- *1215 HEALTH AND MEDICAL RESEARCH—HEALTH COSTS OF BRAND NEW WOODHEATERS IN NSW—Mr Primrose asked the Minister for Mental Health, Regional Youth and Women representing the Minister for Health and Medical Research—
 - (1) Is it the case that, according to the only available research on real-life emissions of wood heaters that satisfy the current New South Wales standard, real-life emissions averaged 6.5 grams/kg and that this is 8 times worse than the lab test results?
 - (2) Is it the case that, for a brand new wood heater with emissions well below the current New South Wales standard and current real-life emissions of 6.5 g/kg, estimated health costs in Sydney and regional towns such as Armidale are likely to exceed \$3,000 per heater per year?
 - (3) Is it the case that, according to New Zealand research, the installation of just one brand new wood heater per hectare, which satisfies the current New South Wales standards, increases the risk that a child under 3 will need hospital treatment by 7 per cent?
 - (4) Is it the case that, above a threshold of 4 ug/m3, hospital admissions for heart failure increased by 14.5% for a 5 ug/m3 increase in 3-day mean PM2.5 concentrations and when smoke from a brand new wood heater blows onto a neighbour's property, it is likely to increase PM2.5 concentrations by more 5 ug/m3?
 - (5) Is the Government currently doing anything to prevent the installation of wood heaters given the concerns raised in questions 1 to 4 above?:
 - (a) If not, does the government have a scientific bases for its current wood heater installation policy?
 - (b) Will the Government take action on this issue in cooperation with local government?
 - (6) Is it the case that according to the New South Wales Environmental Protection Authority (NSW EPA), in Sydney the contribution of wood smoke is highest in July, making up 75% of monthly PM2.5 particle pollution?
 - (7) Is it the case that according to a study published in 2020 and funded by the NSW EPA and the NSW Ministry of Health, wood heaters are the most important source of health-hazardous air pollution in Sydney's Greater Metropolitan Region (SGMR) and that wood heater pollution is linked to premature deaths?
 - (a) Does this study cite another study that used influenza infected mice and in which 21 per cent of the mice exposed to wood smoke died compared to 5 per cent of mice exposed to oil furnace fumes, and that the study found that wood smoke reduces the lungs ability to fight infection?
 - (8) Is it the case that that the authorities in British Columbia, Canada are advising against wood burning to help flatten the COVID-19 curve?
 - (a) If so, what are the reasons for not providing similar advice in New South Wales?
 - (b) What effect will the pollution caused by households burning wood during autumn and winter have on the rate of premature deaths in NSW in 2020?

- 1378 EDUCATION AND EARLY CHILDHOOD LEARNING—UNDER-PERFORMING SCHOOL PRINCIPLES—Mr Latham to ask the Minister for Education and Early Childhood Learning—
 - (1) Why did the head of Department of Education, Mr Scott, tell the Portfolio Committee No. 3 Budget Estimates hearing it is "far more common" for under-performing government school principals to demote themselves to less onerous positions inside schools than "run the gamut of (performance) reviews", when the data provided on notice to the committee subsequently showed that only four principals had either "relinquished pending retirement", "transferred" or been "demoted" in the four years between 2016 to 2019, compared to nine principals on performance plans/reviews?
 - (2) Given that by international standards New South Wales school results have declined significantly this century, what action is the Government taking to address the problem of under-performing principals?

 - (1) Are New South Wales government schools able to use their funding to place students in nongovernment after-school tutoring?
 - (2) If so, which schools have made these arrangements in recent years?
- 1381 EDUCATION AND EARLY CHILDHOOD LEARNING—USAGE OF NEW SOUTH WALES GOVERNMENT SCHOOL FINANCIAL SURPLUS—Mr Latham to ask the Minister for Education and Early Childhood Learning—
 - (1) As New South Wales government schools collectively had \$1.5 billion in their bank accounts as of 31 December 2020 and schools are now cheaper to run with students at home, thereby accumulating even greater surplus funds, what is the Government doing to ensure these unspent reserves are used on evidence-based learning programs aimed at achieving academic growth?
