 - (a) Legal costs paid to Global Renewables,
 - (b) All other cash settlement or reimbursement monies paid to Global Renewables following completion of the litigation,
 - (c) The increased dollar cost per tonne of waste processed agreed to be paid by the Government on all future waste processed by Global Renewables under their contract following the 2009 litigation,
 - (d) A forecast of what this additional cost will be over the remaining life of the 40 year PPP deal based on current volumes of waste being processed per annum.
 - (2) What was the justification for NSW Treasury providing two grants totalling \$5.25 million to Global Renewables in 2013 (\$250,000) and 2014/15 (\$5 million)?
 - (3) What information about the grants in (2) is publicly available?
