*6790 STAMP DUTY REVENUE IN THE GOSFORD ELECTORATE—Ms Liesl Tesch asked the Minister for Finance, Services and Property—

(1) What was the value of stamp duty revenue in the Gosford electorate in each of the financial years from 2014-15 to 2016-17?

(2) Is revenue from stamp duty reinvested in the area in which it was raised?

Answer-

(1) Information to support data shown below:

(a) Data is current as at 19 October 2017.

(b) Data includes all documents lodged between 1 July 2014 and 30 June 2017.

(c) Data for postcodes 2282, 2250, 2256, 2257 and 2275 have been included based on the NSW Electoral Commission Gosford Electorate Listing.

(2) Revenue from transfer duty is a contribution to consolidated revenue used to fund the general services of government and is not hypothecated to a specific use or location.

- (1) What is the percentage of children in the New South Wales public education system with disability?
- (2) What is the percentage of children in Gosford electorate public schools with disability?

Answer-

- (1) I'm advised that around 15 per cent of students in New South Wales public schools have learning needs that are impacted by disability.
- (2) I'm advised that around 15 per cent of students in New South Wales public schools in the Gosford electorate have learning needs that are impacted by disability.
- *6792 INTERRUPTIONS OR BREAKDOWNS IN SERVICE AT SERVICE NSW SITES—Ms Anna Watson asked the Minister for Finance, Services and Property—
 - How many interruptions or breakdowns in service have been recorded in the past 12 months (to 12 October 2017) at the following Service NSW sites:
 - (a) Warrawong Service Centre;
 - (b) Wollongong Service Centre;
 - (c) Kiama Service Centre;
 - (d) Corrimal Service Centre;
 - (e) Shellharbour 'Pop Up' store (prior to its closure)?

Answer—

Service interruptions experienced from 12 October 2016 to 12 October 2017 at the following sites:

Warrawong Service Centre 3

Wollongong Service Centre - 2

Kiama Service Centre - 1

Corrimal Service Centre - 2

Shellharbour Digital Store 0

During the same period there were 46 network wide issues that also affected the above sites.

- *6793 ILLAWARRA SHOALHAVEN LOCAL HEALTH DISTRICT DISABILITY ACTION PLAN 2014-2017—Ms Anna Watson asked the Minister for Health, and Minister for Medical Research—
 - (1) What specific changes have been made to service delivery and the relevant identified barriers as a

result of the Illawarra Shoalhaven Local Health District (ISLHD) Disability Action Plan 2014-2017?(2) Is the Minister satisfied that all priority areas identified in the ISLHD Disability Action Plan 2014-2017 have now been addressed?

(a) If not, until what year or date will the Plan's application be extended to, or alternatively will another Disability Action Plan be developed in the near future?

Answer—

I am advised that Illawarra Shoalhaven Local Health District (ISLHD) has achieved or partly achieved over 80 per cent of the actions under the ISLHD Disability Action Plan 2014-2017.

ISLHD has now transitioned to the NSW Health Disability Inclusion Action Plan 2016-2019 (DIAP) and will continue to progress disability inclusion under the Disability Action Plan .

*6794 POLICE RESPONSE TIMES—Ms Anna Watson asked the Minister for Police, and Minister for Emergency Services—

- (1) What is the current appropriate response time for police in New South Wales to respond to reports of crime?
- (2) What is the current average response time of police (as at 12 October 2017) at:
 - (a) Lake Illawarra Local Area Command;(b) Wollongong Local Area Command?
- Answer—

I am advised:

A range of factors, including the number of calls being responded to at any time, the time of day, traffic density, weather conditions and the distance to travel, influences response times.

- *6795 EMERGENCY MANAGEMENT PLAN FOR THE ILLAWARRA SOUTH COAST EMERGENCY MANAGEMENT REGION—Ms Anna Watson asked the Minister for Police, and Minister for Emergency Services—
 - (1) When will the next formal review of the Emergency Management Plan (EMPLAN) for the Illawarra South Coast Emergency Management Region be carried out?
 - (2) Have any relevant aspects of this EMPLAN and its Sub Plans been reviewed since its release in November 2012 (as at 12 October 2017)?
 - (a) If so, what aspects, why and how?

Answer-

The NSW Police Force has advised me:

- (1) The rewrite of the current Regional Plan for the Illawarra South Coast, including a full review of the 2012 document, is currently underway.
- (2) Regular reviews of the plans are undertaken by appropriate organisations as part of their operational responsibilities. As at October 2017, the Regional Engineering Support Plan, the Regional Flood Plan and Bushfire Plans were reviewed.
- *6796 EXTENSION OF THE EASTERN VALLEY WAY CLEARWAY—Ms Jodi McKay asked the Minister for Roads, Maritime and Freight—
 - (1) Will the Government proceed with the extension of the Eastern Valley Way Clearway following receipt of the submissions?
 - (2) How many submissions were received from local residents?
 - (3) How many submissions were received from local businesses?
 - (4) What is the timeframe for making the decision about the extension of the clearway?
 - (5) Will there be any additional community engagement sessions?
 - (6) Has any research to investigate the impact of proposed measures to alleviate pinch points along Eastern Valley Way been undertaken, notably at the Smith Street and Castle Cove Drive, and to indent bus bays along the entire stretch of Eastern Valley Way, both northbound and southbound?(a) If not, why not?
 - (b) If so, what has the department done?
 - (7) Has there been any engagement with Woolworths to help alleviate the Smith Street pinch point and traffic congestion as part of its development application to establish services within the Smith Street retail precinct?
 - (a) What are the outcomes of these negotiations?

- (8) Why did the department present residents with volume data from 2015, sampled from a site near a business precinct at 350 Eastern Valley Way?
- (9) Why was travel time data collected from Roseville Chase to Cammeray when Eastern Valley Road ends at the Sailors Bay Road intersection at Northbridge and the majority of commuter vehicles exit at Edinburgh Road?
- (10) What is a reasonable travel time along Eastern Valley Way, outside of current clearway hours?
- (11) Given the residential character of Eastern Valley Way, why is the clearway extension required?

Answer-

I am advised:

Roads and Maritime Services invited community feedback on the Eastern Valley Way Clearway Proposal in June and July 2017. Roads and Maritime is assessing the feedback and a community consultation report will be prepared and published on its website.

Negotiations with retailers within the Smith Street retail precinct are ongoing.

- *6797 INCOME FROM WATERWAYS IN THE GOSFORD ELECTORATE—Ms Liesl Tesch asked the Minister for Lands and Forestry, and Minister for Racing representing the Minister for Primary Industries, Minister for Regional Water, Minister for Trade and Industry—
 - (1) What is the value of income to Government derived from activities on Brisbane Water in the Gosford electorate?
 - (2) What is the value of income to Government derived from activities on all waterways in the Gosford electorate?

Answer-

This question lacks sufficient clarity to provide a definitive answer. There is a range of activities that take place on waterways, covered by a number of portfolios, from which the Government would derive income.

*6798 FISHER SHARES IN THE GOSFORD ELECTORATE—Ms Liesl Tesch asked the Minister for Lands and Forestry, and Minister for Racing representing the Minister for Primary Industries, Minister for Regional Water, Minister for Trade and Industry—

What is the number of fisher shares that were held by fishers registered in the Gosford electorate that when last changed hands are now held by fishers not registered in the Gosford electorate in each of the financial years from 2014-15 to 2016-17?

Answer—

Given the amount of share transfers that have occurred across New South Wales fisheries during the time periods referred to, shares could have come in and out of different Fishing Businesses in the Gosford electorate multiple times. The system for administering share transactions has not been designed to 'tag' or 'track' individual shares and the postcodes they move into and out of and retrospectively report on those movements.

- *6799 NSW CROWN HOLIDAY PARKS TRUST ANNUAL REPORT—Ms Anna Watson asked the Minister for the Environment, Minister for Local Government, and Minister for Heritage—
 - (1) Has the NSW Crown Holiday Parks Trust provided the Minister with an annual report for the 2016-17 financial year?
 - (a) If not yet, on what date is the NSW Crown Holiday Parks Trust required to have submitted their annual report for the past financial year?
 - (2) Will the contents of this annual report be made publicly available?

(a) If so, on what date and how will this report be able to be accessed?

Answer—

I am advised that this is a matter for the Minister for Lands.

*6803 TOMAREE COMMUNITY HOSPITAL ON-SITE IMAGING—Ms Kate Washington asked the Minister for Health, and Minister for Medical Research—

When will the Tomaree Community Hospital have on-site imaging capacity in the form of x-ray and/or ultrasound?

Answer—

The Government has announced that general X-ray services are expected to begin on-site in early 2018.

- *6804 TURTLE DEATHS—Ms Kate Washington asked the Minister for the Environment, Minister for Local Government, and Minister for Heritage—
 - (1) Have there been any turtle deaths in the Port Stephens-Great Lakes Marine Park in each year from 2014 to 2017 (as at 12 October 2017)?
 - (a) If so, did any of them undergo an autopsy to identify the cause of death?(i) If so, what was the cause of death?

Answer-

I am advised:

- (1) 14 turtle deaths were reported from 2014 to 12 October 2017.
 - (a) Five turtles were autopsied.
 - (i) Of the turtles that underwent an autopsy, one died of acute pneumonia and gastroenteritis causing drowning, one died of vessel strike and three died of injury and associated infection.
- *6805 PALLIATIVE CARE FUNDING—Mr Tim Crakanthorp asked the Minister for Health, and Minister for Medical Research—
 - (1) How much of the \$100 million funding for palliative care announced in June this year will be allocated to boosting services in the Newcastle electorate?
 - (2) If part of the \$100 million funding announcement is spent in the Newcastle electorate, how will it be spent and when?
 - (3) Over the four years, where and how will the \$100 million palliative care funding be spent?

Answer-

Funding for palliative care by Local Health Districts and Specialty Health Networks will be allocated based on assessment of a range of factors including local need.

Local Health Districts are responsible for how they distribute their funding across their geographical area.

- *6807 HEALTH AND SAFETY ON WESTCONNEX CONSTRUCTION SITES—Ms Jenny Leong asked the Minister for Western Sydney, Minister for WestConnex, and Minister for Sport—
 - (1) Considering that WestConnex construction works consist of large-scale and long term tunnelling, what measures are in place to protect workers from dust inhalation on WestConnex sites, especially tunnels?
 - (2) What protection gear are workers being supplied with to wear in the tunnels?
 - (3) What measures are being undertaken to remove dust from workers' clothing?
 - (4) What health and safety information has been given to workers on WestConnex construction sites with regard to the risk of silicosis?

Answer-

Workers on WestConnex construction sites are subject to personal protective equipment requirements, including steel cap boots, hi-vis vests and hard hats, safety glasses, long pants and long sleeves. All workers entering and working within the tunnels must wear a dust mask and complete a safety induction. Part of the induction training covers the risks associated with silicosis and the importance of wearing the required tunnel personal protective equipment.

Silica dust levels across all project sites are regularly monitored to ensure they do not exceed safe levels, as recommended by SafeWork Australia.

Information about safety is available on the WestConnex website.

*6808 MEMORANDUM OF UNDERSTANDING WITH THE NATIONAL RUGBY LEAGUE—Mr Alex Greenwich asked the Minister for Western Sydney, Minister for WestConnex, and Minister for Sport—

- (1) When did the Government enter into a memorandum of understanding (MOU) with the National Rugby League for the construction and refurbishment of Sydney stadiums?
- (2) Why isn't the MOU publicly available?
- (3) When and where will the MOU be published online?

Answer-

The Government is currently finalising investment in the New South Wales stadia network.

- *6809 NATIONAL FIREARMS AGREEMENT—Mr Alex Greenwich asked the Minister for Police, and Minister for Emergency Services—
 - (1) Has the Government introduced legislation on all parts of the 1996 National Firearms Agreement?(a) If not, why not?
 - (2) What restrictions in the National Firearms Agreement have been loosened since that time?
 - (3) What action has been taken to:
 - (a) Ban silencers;
 - (b) Ban semi-automatic guns;
 - (c) Require antique guns to be registered;
 - (d) Require registration of shooters under 12 years of age;
 - (e) Establish a national gun registry?
 - (4) What is the Government's response to evidence in the Sydney University's school of public health report that gun controls have been significantly weakened since the original National Firearms Agreement?
 - (5) Is this report's claim that New South Wales laws allow people to use firearms more widely than any other jurisdiction true?
 - (6) What data does the Government have about the number of guns in New South Wales and trends in gun in ownership since 1996?
 - (7) How many guns have been removed from the community through amnesty and buyback programs?
 - (8) What measures has the Government taken to reduce possibility of guns being:
 - (a) Stolen or migrated into criminal use;
 - (b) Used to kill or maim people;
 - (c) Used for suicide or self harm;
 - (d) Redirected into vigilante or terrorist activity?
 - (9) What measures has the Government taken to prevent people who are not eligible to own a gun or licence getting guns?
 - (10) What measures has the Government taken to prevent access to automatic and fast action guns that could be used for mass murder?
 - (11) What measures has the Government taken to restrict eligibility for a gun licence or ownership to those who need one?
 - (12) What further action will the Government take to prevent the possibility of mass shootings such as have occurred regularly in the United States of America?

Answer—

I am advised:

(1) The 1996 National Firearms Agreement (NFA) has been superseded by the 2017 NFA. Firearms legislation in New South Wales is consistent with the 2017 NFA.

(2) Firearms legislation in New South Wales is consistent with the 2017 NFA, which is available at www.ag.gov.au/LegalSystem/Firearms/Documents/2017-national-firearms-agreement.pdf

(3) (a) Silencers are prohibited weapons under the Weapons Prohibition Act 1998 (New South Wales).

(b) Semi-automatic firearms are prohibited firearms.

(c) Antique firearms (other than revolvers) manufactured before 1900 for which ammunition is not commercially available, or which is not capable of discharging breech-loaded metallic cartridges, do not need to be registered to be possessed. However, the use of these firearms requires a permit or licence.

(d) Children under the age of 12 are not able to acquire, possess or use a firearm.

(e) The Australian Firearms Information Network already exists and was previously called the National Firearms Licensing and Registration System.

(4) New South Wales is committed to the National Firearms Agreement 2017 and was one of the first jurisdictions to implement the most recent changes through legislation. Differences between jurisdictions are expected and do not undermine the effectiveness of the NFA.

The research is not reliable.

(5) No. New South Wales is consistent with the NFA.

(6) Data in relation to firearm ownership between 1996 and 2001 is difficult to compile, given the fluctuating levels of ownership and manual recording systems. Data from 2001 onwards is available and on the public record.

(7) The 2017 National Firearms Amnesty has resulted in over 26,000 New South Wales firearms being either surrendered for destruction or registered.

(8) The robust regulatory firearms regime in New South Wales is the best protection to ensure legitimate firearms are not available to criminals; are safely stored and transported; and are not available to vigilantes or terrorists. Firearms Prohibition Orders (FPOs) and prohibitions on firearm possession in circumstances of domestic violence are just two examples of the measures taken in this area. The safe storage of firearms separate from ammunition decreases the risk of impulsive suicide attempts.

(9) The Government is committed to existing 'genuine reasons', including that personal protection is not a genuine reason to possess a gun. The legislation is clear in this respect.

(10) Automatic and self-loading rifles and shotguns are prohibited except in special circumstances, such as military or police use.

(11) The genuine reason test is applied to all applications for a firearms licence.

(12) The work of Strike Force Raptor and Talon continue to target the illegal firearms market and the NSW Police Force is working with the Commonwealth to address the illegal importation of black market firearms.

The Government also promotes a culture of responsible gun ownership that does not reflect the gun culture in the United States of America; in fact, the strong firearms laws in Australia and in New South Wales are frequently cited in that country as an example to be followed.

- *6812 DOLTONE HOUSE JONES BAY WHARF COMPLAINTS—Mr Alex Greenwich asked the Minister for Planning, Minister for Housing, and Special Minister for State—
 - (1) Has the security management plan referred to in LA Q4786 (Questions and Answers Paper 196, dated 28 November 2013) been submitted, assessed and approved?
 - (a) What changes resulted from this plan?
 - (b) How is this information made available to the adjacent community?
 - (2) Has the noise management plan referred to in LA Q5335 (Questions and Answers Paper 126, dated 11 May 2017) been submitted, assessed and approved?
 - (a) What changes resulted from this plan?
 - (b) How is this information made available to the adjacent community?
 - (3) What is the outcome of the ongoing investigation referred to in LA Q5335?(a) What reports have been provided to the adjacent community?
 - (4) What complaints have been received about noise and nuisance from this facility since April 2017 (to 12 October 2017)?
 - (a) What action has been taken in response to these?
 - (5) What further action will the Government take to ensure compliance with consent conditions and protect adjacent residents from intrusive night time noise and public nuisance?

Answer—

I am advised:

(1) This question should be referred to the Minister for Racing.

(2) The noise management plan was submitted to the Department on 3 November 2017. The Department has reviewed the plan and has requested some changes. Once approved, the Department will ensure the noise management plan is publicly available on its website.

(3) As a result of investigation LA Q5335, the Department took the following actions:

- On 7 June 2017, the Department issued an Official Caution to Doltone House Wharf Pty Ltd for operating outside their hours of consent (Condition B1 of DA 52-03-05);
- On 11 July 2017, the Department issued an Official Caution to Doltone House Wharf Pty Ltd because on the same day, an amplified performance occurred on the outside area and 14 drummers were witnessed playing on the outdoor area of Jones Bay Wharf (Condition 89 of DA 52-03-05); and
- On 11 July 2017, the Department issued a \$6000 penalty notice to Doltone House Wharf Pty Ltd for deliveries which occurred outside the approved hours of consent (Condition 817 of DA 52-03-05).

(a) The outcomes from this investigation were communicated to the residents who made the compliants. The Compliance team also publishes a monthly summary of all enforcement action taken during the month. These reports are available on the Department's website: www.planning.nsw.gov.au/Assess-and-Regulate/Compliance-functions/Compliance-activity

(4) The Department received 6 complaints in relation to Doltone House during April and May 2017. Since the action taken in June/July 2017, the Department did not receive any complaints from the community until 16 October 2017. The Department has now received 5 complaints from two complainants. These complaints are currently being investigated by the Compliance team.

(5) The Compliance team is currently engaged in an on-going investigation into the complaints received since 16 October 2017.

*6813 CENTRAL STATION MAIN WORKS PROJECT—Ms Jodi McKay asked the Minister for Transport and Infrastructure—

Is the Central Station Main Works project funded within the budget for the Sydney Metro City and SouthWest?

I am advised:

The Central Station Main Works contract is funded within the budget for the Sydney Metro City and Southwest.

 - (iii) In afternoon peak hour?

 - (ii) In morning peak hour;
 - (iii) In afternoon peak hour?
 - (e) Kingsford to Circular Quay:
 - (i) Average;
 - (ii) In morning peak hour;

Answer—

I am advised:

Planning documents estimate end-to-end journey time at 34 to 38 minutes.

Between 7am and 7pm Monday to Friday, light rail services will operate every four minutes in each direction between the CBD and Moore Park and every eight minutes along the Randwick and Kingsford branch lines. Additional services will run during special events at Moore Park or Randwick racecourse.

- *6815 CBD AND SOUTH EAST LIGHT RAIL—Ms Jodi McKay asked the Minister for Transport and Infrastructure—
 - (1) What is the source of the funds for any settlement of contractor claims for the CBD and South East Light Rail?
 - (2) Are the funds that have been offered listed in the 2017-18 Budget?(a) If so, under what line item?
 - (3) Is the money offered for the settlement of claims included within the \$2.1 billion budget for the CBD and South East Light rail?

Answer-

Modifications and claims on large infrastructure projects are normal business and are worked through with the contractor on a commercial basis. Any commercial arrangements with ALTRAC Light Rail are managed with the strictest confidentiality under the South East Light Rail deed.

- *6816 BUS BREAKDOWNS-Ms Jo Haylen asked the Minister for Transport and Infrastructure-
 - (1) What was the total of bus breakdowns in each separate bus region for each financial year from 2012-13 to 2016-17?
 - (2) What was the total cost of bus maintenance for each separate bus region in each financial year from 2012-13 to 2016-17?
 - (3) What was the total cost of bus maintenance for the Government owned buses in each financial year from 2012-13 to 2016-17?

Answer—

I am advised:

(1) Bus breakdown data is not directly comparable due to different reporting and recording processes across the various operators.

- (2) and (3) Maintenance costs are confidential under the terms of the contracts.
- *6817 REZONING OF LAND ADJACENT TO DULWICH HILL PUBLIC SCHOOL—Ms Jo Haylen asked the Minister for Education—
 - (1) Is the Minister for Education and Department of Education aware of the proposed rezoning of land adjacent to Dulwich Hill Public School as part of the Government's Sydenham to Bankstown Urban Renewal Corridor?
 - (a) If so, what correspondence or interactions have occurred between the Department of Education and the Department of Planning regarding these proposals?
 - (2) Will the Minister and Department address the concerns of parents, teachers and students that the eight storey residential buildings will substantially overshadow the school's playgrounds and classrooms?

Answer—

I'm advised that any rezoning of land adjacent to Dulwich Hill Public School would have to proceed through a comprehensive Local Environmental Plan (LEP) review or local Planning Proposal. I'm advised neither of these are under consideration.

If and when any such review or proposal is put forward, the department will consider likely impacts on the school, students, staff or community, and respond accordingly.

*6819 INNER WEST COUNCIL—Ms Jo Haylen asked the Minister for Planning, Minister for Housing, and Special Minister for State—

Why did the Department of Planning reject the request by the Inner West Council to have the whole council area included in SEPP 70 Affordable Housing (Revised Schemes)?

Answer-

I am advised the Department of Planning and Environment has not rejected the request.

- *6821 ROYAL BOTANIC GARDENS AND DOMAIN TRUST AND THE SYDNEY MODERN PROJECT—Mr Luke Foley asked the Minister for the Environment, Minister for Local Government, and Minister for Heritage—
 - (1) Is the consent of the Royal Botanic Gardens and Domain Trust required for the Sydney Modern project to occupy the land north of the land bridge?

*6823 DRIVING HISTORY RECORD-Mr Clayton Barr asked the Minister for Roads, Maritime and Freight-

- (1) When did Roads and Maritime Services commence keeping records of an individual's driving history, including when they attained their Learner and Provisional driver's licence?
- (2) Are there any instances where an individual's driving history has been destroyed, and therefore there is no record of when they attained their Learner or Provisional driver's licence?
 - (a) If yes, what processes are implemented to clarify the individual's driving history?
 - (b) Are affected customers required to re-sit either their Learner or Provisional driving tests to confirm their eligibly or ability to control a motor vehicle?
- (3) How many individuals are there in New South Wales who have been required to re-sit their Learner and Provisional driving tests due to technological issues that have resulted in their driving history being destroyed?
 - (a) What support from Roads and Maritime Services has been provided to these individuals?

Answer-

I am advised:

Roads and Maritime Services began keeping electronic records of driver licences in the 1970s, when all active licence records were converted to the IBM system. Roads and Maritime's records only include licenses which were active at the time of conversion.

If Roads and Maritime is not able to verify the existence of a previously held unrestricted driver licence because the licence had lapsed prior to the 1970s, the applicant is required to progress through the graduated licensing scheme.

Applicants over 25 years of age are exempt from completing the mandatory learner 120 driving hours.

- *6824 LOCAL COUNCIL ELECTION PENALTY NOTICES—Mr Clayton Barr asked the Minister for Finance, Services and Property—
 - (1) How many registered voters who failed to vote in the 2016 local council elections received 'Failure to Vote' penalty notices?
 - (2) How many voters appealed the fines due to not knowing the elections were on in their local government area?
 - (a) How many of these voters were successful with their appeals?(i) What local government areas did these appellants live in?
 - (b) How many of these voters were unsuccessful with their appeals?

Answer-

(1) and (2) Revenue NSW only holds data on the number of fines which were referred for enforcement (i.e. not paid by due date) and does not hold the total numbers of failure to vote penalty notices issued or the total numbers of voters who appealed their fines.

This question should be directed to the Premier, as Minister responsible for the New South Wales Electoral Commission.

- *6825 ABERDARE ROAD AND VINCENT STREET, CESSNOCK—Mr Clayton Barr asked the Minister for Roads, Maritime and Freight—
 - (1) On how many occasions since 2007 have Roads and Maritime Services officials analysed traffic movements at the intersection of Aberdare Road and Vincent Street, Cessnock?

- (a) Have upgrades occurred following analysis of this intersection?(i) If so, what did these upgrades entail?
- (2) How many motor vehicle accidents were recorded at this location in each calendar year from 2007 to 2017 (as at 11 October 2017)?
- (3) How many pedestrians have been hit or injured by a motor vehicle at this location in each calendar year from 2007 to 2017 (as at 11 October 2017)?
 - (a) How many of these collisions occurred whilst the pedestrian was crossing on a green walk signal?

Answer—

- (1) The intersection of Aberdale Road and Vincent Street, Cessnock, was upgraded to traffic lights in October 1990 and had minor adjustments to the phasing in 2002 which did not relate to the pedestrian phases.
- (2) In the ten years of completed crash data at the intersection there were a total of nine crashes.
- (3) There has been one pedestrian incident at the intersection which involved a car reverse parking and hitting a pedestrian. Crash data does not indicate whether the pedestrian was crossing on a green walk signal.
- *6826 NSW CIVIL AND ADMINISTRATIVE TRIBUNAL NEWCASTLE—Mr Clayton Barr asked the Attorney General—
 - (1) Of the NSW Civil and Administrative Tribunal (NCAT) hearings in Newcastle, how many tenants were evicted from social housing following an order from NCAT in each financial year from 2014-15 to 2016-17?
 - (2) Of the NCAT hearings in Newcastle, how many private rental tenants were evicted following an order from NCAT in each financial year from 2014-15 to 2016-17?
 - (3) Does NCAT offer any support or advice to those tenants who have received an eviction order?(a) If yes, what does this support entail?
 - (4) On average, what period of time does a tenant have between receiving an order from NCAT and vacating the premises?
 - (5) Does NCAT take in consideration special circumstances before making a decision to evict a tenant?(a) If yes, what types of considerations?

Answer-

I am advised:

The NSW Civil and Administrative Tribunal (NCAT) does not capture information about evictions following an order from NCAT.

NCAT is a decision making body. Its functions do not include offering support or advice to tenants who have received an eviction order. The power to execute a termination order rests with the NSW Sheriff's Office.

Section 154E of the Residential Tenancies Act 2010 sets out the types of special circumstances the Tribunal must take into consideration before making a decision to make a termination order for a social housing agreement.

Section 87 of the Residential Tenancies Act 2010 sets out the general circumstances of a case the Tribunal may consider (but is not limited to considering) before making a decision to make a termination order for a residential tenancy agreement.

- *6827 ICARE ASSISTANCE PROGRAM—Mr Clayton Barr asked the Treasurer, and Minister for Industrial Relations—
 - (1) Considering a letter from your office which advised that "iCare has developed an assistance program for workers affected by the five-year cap on weekly payments", when was the assistance program implemented?
 - (2) How can injured workers access the assistance program?
 - (3) When injured workers contact iCare to access the assistance program, is it true they are referred to the State Insurance Regulatory Authority's 13 10 50 contact number?
 - (a) Why is this the case?
 - (b) Are the customer support operators in a position to provide the psychological and emotional support to injured workers who attempt to access the assistance program?
 - (c) What process is implemented to refer injured workers to the appropriate support when they call

the 13 10 50 number?

(4) Since its inception, how many injured workers have accessed the assistance program (to 11 October 2017)?

(5) How have injured workers been informed of the existence of the assistance program?

Answer-

(1) The assistance program, including an Advisory Assistance Service and Community Support Service for workers affected by the five-year cap on weekly payments, was implemented from June 2016.

(2) Affected workers can access the assistance program through their insurer. They can also contact icare for advice and assistance.

(3) As part of assistance provided by icare, affected workers are provided with general information on key support agencies, including the State Insurance Regulatory Authority (SIRA) and Workers Compensation Independent Review Office (WIRO).

(a) icare's assistance program includes an Advisory Assistance Service to support workers in understanding how they will be impacted by the change. This is predominantly a phone based service staffed by psychologists and mental health nurses; but for workers requiring more intensive support and tailored intervention, it also provides face-to-face and mobile assistance.

To ensure workers are aware of all information and options available to them, icare also provides information on other support services including SIRA and the WIRO.

(b) icare's customer service staff are trained in providing assistance to injured workers, including those experiencing a transition in their claim. The Advisory and Assistance Service and Community Support Service have staff with experience in dealing with mental health issues, providing psychological support and in local community support services.

(c) The 13 10 50 number belongs to SIRA, which falls under the portfolio responsibilities of the Minister for Finance, Services and Property.

(4) Since the inception of the assistance program to 11 October 2017:

- 526 workers have been referred to the Advisory and Assistance Service; and
- 310 calls have been received by the Community Support Services telephone line resulting in 166 referrals for ongoing local support with community program partners.

(5) Affected workers have been informed of the impact of the five-year cap and their options, including accessing the assistance program, via telephone, post, email and digital video.

- *6828 WORKERS COMPENSATION-Mr Clayton Barr asked the Minister for Finance, Services and Property-
 - (1) Can an employer dismiss an injured worker within 2 weeks of being injured at work, whilst on workers compensation and not notify the employee?
 - (2) Can a supervisor ask an injured worker not to report a workplace injury, and then tell an injured worker that their job is not safe if they have time off work?
 - (3) Can coal miners have workers compensation insurance with any other insurer, other than Coal Mines Insurance?

(a) If yes, which other insurers?

- (4) Does the State Insurance Regulatory Authority (SIRA) or iCare have authority to enforce which company employers must have workers compensation insurance with in the mining industry?
- (5) Can a coal miner be insured under the general New South Wales workers compensation scheme?
- (6) Does SIRA or iCare have to comply with and enforce New South Wales workers compensation legislation and the Workers Compensation Act?
- (7) Can SIRA or iCare ask an injured worker not to contact them because they don't want to answer questions with regards to workers compensation legislation enforcement and the compliance of workers compensation in New South Wales?
- (8) Do coal miners working in New South Wales coal mines have to be insured under the specialised insurer Coal Mines Insurance as per the Coal Industry Act 2001 and SIRA's own legislation and guidelines?
- (9) What processes do mining regulatory bodies, such as NSW Mines Safety, SIRA and iCare, implement to ensure adverse decisions or actions are not made in workplaces that are detrimental to injured and non-injured workers in the coal mining industry?
 - (a) Have these processes been successful in assisting workers?

Answer—

(1) A worker may be dismissed for a range of reasons. Workers compensation legislation offers protection to a worker from being dismissed due to their injury as follows:

Section 248 of the Workers Compensation Act 1987 (1987 Act) provides that an employer who dismisses a worker is guilty of an offence, if the dismissal was because the worker was not fit for employment as a result of the injury and such dismissal happened during the relevant period of six months after the worker first became unfit for employment.

In determining whether a worker has been validly dismissed, and what kind of notification is appropriate in the circumstances, regard should also be had to other relevant legislation (e.g. the Fair Work Act 2009 (Commonwealth) or Industrial Relations Act 1996), common law, as well as any applicable award or agreement.

Where a worker has been dismissed, section 241 of the 1987 Act provides that a worker may make an application for reinstatement to their employer. The kind of employment for which a worker applies for reinstatement cannot be more advantageous than what the worker was previously engaged to perform, and a certificate of capacity must be produced confirming the worker is fit for that employment.

If the employer does not reinstate the worker, the worker may be able to make an application for reinstatement to the NSW Industrial Relations Commission.

It is recommended that a worker seek legal advice if they are dismissed at work while they are away from work due to an injury.

(2) Section 44 of the Workplace Injury Management and Workers Compensation Act 1998 requires an injured worker to notify their employer that they have received a workplace injury, and requires the employer to then notify the insurer within 48 hours after becoming aware that a worker has received a workplace injury. An Inspector authorised under the workers compensation legislation can issue an improvement notice to an employer who fails to comply with this obligation.

(3) In accordance with Section 31 (1) of the Coal Industry Act 2001 Coal Miners must take out Workers Compensation Insurance with Coal Mines Insurance for their Coal Mines business. As per section 7A (4) of the Workers Compensation Act 1987 Coal Mines Insurance is taken to be the insurer of all employers in the Coal industry. To the extent that insurance does not cover some workers employed by the Coal Miner (e.g. for any other part of their business), the Coal Miner must take out a policy with either the Nominal Insurer (managed by icare) or if relevant, a Specialised Insurer (Section 155 of the Workers Compensation Act 1987) covering those non-'Coal Mines' workers.

(4) Neither SIRA nor icare 'enforces' which insurer an employer insurers with. However, SIRA does have jurisdiction over an employer who fails to obtain any insurance.

(5) See above answer to question 3.

(6) SIRA is responsible for regulating and ensuring compliance with the workers compensation system in New South Wales as set out in the:

- Workers Compensation Act 1987
- Workplace Injury Management and Workers Compensation Act 1998, and
- Workers Compensation Regulation 2016.

As employers in New South Wales, SIRA (whose staff are part of the Department of Finance, Services and Innovation) and icare are bound by the workers compensation legislation.

Questions regarding the operations of icare should be referred to the Treasurer.

(7) SIRA provides advice and support to injured workers, including managing complaints and in appropriate cases taking compliance action. In a small number of cases some customers behave in ways that are inappropriate and unacceptable, despite SIRA staff efforts to assist them. Complex customer behaviour is any behaviour by a current or former customer which, because of the nature or frequency raises substantial health, safety, resource or equity issues for SIRA, its staff, other service users, other customers or the customer themselves. These behaviours are dealt with in accordance with SIRA's 'Managing complex customer behaviour policy'. This policy models the NSW Ombudsman's 'Managing unreasonable complainant conduct - a model policy and procedure'. Under certain circumstances, in accordance with that policy, SIRA may be required to restrict or terminate access to SIRA's customer service centre to manage a customer's behaviour.

Questions regarding the operations of icare should be referred to the Treasurer.

(8) See above answer to question 3.

(9) Questions regarding the Mining regulatory bodies, such as the Resources Regulator should be referred to the Minister for Resources.

SIRA works with injured workers, employers and workers compensation insurers to regulate workers compensation. This includes a range of claimant support, complaints management, insurer supervision, compliance and enforcement activities. icare has no regulator responsibility for workers compensation in New South Wales. Icare manages the Nominal Insurer and Treasury Managed Fund workers compensation insurance operations.

(1) In 2016 the Animal Welfare Advisory Council (AWAC) considered the effectiveness of Trap Neuter Release programs for cats.

The Natural Resources Commission (NRC) has also provided a comprehensive final report that outlines the significant risks posed by pest animals including feral cats. Earlier this year the Government released its response to the Natural Resources Commission state-wide review of pest animal management.

(2) AWAC unanimously did not support the use of trap-neuter-release (TNR) programs for reducing stray and unowned cat populations. TNR programs do not address the ongoing welfare of the individual cats, the cat colony, the cat population in the area or their impact on wildlife. The cats' ongoing welfare needs are not met, they can still carry and spread infectious diseases, continue to predate on wildlife and are a risk to other domestic animals. These programs only work in very specific circumstances in small communities.

Nation-wide there is considerable effort going into studying feral cat ecology in particular their home range under different landscapes, their population dynamics, their relationship with other pests and native species and how control efforts affect populations. Work is also being carried out to optimise how cat populations are measured which will help target control measures.

(3) New South Wales agencies will continue to liaise with the Centre for Invasive Species Solutions and other jurisdictions to progress research into monitoring and management tools for feral cats.

(4) and (5) Like all pest management, removing animals from a population is a long-term objective and takes an integrated and joint effort by all landholders to have a beneficial outcome for biodiversity.

(6) As per the Governments response to the NRC report, it is not necessary to list feral cats as a pest animal under the Biosecurity Act to effectively manage them. The Government will continue to identify feral cats as a key pest animal in policy documents, including the New South Wales Invasive Species Plan and the Saving or Species program. Office of Environment and Heritage will prioritise the management of feral cats for the conservation of threatened species across New South Wales. Regional Pest Animal Committees will also consider where feral cat management is required to meet the General Biosecurity Duty.

(7) The Department takes animal welfare seriously and the concerns raised around prioritising feral cats as pests would still require parties involved in the trapping or eradication, to ensure they take measures that do not contravene the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals Act 1979.
