\* 6670 EDUCATION AND EARLY CHILDHOOD LEARNING—SCHOOL HOURS—The Hon. Courtney Houssos to ask the Minister for Education and Early Childhood Learning—

- (1) How many New South Wales public schools currently operate outside regular school hours of approximately 9am – 3pm?
  - (a) Please provide a list of these schools?
    - (i) Please provide the start and finish times of these listed schools?
- (2) What modelling or research has the Department of Education conducted as part of the decision to trial new start and finish times for New South Wales public schools?

Answer—

The nominal “standard” operating hours for NSW public schools are 9.30am to 3.30pm for primary school and 9.00am to 3.30pm for high school. Principals retain the power to vary the existing school operating hours and do so in consultation with the school community.

In the first phase of the Maximising the School Day Trial project, the Department of Education will seek to strengthen its understanding of existing flexible practices already operating across the system. This work will inform the design of a trial in a small number of schools, which may include the provision of extra-curricular opportunities beyond standard school hours and variations to school operating hours.

Research from the Organisation for Economic Co-operation and Development, the Grattan Institute, and others links high-quality programs and learning opportunities run by schools outside of standard school hours with benefits to students’ learning and wellbeing, particularly for students from disadvantaged backgrounds.

\* 6671 EDUCATION AND EARLY CHILDHOOD LEARNING—HIGH RESOLVES PROGRAM—The Hon. Mark Latham to ask the Minister for Education and Early Childhood Learning—

- (1) I draw the Minister's attention to Section 30 of the New South Wales Education Act requiring ‘non-sectarian and secular instruction’ in our schools:
  - (a) Why is the High Resolves program run by the Baha’i Faith operating in dozens of New South Wales schools using an alternative curriculum based on political indoctrination encouraging students to dislike our society and the nation state - all part of the Baha’i Faith?
  - (b) Has this Baha’i alternative curriculum been approved by NSW Education Standards Authority (NESA)?
    - (i) If not, will the Minister now enforce Section 30 and remove the High Resolves program from our schools?

Answer—

High Resolves has been funded by the Australian Government to deliver workshops and teaching and learning resources in line with cultural and ethical understanding aspects of the national curriculum.

In the small number of NSW schools in which High Resolves workshops have occurred, they have been done as an additional Human Society and its Environment (HSIE) activity.

All schools in NSW deliver the NSW Curriculum.

\* 6672 TREASURER—HOTEL QUARANTINE DEBTS—The Hon. Rod Roberts to ask the Minister for Finance and Small Business representing the Treasurer—

- (1) What is the amount owed to the Government by New South Wales residents who have used the State’s hotel quarantine system?
  - (a) If there is a debt:
    - (i) What is the Government doing to ensure that this debt is repaid?

- (ii) When does the Government expect this debt to be repaid?

Answer—

This question is best directed to me as the minister responsible for Revenue NSW.

- (1) Revenue NSW is responsible for collecting quarantine fees from all those who have used the State's hotel quarantine system, regardless of State of residence.

As at 30 June 2021, a total amount of \$52.9 million was outstanding (including invoices not yet due) in hotel quarantine.

(a)

- (i) Revenue NSW approaches debt collection for hotel quarantine fees in the same way as other debt collection it manages for the NSW Government.

The debt collection strategy focuses on connecting with customers and helping to ensure they pay their notices on time. This includes using multiple channels of communication, including, post, email, sms and telephone calls, to remind customers of the outstanding amount due for payment, the methods for payment and the options available for cases of financial hardship.

Under the general process for issuing notices, customers have 30 days from the date of issue to pay the original invoice. If unpaid, a debt reminder notice will be issued providing an additional 21 days to finalise the debt.

If the debt still remains unpaid and no arrangement has been made with the customer, then a Debt Recovery Order will be issued and customers have a final 30 days to act.

If the debt is still unresolved after this 30 day period then further enforcement actions may be applied, including issuing a bank or wage garnishee order, a property seizure order, an examination summons, or a charge on land for property.

- (ii) Revenue NSW works with all customers to help ensure they pay in full by the due date. However, for those experiencing financial hardship, further assistance through extended payment arrangements is available.

“One issue that has emerged is incorrect scaling factors entered into the DQP Portal in NSW. Many instances of incorrect scaling factors have been reported by WaterNSW, which creates problems for them and the water entitlement holder as the record of water use can be very inaccurate. Fixing the issue is not easy and may result in extra costs.”

Regarding issues with scaling factors entered into the DQP Portal:
