trade, Tourism and Major Events, and Minister for Sport—

(1) Following the Government's recent announcement that \$1 billion will be invested, over the next decade, into new and old stadiums across Sydney; what rural and regional sporting venues will be upgraded over the next four years?

(2) What will be the cost of upgrading rural and regional sporting venues over the next four years?

(3) Which rural and regional sporting venues and facilities have been upgraded by the Government between 1 March 2011 and 30 June 2015?

(4) How much money has been spent on rural and regional sporting venue and facilities upgrades between 1 March 2011 and 30 June 2015?

(5) Will the Government bid to host either the 2026 or 2030 FIFA World Cup?

Answer—

(1) and (2) I refer you to the Government's Rebuilding the Major Stadia Network announcement.

(3) and (4) Rural and regional sporting venues and facilities that have been upgraded by the Government between 1 March 2011 and 30 June 2015 include:

- WIN Stadium in Wollongong and Hunter Stadium - \$32.77 million
- Lithgow Aquatic Centre - \$3 million
- Plum Park in Lisarow - \$3 million
- Bradman Oval in Bowral - \$1.7 million

It should also be noted that rural and regional sporting venues receive funding from other portfolios including the Community Building Partnership program and ClubGrants Category 3 Fund.

(5) The Government, through its tourism and major events agency, Destination NSW, seeks to secure events for the State that drive increased visitation to contribute to the goal of doubling overnight visitor expenditure by 2020 and deliver the best return on investment for the NSW taxpayer.

\*1438 GST AND TAXES—Ms Jenny Aitchison asked the Premier, and Minister for Western Sydney—

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- (1) What is the average proportion of household income spent on the GST amongst the lowest and the highest quintiles of households by income in New South Wales?
- (2) How would the Government ensure that an increase in the GST will not be borne disproportionately by low income households?
- (3) What plan does the Government have to reform the emergency services levy, after announcing a two year delay in 2013, and other insurance taxes?
- (4) Will the Government accompany an increase in the GST with a decrease in distortionary taxes such as those on insurance?

Answer—

In August 2015, the Premier put forward a proposal to The Council of Australian Governments to raise the Goods and Services Tax (GST) to 15 per cent to cover significant annual shortfalls in national health costs.

As the GST is a broad-based tax, the proposal included reference to the need for a comprehensive compensation package for lower income earners to ensure that a fair and sustainable system would be delivered.

Changes to taxes and levies not directly associated with the GST require consultation and consideration.

\*1439 UNEMPLOYMENT IN THE HUNTER REGION—Ms Jenny Aitchison asked the Premier, and Minister for Western Sydney—

Given that Maitland and the Upper Hunter are part of the Hunter Region which has the highest unemployment and youth unemployment rates in New South Wales:

- (1) What measures is the Government taking to provide jobs in both Maitland and the Upper Hunter?
- (2) Has the Member for Upper Hunter written to the Minister requesting more funding for his electorate under the Community Building Partnerships?
  - (a) If so, on what date?
- (3) Will the Government increase the funding of Community Building Partnerships to \$300,000 in both Maitland and in the Upper Hunter?
- (4) What other Government funding is available for communities who are experiencing high unemployment?

Answer—

- (1) The Government has established Jobs for NSW, an initiative that uses private sector expertise to develop better incentives for businesses to create jobs. The \$190 million Jobs for NSW fund will be rolled out to assist regional businesses and industries to grow jobs, with 30 per cent of funding dedicated to regional job creation. The Government is also working directly with key business groups in the Hunter to support jobs growth. The Department of Industry, Skills and Regional coordination has initiated industry roundtable forums to monitor the regional economy and develop strategies to support local industry. Key stakeholders, including the Australian Industry Group, Hunter Business Chamber, HunterNet and the Hunter Research Foundation, are represented at the forum.

The Government has also appointed a local employment coordinator, Ms Jane Callinan, for the Upper Hunter to work with Commonwealth agencies, councils, large employers, local business chambers and skills training organisations to facilitate:

- New apprenticeship and training pathways for unemployed youth and school leavers
- Practical support for youth to access training and employment, including public transport services.

The Government provides funding assistance to businesses in the Hunter region to help facilitate new job creation through:

- Payroll tax rebates from the Office of State Revenue (OSR) for the creation of new positions in larger firms
- OSR grants for the creation of new jobs within small businesses.

The Government is also delivering the social and economic infrastructure needed to support jobs growth in the Hunter. This includes a commitment to date of almost \$400 million through the Hunter Infrastructure and Investment Fund, and \$106 million through Resources for Regions.

The 2015 Community Building Partnership program provides base funding of \$200,000 to electorates to support local projects. An additional \$100,000 is available to electorates with higher levels of social disadvantage as indicated by higher comparative unemployment rates.

Answer—

- (1) It is assumed that 'new shark patrols' is referring to aerial surveillance that is in addition to the beaches that are already subject to a long term aerial surveillance program in the Newcastle to Wollongong regions. Additional beaches between Byron Bay and Evans Head will receive aerial surveillance from Saturday 19 September to Monday 6 October 2015.
  - (a) The additional aerial surveillance is part of the Government's focus to assist local councils on the North Coast. It will take place every day over the holiday period in areas of known shark aggregation sites, except if daily weather and sea conditions limit the visibility or safety of surveillance operations and therefore beach use in the area.
- (2) Consistent with the Premier's \$100,000 election commitment, the Department of Primary Industries convened a Scientific Shark Summit on 29 September 2015. The aim of the Summit was to make a recommendation to the Department regarding which new technologies to trial and at which beaches.

- (4) What actions has the Minister taken to investigate the case of the brutal attack on a woman with a hammer by her former partner in Maitland in September 2015?

Answer—

I am advised:

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On 14 October 2015 the Government committed a \$60 million package to domestic and family violence (DFV). This is in addition to the \$148.5 million over four years the Government committed for specialist domestic and family violence services in the 2015-16 Budget. This investment reaches regional and rural communities across the state.

The package augments the Government's existing It Stops Here DFV reforms and responds to the Premier's priority to reduce reoffending by 2019, and supports victims to escape and survive domestic and family violence. More details including factsheets can be found at [www.women.nsw.gov.au](http://www.women.nsw.gov.au).

The Government congratulates the Queensland Government on its announcements to reform domestic and family violence laws and improve services in its state. The Government is currently undertaking a DFV Blueprint to analyse service gaps in the DFV system. This is currently underway with experts across the non-government and government sectors, and public submissions will open soon.

I am advised the case referred to in Maitland is currently before the courts.

Penrith High School is reviewing security measures to prevent the inappropriate accessing of its data system. A reminder to all departmental staff on password security was published on 11 September 2015.
