\* 6574 PFIZER VACCINES—Ms Jenny Aitchison to ask the Minister for Health and Medical Research—

- (1) How many doses of the Pfizer vaccine has NSW Health received from the Commonwealth Government?
  - (a) How many of these were allocated to the Hunter Region?
- (2) How many Pfizer Vaccines were redirected from the Hunter to vaccinate Year 12 students and priority areas in the Greater Sydney Region?
  - (a) How many bookings at the Belmont Vaccination Centre were:
    - (i) Cancelled as a result of this?
    - (ii) Re-instated after being cancelled?
  - (b) What was the average delay in receiving the doses for those people who had their doses redirected to Sydney?

Answer—

Since the commencement of the COVID-19 Vaccination Program, the Commonwealth Government has provided NSW Health with a total of 4,354,040 Pfizer vaccine doses. A total of 320,580 Pfizer vaccine doses have been provided to NSW Health COVID-19 Vaccination Clinics in the Hunter New England Local Health District.

The Commonwealth Government has also provided Pfizer vaccine supplies to the Hunter through services including GPs, Pharmacists, Commonwealth Respiratory Clinics and Aboriginal Controlled Health Organisations.

The Commonwealth Government provided NSW Health with additional Pfizer vaccines to ensure all regional NSW Health COVID-19 Vaccination Clinics received their initial Pfizer allocation that was redirected to vaccinate year 12 students and priority areas in the Greater Sydney Region.

18,343 people in the Hunter region received an SMS advising of the need to reschedule their vaccination appointment, which was followed up with another SMS that included a new booking code for people to rebook their appointments.

\* 6576 SCHOOL COUNSELLORS IN MAITLAND SCHOOLS—Ms Jenny Aitchison to ask the Minister for Skills and Tertiary Education representing the Minister for Education and Early Childhood Learning—

- (1) How many school counsellors are employed in Maitland electorate state schools?
- (2) How many extra school counsellors were employed in Maitland electorate state schools during:
  - (a) The 2020 lockdown?
  - (b) The 2021 lockdown?

Answer—

- (1) All New South Wales public schools receive a school counselling service allocation. While school counselling positions are established in a base school, they may also provide an allocation of counselling service to more than one school, and provide service across more than one electorate. The total allocation for public schools in the Maitland electorate is 10.55 FTE. This service is supported by 12.50 FTE school counselling service positions.
- (2) School counselling staff are part of a network of over 2,000 dedicated staff providing wellbeing support in New South Wales public schools, which includes student support officers, Wellbeing Nurses, Behaviour Specialists and Chaplains. These roles work collaboratively with learning and support teams, parents, caregivers and other agencies to provide timely mental health support for students.
- (3) The Department of Education's school counselling service is available to provide support for students in New South Wales public schools. Information on the support provided by Independent and Catholic Schools is not held by the Department.
- (4) School counselling and wellbeing staff will continue to work together to provide mental health and wellbeing support for students in New South Wales public schools as they return to school following the learning from home period.

\* 6577 INTENSIVE LEARNING CATCH-UP PROGRAM IN MAITLAND—Ms Jenny Aitchison to ask the Minister for Skills and Tertiary Education representing the Minister for Education and Early Childhood Learning—

Answer—

On 18 October 2021, the Government made a major funding commitment of \$383 million to extend the COVID Intensive Learning Support Program for all public schools and select Catholic and Independent schools across the State, including in the Maitland electorate, for the 2022 school year.

\* 6578 GILLIESTON PUBLIC SCHOOL—Ms Jenny Aitchison to ask the Minister for Skills and Tertiary Education representing the Minister for Education and Early Childhood Learning—

Answer—

At present, there are no plans to upgrade Gillieston Public School. Upgrades have been completed at Rutherford Public School and Bolwarra Public School, and an upgrade is underway at Ashtonfield Public School to further support enrolment needs within the local area.

Numerous strategies are used to manage fluctuating enrolment demands in the short to medium term, including reviewing school intake areas to improve utilisation across schools in a local area and installing demountable classrooms, as appropriate.

\* 6579 SANITARY MEASURES IN MAITLAND SCHOOLS—Ms Jenny Aitchison to ask the Minister for Skills and Tertiary Education representing the Minister for Education and Early Childhood Learning—

Answer—

- (a) In Week 1, Term 3 2021, all Government schools received a package of key hygiene items and an additional dispatch of masks was organised the following week. An additional HSC Care Pack has been distributed to all Government high schools, containing masks, hand sanitiser, disinfectant wipes, face shields and gloves.

