#### (Paper No. 616)

- \* 7725 PREVENTION OF DOMESTIC AND SEXUAL VIOLENCE—DOMESTIC VIOLENCE PROGRAMS—The Hon. Mark Latham to ask the Minister for Sport, Multiculturalism, Seniors and Veterans representing the Attorney General, and Minister for Prevention of Domestic and Sexual Violence—
  - (1) What are the various domestic violence programs funded by the New South Wales Government?
  - (2) How much does each program in question (1) above cost?
  - (3) For each domestic violence program:
    - (a) When were they last independently evaluated for their effectiveness?
    - (b) What did these evaluations show?

#### Answer-

#### I am advised:

The 2021-22 NSW Budget provides \$687 million over four years for domestic and family violence. In addition, in October 2021 the NSW Government announced it would invest an additional \$484.3 million, which includes:

- \$426.6 million over four years to expand Core and Cluster to deliver and operate around 75 extra women's refuges to support women and children escaping domestic and family violence (DFV).
- \$52.5 million over four years towards the Community Housing Innovation Fund partnership with the community housing sector, to provide approximately 200 sustainable, social and affordable housing dwellings for women experiencing DFV.
- \$5.2 million over four years, for a trial in two districts to provide dedicated supports for accompanied children and young people experiencing or at risk of homelessness, with a focus on children and young people impacted by DFV.

  - (1) For programs run inside prisons what are the various:
    - (a) Skill development programs funded by Corrective Services NSW?
    - (b) Rehabilitation programs funded by Corrective Services NSW?
  - (2) For programs run outside prisons what are the various:

- (a) Skill development programs funded by Corrective Services NSW?
- (b) Rehabilitation programs funded by Corrective Services NSW?
- (3) How much does each program in questions (1) and (2) above cost?

Answer-

(1)

(a) Corrective Services NSW (CSNSW) delivers a mixed model of education and training programs. Education and vocational training programs, other than those at the Intensive Learning Centres at Lithgow, Mid North Coast, South Coast and Wellington Correctional Centres, are delivered by external education service providers, BSI Learning and TAFE NSW.

The CSNSW education model includes assessment and planning activities ensure that inmates with the highest identified need for education and training participate in the right course at the right time during their sentence.

Intensive Learning Centres provide full time education programs for inmates with an identified need to develop foundations skills for participation in further education and employment programs.

BSI learning provides Foundation Skills Programs including language, literacy and numeracy, and digital literacy courses; and vocational training in hospitality, cleaning operations, business studies, traffic control, logistics and food services. TAFE NSW provides vocational training and workplace licences in construction, engineering, horticulture, agriculture, manufacturing, forestry and warehousing.

(b) CSNSW provides programs to inmates which target offending behaviour based on assessed risk of re-offending, and specific needs. This includes the EQUIPS suite of programs and other programs for sex offenders, violent offenders, and drug and alcohol abuse.

- (a) CSNSW vocational and skills development are delivered within correctional centres.
- (b) Community Corrections refers offenders to specific programs (for example, the CSNSW EQUIPS suite of behaviour-change programs, including EQUIPS Addiction and Foundation programs), as part of CSNSW's case management approach to addressing the criminogenic and reintegration needs of offenders.
- (3) The overall CSNSW Budget for 2021/22 is \$2.6 billion (\$2.2 billion recurrent and \$447 million capital). Services and programs are funded from this budget. Programs can be offered in more than one location (or at individual centres), and rates of staff and inmate participation can vary depending on the offender's needs.

Education and skills development programs delivered by CSNSW Services at the Intensive Learning Centres are provided by education staff, including teachers, employed by CSNSW. For the 2020/21 financial year \$6 million was allocated to fund the foundation and vocational education courses delivered by BSI Learning and TAFE NSW.

(4) CSNSW employs a research and evidence-based approach to its work. Evaluations are a regular part of this work. Completed studies and evaluations of programs offered by CSNSW are available from a range of sources, including the websites of the Bureau of Crime Statistics and Research (BOCSAR), and CSNSW (Corrections Research Evaluation & Statistics) and the Department of Communities and Justice Annual Reports.

- \* 7727 ENERGY AND ENVIRONMENT—NATIONAL PARKS PURCHASES—The Hon. Mark Banasiak to ask the Special Minister of State, and Minister for the Public Service and Employee Relations, Aboriginal Affairs, and the Arts representing the Treasurer, and Minister for Energy and Environment—
  - (1) Can the Minister provide information regarding the price NSW National Parks and/or the Department has paid for each of the properties it is has acquired under its plan to expand the National Parks landholdings?
    - (a) Was the amount paid at or above market rate for this land?
    - (b) Did NSW National Parks and/or the Department set an upper limit for how much it was prepared to pay for these properties or was it a blank cheque?
    - (c) Is any consideration given to bids from farmers for these properties?
  - (2) What economic modelling does NSW National Parks and/or the Department undertake before purchasing pastoral properties?
    - (a) Does this modelling take into consideration the economic impact on surrounding towns from the removal of agricultural jobs both on farm and in associated industries?
      - (i) If not, why not?
  - (3) Did NSW National Parks and/or the Department consider alternate conservation programs to manage the areas they consider to be ecologically significant?
    - (a) If so, what were these alternate programs and why was the decision made to not implement them over purchasing the properties at significant cost?
  - (4) Why didn't NSW National Parks and/or the Department pursue an arrangement in line with the successful Enterprise Based Conservation program?
  - (5) How does NSW National Parks and/or the Department intend on filling the economic gap in communities left by the removal of these properties from productive farming, noting that some modelling puts this economic contribution at \$500,000 per property annually?
  - (6) Given the significant increase in land now managed by NSW National Parks in the western division will there be an increase in resources allocated to National Parks offices in this region?

#### Answer-

- (1) The National Parks and Wildlife Service does not comment on commercial-in confidence matters.
  - (a) Each acquisition is informed by independent valuation advice.
  - (b) An upper limit is set after considering independent valuation advice and an assessment of conservation values.
  - (c) NPWS purchases property by agreement from willing sellers.
- (2) National parks make a vitally important contribution to regional economies and the NSW economy as a whole. The most recent data (2018) indicates the national parks system across NSW attracts more than 60 million visits and contributes \$17.9 billion in economic activity annually. It supports more than 74,000 direct and indirect jobs. Across the Barwon electorate, for example, the 2018 data indicated national parks, and the visitation they attract, supports over 5000 jobs and generates more than \$580 million in economic activity annually.
- (3) The NSW Government has a range of conservation programs across numerous agencies including NPWS, the Biodiversity Conservation Trust and Departmental programs (such as Saving our Species). Acquisition of land for addition to the national park estate is informed by a range of factors including the level of reservation in the relevant region and the presence of threatened species and other environmental values.
- (4) Recent acquisitions of land have occurred in regions where the proportion of land reserved in national parks is very low typically 3-5 per cent.

(5) See response to question 2. National parks make an enormous contribution to regional economies and the State economy. In relation to the new acquisitions, the NSW Government will make substantial investments in visitor infrastructure to ensure these new parks support visitors to the region and help grow local economies.

Across western NSW in 2020–21, more than 47,000 people spent over 134,000 visitor nights in national park campgrounds and accommodation.

(6) Yes – there has been an increase in resources. Additional staff have been added to support the management of Narriearra, Metford-Langidoon and Koonaburra. Total staffing levels at NPWS are higher than at any other time in the history of the organisation. The level of required resources for NPWS is kept under ongoing review.
