- * 6861 WATER, PROPERTY AND HOUSING—DULY QUALIFIED PERSONS PORTAL AND SCALING FACTORS—Mr Justin Field to ask the Minister for Mental Health, Regional Youth and Women representing the Minister for Water, Property and Housing—
 - (1) In the recent Winter 2021 edition of Irrigation Australia's Journal (Vol 37, No 2, Page 40), Irrigation Australia's Water Metering Governance officer Peter Smith wrote that:

"One issue that has emerged is incorrect scaling factors entered into the DQP Portal in NSW. Many instances of incorrect scaling factors have been reported by WaterNSW, which creates problems for them and the water entitlement holder as the record of water use can be very inaccurate. Fixing the issue is not easy and may result in extra costs."

Regarding issues with scaling factors entered into the DQP Portal:

- (a) How many instances of incorrect scaling factors being entered in the DQP Portal has Water NSW identified since July 2018?
- (b) How many separate Duly Qualified Persons has Water NSW identified as having entered incorrect scaling factors into the DQP Portal since July 2018?
- (c) What impact has the input of incorrect scaling factors had upon the accuracy of water use data held by Water NSW?
- (d) What is the action taken by Water NSW to correct water use data records where an instance of incorrect scaling factors being entered into the DQP?
- (e) Given this input of incorrect scaling factors, is Water NSW confident in the accuracy of water use data from compliant non-urban water meters?
- (f) Has any action been taken by Water NSW against any DQPs regarding the inputting of incorrect scaling factors?
 - (i) If so, what actions have been taken?
 - (ii) How many DQPs have been subject to action?
- (g) Has Water NSW identified any other issues with the quality or integrity of the work or data provided by DQPs relating to non-urban water metering?

Answer—

(1)

- (a) Water NSW has identified 26 instances of incorrect scaling factors that have been entered in the DQP Portal since July 2018.
- (b) Out of the 26 instances, Water NSW has identified 8 separate DQPs that have entered incorrect scaling factors into the DQP Portal since July 2018.
- (c) Where Water NSW has identified incorrect scaling factors, the data does not enter the water accounting system until the issue has been resolved. Therefore, it has not impacted the accuracy of the water users' accounts.
- (d) Water NSW has taken following actions:
 - Incorrect scaling factor data has been quarantined; the data is corrected prior to billing.
 - Advised Irrigation Australia Limited (IAL), who is responsible for overseeing professional conduct of DQPs processes, of the issue.
 - Notifying all DQPs responsible for incorrect scaling factors.
 - Implementing additional compulsory online training program for DQP configuration of scaling factors.

- Customers will begin to receive an information pack once they have been registered through a DQP, which will explain the implications of the scaling factors and configuration requirements.
- Working with LID Manufacturers and DQPs to develop a process that allows the LID to be remotely configured with the correct scaling factor.
- (e) Water NSW is confident in the accuracy of water use data from compliant water meters.
- (f) Water NSW is not responsible for taking actions against DQPs, however it advises Irrigation Australia Ltd of any known issues. Irrigation Australia Ltd has been appointed by the NSW Government for overseeing the professional conduct of DQPs.
- (g) Water NSW has identified various minor issues associated with the implementation of new technologies within non-urban water metering, however these issues are progressively being addressed and will not affect the accuracy of a water users' account balances.

Water NSW is working with both Irrigation Australia Ltd and the Department of Planning, Industry and Environment to ensure the ongoing quality and integrity of the work provided by DQPs relating to non-urban water metering.

- * 6862 WATER, PROPERTY AND HOUSING—NSW GOVERNMENT RESPONSE TO OPERATION AVON AND MEZZO—Mr Justin Field to ask the Minister for Mental Health, Regional Youth and Women representing the Minister for Water, Property and Housing—
 - (1) In the Government's response to Recommendation 2 of the ICAC Report into Operation Avon and Mezzo regarding complaints of corruption in the management of water in NSW and systemic non-compliance with the Water Management Act 2000, the Government indicated that a new, dedicated team had been established to drive implementation of water sharing plans and other water policy including to "ensure that evaluation and future amendments of water sharing plans include an evaluation against the principles is Section 5 of the Water Management Act 2000.

The Government's response indicated a review of existing procedures and guidance documents against those requirements by the end of Q2 2021:

- (a) Has the dedicated Water Sharing Plan Implementation team completed this review that was due to be published by 31 July 2021?
- (b) When will the report be published?

Answer-

The Department's existing procedures and guidance documents for water sharing plan replacement and amendments were reviewed to ensure they reflect the relevant requirements of Section 5 of the *Water Management Act* 2000.

- * 6863 WATER, PROPERTY AND HOUSING—SECTION 233 EXEMPTIONS—Mr Justin Field to ask the Minister for Mental Health, Regional Youth and Women representing the Minister for Water, Property and Housing—
 - (1) On 14 July 2020 Irrigation Australia tweeted "there are situations where AS4747 meters are not available in larger sizes. We are aware of one CMI who has made ten S233 exemption applications on behalf of irrigators for high volume flow meters and 10 months later has not had a response.":
 - (a) How many S233 exemption applications for an individual authority holder have been received by the Minister since the Water Management (General) Regulation 2018 commenced?
 - (b) How many S233 exemptions have been granted for an individual authority holder since the Water Management (General) Regulation 2018 commenced?
 - (i) How many of these exemptions remain in effect?
 - (ii) What are these exemptions for?
 - (c) How many S233 exemption applications are currently before the Minister but decisions are yet to be made?

As at 21 July 2021, eighteen applications had been received for an exemption from the mandatory metering equipment condition under clause 233 of the Water Management (General) Regulation 2018.

One application has been granted and remains in effect. The exemption is for a regulator which was not able to meet the requirements for metering equipment to be validated every 12 months because the site only receives water every 2-3 years and water is required for validation to occur. The exemption is conditional on the approval holder using an alternative measurement method which meets specified requirements

Fifteen applications are currently before the Department for which decisions are yet to be made. The Department is working to assess these applications and make decisions.

I am advised:

The NSW Government is committed to ensuring the NSW Police Force has the support they need to protect our community from crime, and cybercrime is no exception.

In 2017, as part of the re-engineering of the NSW Police Force, a standalone Cybercrime Squad was launched to address the emergent threat of technology enabled crime. The NSW Police Force Cybercrime Squad is currently comprised of 62 sworn and 8 unsworn employees.

While the NSW Police Force Cybercrime Squad provides specialist assistance in relation to cyber enabled and cyber assisted crime in this State, police officers throughout this State manage investigations where computers and online networks have been used to enable and assist the commission of offences on a daily basis.

The NSW Police Force does not centrally record data relating to the number of incidents where the commission of an offence has been enabled or assisted by a computer or online network. State Crime Command receives and triages approximately 1,000 referrals per month in relation to cybercrime, many of which are sent to Police Area Commands and Police Districts for investigation. Over the past 18 months the Cybercrime Squad has charged 34 people for 510 offences.

The NSW Police Force does not undertake activity based costings, and accordingly does not record the cost of investigating, combating and solving cyber enabled and cyber assisted offences in this State.