Schools can place business as usual orders via the Department of Education's COVID-19 supplies catalogue for any ongoing needs beyond Department organised bulk dispatches. All Government schools have ongoing access to hygiene supplies. Key hygiene items are free of charge.

- (b) The Department provided hygiene and personal protective equipment (PPE) supplies to the non-government school sector throughout Term 1 and 2, 2020, given supply constraints at that time.

From Term 3, 2020, the Department has no longer regularly supplied hygiene or PPE supplies to the non-government school sector. The department will continue to work closely with the sector as or if need arises.

Due to COVID-19 restrictions impacting recruitment and training activities, Service NSW was limited in preparing to recover this service. Service NSW is now actively recruiting new driver testers (up to 100 additional) to better meet the high demand for tests.

\* 6584 REFUGE FUNDING FOR WOMEN—Ms Jenny Aitchison to ask the Minister for Health and Medical Research representing the Minister for Mental Health, Regional Youth and Women—

Answer—

On 19 October 2021, the Government announced a historic new investment of \$484.3 million over four years for housing and specialist supports for women and children experiencing domestic and family violence. This includes \$426.6 million over four years to expand Core and Cluster across New South Wales.

The locations of the new refuges will be targeted to areas where there is high unmet demand, with a focus on regional and rural areas.

The Department of Communities and Justice will employ a range of different delivery approaches including use of Government and non-Government owned land, and working with community housing providers, specialist homelessness services and other organisations to deliver the refuges.

Construction of the new refuges will commence in 2022-23 and will be phased across the four years.

Answer—

I am advised:

The NSW Land and Housing Corporation is continually reviewing the State's portfolio of social housing assets to identify opportunities to deliver more and better housing throughout New South Wales.

In regard to Aboriginal Housing, \$40 million out of the \$183 million social housing package announced relates to Aboriginal Housing Office social housing programs, consisting of:

- \$20 million for new and upgraded social and affordable homes in partnership with Aboriginal Community Housing Providers (ACHPs) through the Aboriginal Community Housing Investment Fund (ACHIF). This is made up of applications received from an open tender process across New South Wales as part of the previous Stimulus announcement.
- \$20 million for about 45 new homes for large Aboriginal families to support kinship living and reduce overcrowding, aligned with Closing the Gap targets so more families live in appropriately sized homes.

- At this stage, the announced programs above do not include areas in the Maitland Electorate. Maitland and the wider Hunter Region is however an ongoing area of focus for investment in new housing supply from existing programs delivered by the AHO. The AHO has recently completed two new dwellings in Woodberry and eight dwellings in Wallsend. Work is meanwhile underway on a further four homes across Cessnock and Raymond Terrace.

\* 6591 CLEANING HOURS IN SCHOOLS—Mr Clayton Barr to ask the Minister for Skills and Tertiary Education representing the Minister for Education and Early Childhood Learning—

- (1) Of the 480 schools which are to have their cleaning hours reduced in line with the provisions of the 2019 whole of Government cleaning contracts as advised by the Department of Education in a letter to schools in the past 2 months:

Answer—

The Department of Education administers cleaning contracts in line with the provisions of the NSW Whole-of-Government cleaning contracts.

In March 2019, the contract commenced across all New South Wales public schools. The new contract is designed to be more equitable for all schools while still incorporating the same rigorous cleaning standards.

Included in the tender process was an assessment of the number of hours per week required at each school, to meet Department cleaning standards and benchmarks. As a result, a small proportion of schools were found to have an excess of cleaning hours in place. To ensure a smooth transition to the new arrangements, previous contract cleaning hours were maintained at these schools until the end of 2019. The reduction in excess hours was implemented progressively over 2020 and Term 1, 2021. The project closed following a request from the Wilcannia Local Aboriginal Land Council Board of Directors to not continue with the current scope of the project due to the inequity of the pilot. The Board requested the remaining project funds be spent on basic improvements across all of their housing stock ensuring benefits for the whole of the Aboriginal community.

- (2) See answer to question 1 above.

- (3) Over recent years the AHO has been working with the Wilcannia community and partner agencies across DPIE to deliver new housing supply in Wilcannia. Work currently underway will see the AHO deliver eight new dwellings by June 2023. The new homes being delivered include both smaller units and larger family homes with the issue of overcrowding being addressed through the provision of a greater range of housing types in Wilcannia.

In 2020 the AHO acquired the former Police Barracks in Wilcannia and work is underway to redevelop the buildings to provide 5 x 1.5 bedroom homes targeted at Elders. Following a community consultation process, development approval was obtained in June 2021 for a scheme that will provide fully accessible, open plan units each with access to private and shared outdoor living spaces. The AHO is currently procuring a construction partner to undertake the works with

project completion expected by June 2022. Smaller homes will allow those living in overcrowded homes to move into housing independence if wanted.

The AHO will also deliver 3 x 5-bedroom family homes in Wilcannia suitable for multi-generational households. These homes will be designed to support multi-generational families and will feature large living and kitchen areas. As with all AHO new supply, the homes will be designed to be appropriate to the climate zone of Far West New South Wales to ensure tenant comfort. These three homes will be delivered through the recent Economic Recovery funding with completion expected by June 2023.

In addition to the above, as part of the AHO's Aboriginal Community Housing Investment Fund (ACHIF) Stimulus program, a funding amount of \$1.29 million was also agreed with Wilcannia LALC for various improvements and upgrades work to 60 properties which will be completed in 2021/22.

Construction of the new refuges will commence in 2022-23 and will be phased across four years.

Accordingly, the Department does not have fixed enrolment capacities at New South Wales public schools. The Waste Levy provides an incentive to reduce the amount of waste generated and encourages legitimate alternatives to landfill disposal.

The Waste Levy currently applies in the regulated area of New South Wales made up of the metropolitan levy area (Sydney, Illawarra and Hunter regions) and the regional levy area (Blue Mountains, Wollondilly and the LGAs north of Port Stephens to the Queensland border).

The NSW Waste and Sustainable Materials Strategy 2041, released in June 2021, commits the Government to undertake five-yearly reviews of the operation of the Waste Levy to ensure it is continuing to achieve its policy objectives, in line with recommendations made by the Auditor-General. The process will include a review of the Waste Levy area boundaries. This work will commence from 2022 onwards with consultation on the review framework, including the timing and scope of the new five-yearly review.

\* 6629 REGIONAL ROADS TRANSFER TO STATE OWNERSHIP—Ms Janelle Saffin to ask the Deputy Premier, Minister for Regional Transport and Roads, and Minister for Regional New South Wales—

The Government is delivering a \$100 million air quality assurance program to support ongoing improvements to air quality in New South Wales schools.

The Department of Education's approach to ventilation in schools is strongly supported by expert advice. The vast majority of spaces in schools are adequately ventilated through natural and mechanically assisted ventilation.

Air purification is only recommended where air quality is compromised by bush fire smoke or where natural ventilation cannot be achieved. The department will provide air purifiers to schools as required.

The department is supporting schools to adapt lessons and make full use of all school facilities, including outdoor learning areas.

There are over 8,500 COLAs and shade structures in Government schools, with 368 COLAs and shade structure projects completed in the past 2 years.

There is a comprehensive range of measures in place, including the staggered return of students, vaccinations of all school staff, servicing and cleaning of air conditioning systems, outdoor teaching, use of masks, additional hygiene supplies and enhanced cleaning.

Schools continue to be provided with updated advice and support on a range of infection control and hygiene measures, as well as a stock of hand sanitiser and supplies of personal protective equipment.

Transport for NSW is planning to install a connected rail level crossing on the Princes Highway at Unanderra south of Wollongong. The crossing is one of the busiest rail level crossings on the South Coast line. The crossing will use dedicated short-range communications (DSRC) technology as well as cloud-based connectivity. About 20 buses from Premier Illawarra will be equipped with DSRC devices that will warn them when the rail level crossing is active and a train is approaching.

Development of a connected rail level crossing on the Princes Highway at Unanderra commenced in January 2021. Physical construction on the site commenced in June 2021. COVID-19 restrictions have impacted the ability of the team to access the physical site since June, but work has continued on the development of the software and hardware needed for the crossing. The equipment is expected to be commissioned for operation by the end of February 2022.

Many of these level crossings are on local roads maintained by Wollongong City Council. Transport for NSW regularly engages with Wollongong City Council, and concerns about these level crossings have not been raised.

Service NSW has sent frequent emails with detailed information on all matters related to COVID-19 to all New South Wales businesses registered on the Australian Business Register (ABR) which had provided an email address to the ABR (unless the business had chosen to unsubscribe from these emails).

Topics of these emails included "The First Steps out of Lockdown" sent on 19 September 2021; "Get your Business Ready to Reopen" sent on 4 October 2021; "Reopening Roadmap and Proof of Vaccination Resources" on 9 October 2021; and "Easing of restrictions from Monday 18 October" on 17 October 2021.

As at 18 November 2021, the Government has provided a total of over \$232 million in grants for 14,034 approved applications from businesses in the Fairfield LGA including:

- \$68,947,500 for 5,651 applications for the 2021 COVID-19 Business Grants;
- \$23,193,000 for 2,277 applications for the 2021 Micro-Business Grants; and
- \$140.613.433 for 6,106 applications for JobSaver.

Payments of JobSaver and the Micro-Business Grant continued after the lifting of COVID-19 restrictions from 11 October 2021 and will end on 30 November 2021. Continued payments are available to those eligible businesses who continue to experience a 30% decline in turnover for the relevant fortnight.

These payments may be used, among other things, for activities associated with re-opening safely including marketing and communications; financial, legal and other advice; and other business costs.

A new Summer Holiday Stock Guarantee of up to \$20,000 will also give businesses confidence to re-open safely. The Guarantee will be available to retail and hospitality businesses to cover loss of perishable stock or reduced capacity to sell non-perishable stock, if they are impacted by a lockdown between 1 December 2021 and 31 January 2022.

Small businesses in Fairfield electorate can access free business advice on all aspects of conducting their business in the current challenging times from Business Connect through participation in webinars, face to face events and free one-on-one advice.

Specific upcoming events include a webinar on How To Start a Business presented by the Western Sydney Business Centre on 7 December 2021 and a face to face event for Arabic speakers in Fairfield on Embedding resilience.

The Government has committed \$1.8 million to continue the small business rebate program that supports businesses to purchase and install safety equipment. The \$500 rebate can be used towards a wide variety of items and equipment to make workplaces healthier and safer, including the following items made eligible to support business hygiene measures during COVID-19:

- Portable hand sanitiser stations
- Fixed hand sanitiser stations
- Fixed disinfectant wipes dispenser

- Expanding the small business rebate for Government fees and charges to help reduce the costs of establishing or running a small business, with the cap increased from \$1,500 to \$2,000 and the scheme now including relief for toll charges;
- Expanding the Dine & Discover voucher program to support New South Wales residents to get 'out and about' with an additional two \$25 vouchers for all New South Wales adults to redeem at eligible businesses across New South Wales;
- A new Alfresco Restart Package that includes a raft of initiatives to provide more and better activated public spaces to maximise capacity for hospitality businesses;
- Continuing Business Connect, allowing more businesses to access advice on navigating the challenges of COVID-19; and
- Expanding the SafeWork small business rebate program and providing up to \$500 to support small business owners and sole traders that buy and install safety equipment. 2

The Government has also announced the new WestInvest Fund, a \$5 billion fund for projects that will create jobs, fast-track economic recovery and improve quality of life for the residents of Western Sydney. The fund includes:

- \$426.6 million over four years to expand Core and Cluster to deliver and operate around 75 extra women's refuges that support women and children escaping DFV.

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- \$52.5 million over four years towards the Community Housing Innovation Fund (CHIF) partnership with the community housing sector, to provide approximately 200 social and affordable homes for women experiencing DFV.
- \$5.2 million over four years for a trial in two districts to provide dedicated supports for accompanied children and young people experiencing or at risk of homelessness, with a focus on children and young people impacted by DFV.

In addition, the Government has funded a range of initiatives across New South Wales, including the Fairfield electorate, to ensure people experiencing DFV were supported during the 2021 COVID-19 restrictions. These include:

- The COVID-19 Partnership Support Grant, which provides funds to selected nongovernment organisations across the 12 LGAs of concern, including Fairfield and Cumberland. A number of organisations in the Fairfield electorate will receive funds under this program. Details are available at:

- SHS funding supports the operation of five women's refuges in the South Western Sydney district that deliver women's only crisis accommodation. This includes refuges operating from Government-owned properties and non-Government or privately-owned properties.
- Bonnie Support Services Ltd operates in Fairfield and receives Domestic Violence Response Enhancement funding to enable greater capacity to strengthen their after-hours services to support women, with or without children who are homeless or at risk due to DFV.

- Additionally, the Government funds the Staying Home Leaving Violence program in the Fairfield area, as well as the South West Sydney Legal Centre to provide the Women's Domestic Violence Court Advocacy Service.

- South West Sydney Legal Centre Inc. which provides case coordination, case management, and services for women and children including educational activities, under the Staying Home Leaving Violence program and the Women's Domestic Violence Court Advocacy Program. Many of their clients are from culturally and linguistically diverse backgrounds.
- CORE Community Services Limited which provides women and their children with emotional and practical support to recover from domestic and family violence under the Integrated Domestic and Family Violence Services program. CORE Multicultural Services provides support to people from diverse backgrounds. During COVID-19, the Government has funded the following initiatives to support organisations to assist women and children impacted by domestic violence in New South Wales, including in the Fairfield electorate:
