- \* 6671 PROJECT MANAGEMENT TENDER—Mr Roy Butler to ask the Minister for Skills and Tertiary Education representing the Minister for Education and Early Childhood Learning—
  - (1) Has the tender for Project Management of the new Wee Waa High School gone out to market?
    - (a) If so, what was the tendering process?
    - (b) If not, what will the tendering process be and when will it commence?

Answer-

Yes. A Project Manager has been appointed in accordance with the Government's competitive tender and regulatory approval process.

\* 6672 LOCAL LAND SERVICES—Mr Roy Butler to ask the Minister for Agriculture and Western New South Wales—

- (1) What is the annual Aboriginal Cultural Heritage budget for Local Land Services?
- (2) How does Local Land Services engage with communities and make decisions on this expenditure?

Answer—

- (1) The Aboriginal Cultural and Community Engagement budget for 2022 is \$3.4m. This includes all Local Land Services Regions work on Aboriginal Cultural and Community Engagement and the Strategy and Engagement group.
- (2) Local Land Services has an Aboriginal Engagement Strategy that outlines the key priorities for expenditure on Aboriginal cultural heritage. Most Local Land Services regions have an Aboriginal Community Advisory Group (ACAG) who provide advice to the Local Boards on key priorities for expenditure in line with the Strategy.
- \* 6673 GENERAL PRACTITIONERS IN COOLAH—Mr Roy Butler to ask the Minister for Health and Medical Research—
  - (1) Has the provision of General Practitioner services to Coolah and therefore a Visiting Medical Officer to the hospital been problematic for two years now?
  - (2) Is there currently no General Practitioner and Telehealth providing the hospital coverage?
  - (3) What Measures will be taken to rectify this situation and ensure the people of Coolah are provided with access to a General Practitioner locally and the hospital has in person medical coverage?

#### Answer—

- (1) No.
- (2) In conjunction with the Virtual Rural Generalist Service, a locum doctor provided 24 hour, seven days a week medical service to the Coolah Multipurpose Service (MPS) from 17 November 2021. The District continues to advertise for locums and permanent doctors.
- (3) Brenshaw Medical Pty Ltd will continue to provide medical services. The District will also continue to advertise for locums and permanent doctors.

\* 6674 WINE CENTRE AT THE GRIFFITH TAFE—Mrs Helen Dalton to ask the Minister for Skills and Tertiary Education—

When will TAFE NSW deliver on its commitment to establish a Wine Centre at the Griffith TAFE?

Answer—

I am advised TAFE NSW Griffith has a Food and Wine Technology Centre delivering programs both on campus and in the workforce to meet the training needs of the wine and food industry. I understand TAFE NSW also regularly engages with local industry leaders and will host a Wine and Food industry forum on 28 January 2022 at the Griffith Campus to ensure that training continues to meet industry need into the future.

- \* 6675 FUNDING FOR BRIDGE UPGRADES—Mrs Helen Dalton to ask the Deputy Premier, Minister for Regional Transport and Roads, and Minister for Regional New South Wales—
  - (1) Considering the Fixing Country Bridges program only applies to timber bridges, what funding sources are available to regional Local Government Areas (LGA) to upgrade the many aging concrete bridges and culverts across the state?
    - (a) How can this funding (if any) be accessed in a timely way?
    - (b) How can resource-poor rural LGAs, who struggle with competitive grant-writing, ensure their concrete bridges and culverts get the funds and attention they need?

#### Answer—

I am advised:

- (1) There are both New South Wales and Commonwealth Government programs that councils may apply for funding. The relevant New South Wales Government programs are the Regional Road REPAIR Program and Fixing Country Roads. The relevant Commonwealth Government programs are the Bridges Renewal Program and the Heavy Vehicle Safety and Productivity Program.
  - (a) Under the Regional Roads REPAIR program, councils nominate projects directly to Transport for NSW. Funding rounds are conducted on a yearly basis. Eligible local councils will be notified when the next round of the Fixing Country Roads program opens.

The Bridges Renewal Program and the Heavy Vehicle Safety and Productivity Program run in parallel so applicants can access the right program for the right project at the right time. The Commonwealth Government considers projects on an ongoing basis with applications accepted all year round to provide increased flexibility and permit projects to be submitted when they will be of most benefit.

(b) Transport for NSW encourages councils to work with its local Government representatives to ensure applications meet guidelines and address all relevant criteria. Transport for NSW offers further support through guidelines and training packages to assist councils during grant submissions.

- \* 6676 DENILIQUIN AND NARRANDERA TAFES—Mrs Helen Dalton to ask the Minister for Skills and Tertiary Education—
  - (1) Will the Government sell off buildings and facilities at Deniliquin TAFE and Narrandera TAFE?
    - (a) If so, which specific building and facilities will be sold?
    - (b) Will practical courses like automotive repair continue to be taught to local students?

- (c) If students need to travel or relocate to bigger centres to get a practical education, what contribution will the Government make to their travel and living costs?
- (2) What programs does the Government have in place to attract much-needed skilled workers back to small centres like Deniliquin and Narrandera if they are trained elsewhere?

I am advised:

TAFE NSW has recommended part of the TAFE NSW Deniliquin site that has not been used for service delivery in over three years, be divested so that proceeds can be reinvested back into TAFE NSW facilities. To date, there has been no approval granted for this divestment to proceed.

Narrandera TAFE Campus continues to be operational and there are no plans to divest any part of this site.

TAFE NSW has offered qualifications such as the Certificate IV in Ageing Support and the Diploma of Youth Work at the Narrandera CLC, as well as a range of other qualifications.

I am further informed that since opening, the Deniliquin CLC has offered qualifications at Certificate IV or Diploma level in areas including Ageing Support, Youth Work and Mental Health.

TAFE NSW will continue to train local students in practical courses, supported by Mobile Training Units where required.

- (1) NSW Health's online Suicide Monitoring System indicates that information collated includes residential location of suicide victims. For locations of suicide deaths outside of metropolitan Sydney, Blue Mountains and Central Coast it is classified as Rest of NSW, which includes the Level 4 Statistical Areas of Richmond - Tweed, Coffs Harbour, Grafton, Mid North Coast, Newcastle and Lake Macquarie, Hunter Valley, New England and North West, Central West, Far West and Orana, Murray, Riverina, Capital Region, Illawarra, Southern Highlands and Shoalhaven. Why is viewable suicide data in monthly summaries for Rest of NSW not broken down into each Level 4 Statistical Area?
  - (a) Will you update the Suicide Monitoring System monthly summaries to show the data for each Level 4 Statistical Area?

Answer—

I am advised:

The NSW Suicide Monitoring System provides high-level data that is consistent with that issued by other States. Further data around age and gender will be incorporated from 1 January 2022.

Suicide registers do not typically publish data on individual months for small areas. Statistical areas often only have one suicide. Where numbers are low, there is a risk of inadvertently identifying individuals prior to the Coroner making its findings on cause and manner of death.

Further, reliable comparison or monitoring of trends requires averaging data over one or more years to avoid inaccurate conclusions.

- \* 6678 SHORT TERM RENTAL ACCOMMODATION PLATFORM OBLIGATIONS—Mr Alex Greenwich to ask the Minister for Planning and Public Spaces, and Minister for Transport and Roads—
  - (1) With commencement of the new state-wide policy for Short Term Rental Accommodation (STRA) having commenced on 1 November:
    - (a) Which platforms has the Government entered into a memorandum of understanding with about their obligations set out in the Code of Conduct?

- (b) What is the scope of the memorandums, what precisely do they include?
- (c) Who has access to these memorandums?
- (d) Why are these memorandums not public?
- (e) How will the Government ensure that platforms do not "list" any properties that have not registered on the STRA Register?
- (f) How will the Government ensure that premises that are subject to a "No STR" By-Law or Development Consent Condition or Term of a Lease that prohibit STRA are not included in the STRA Premises Register?
- (g) How will the Government ensure there is extensive public awareness of the requirement to have premises registered or will the Government rely entirely on the platforms to provide this public education?
- (h) What resources have been set aside for enforcement of the new policy?
- (i) What penalties will be used for non-compliance?
- (j) What information will be publicly available about breaches?
- (k) Has the Government entered any formal or informal agreement or understanding with the industry that unregistered properties can continue to be advertised but no booking taken until the premises is registered?

I am advised:

- (a) The Government has not entered into a memorandum of understanding with platforms. The obligations set out in the Code of Conduct are statutory requirements under the Fair Trading Act 1987.
- (b) The scope of requirements is set out in the Code of Conduct.
- (c) The Code of Conduct is a public document.
- (d) The Code of Conduct is a public document.
- (e) Under the Code of Conduct, booking platforms must not list a property unless the host provides a Property Identification Number (PID) issued by the Premises Register. The PID number is validated against the Premises Register database to ensure it is the correct number for the property. Booking platforms that are found to be listing an unregistered property could face a fine of up to \$110,000.
- (f) Under the State Environmental Planning Policy (Housing) 2021, it is an obligation of the host to be aware of any restrictions imposed by the Strata Schemes Management Act 2015 or any conditions of development consent.
- (g) The Government has undertaken an extensive public awareness campaign including advertising on the domain.com.au website, social media and local radio stations across New South Wales.
- (h) Local council A local council can be contacted with issues or complaints relating to fire safety (including overcrowding), planning approvals, parking or ongoing noise.

NSW Police - The NSW Police can be contacted if the issue relates to an urgent noise issue.

NSW Fair Trading - Where there has been a proven contravention of other laws (for example enforcement action by local council, a finding in court or tribunal) evidence can be provided to NSW Fair Trading to take further action under the provisions of the Code of Conduct. If NSW Fair Trading receives complaints that are best managed by the local council in the first

instance, it will either refer the matter to the relevant council or instruct the complainant to lodge their matter directly with the council. Fair Trading has adequate staffing levels to meet the needs of the Code of Conduct.

- \* 6679 SHORT TERM RENTAL ACCOMMODATION PLATFORM OBLIGATIONS—Mr Alex Greenwich to ask the Minister for Planning and Public Spaces, and Minister for Transport and Roads—

#### Answer-

(1)

- (a) Under the Code of Conduct, bookings platforms must not list a property unless the host provides a Property Identification Number (PID) issued by the Premises Register. The PID number is validated against the Premises Register database to ensure it is the correct number for the property. Booking platforms that are found to be listing an unregistered property could face a fine of up to \$110,000.
- (b) The Government has been working to raise awareness since the policy was announced in 2018, including working with councils, platforms as well as digital and broadcast advertising on the across New South Wales. This campaign is still ongoing.
- (c) Councils, Police, NSW Fair Trading and the Department of Planning, Industry and Environment will all play a role in ensuring that hosts are registered and are adhering to the Code of Conduct and making sure guests are adhering to the rules.
- (d) Unregistered properties that are found to be engaging in Short Term Rental Accommodation (STRA) could face a fine of up to \$2,200.
- (e) An exclusion register has been established under the Code of Conduct. Access to the exclusion register will be available on the NSW Fair Trading website.
- (f) No. Booking platforms automatically de-list any properties that are not registered.

\* 6680 VACCINATION DATA—Mr Alex Greenwich to ask the Minister for Health and Medical Research—

- (1) Is it true that vaccination data shows some areas with unusually low rates and others completely vaccinated or more?
- (2) What assessment has the Government made of the accuracy and relevance of the Australian Bureau of Statistics Estimated Resident Population 2019 estimates used to calculate New South Wales vaccination rates?
- (3) How has the Government assessed the impact on inner city Sydney population estimates for vaccination of:
  - (a) International border restrictions reducing visitors?
  - (b) Absence of tourists and travellers?
  - (c) Loss of international students?
  - (d) Remote learning for university students?
  - (e) Remote work rules?
  - (f) Movement away from expensive rental areas due to job losses and lost earnings?
- (4) What adjustments have been made to account for population losses due to the pandemic, as has occurred in other cities including Melbourne?
- (5) How has the Government ensured that City of Sydney and inner city postcode population data used to calculate vaccination rates reflect changes in population due to the pandemic?
- (6) What further action will the Government take to improve data accuracy in calculating vaccination rates?

#### Answer—

The Australian Government Department of Health is responsible for public reporting of statistics relating to the Australian Immunisation Register.

NSW Health has alerted the Australian Government Department of Health to anomalies in the data in a number of locations across New South Wales. There are several contributing factors to this data discrepancy, including some of the factors mentioned in the Member's question. NSW Health is working closely with the Australian Government Department of Health to identify and manage these anomalies.

- \* 6681 SMALL TOURISM OPERATORS—Mr Alex Greenwich to ask the Minister for Jobs, Investment, Tourism and Western Sydney, and Minister for Industry and Trade—
  - (1) Considering the long term impacts of pandemic restrictions on tourism and travel, what assessment has the Government carried out into impacts on small tourism operators such as hotels and tour guides, including those based in the city centre?
    - (a) What outreach efforts has the Government made to operators and industry representatives to understand these impacts and identify where help is most needed?
    - (b) What support programs and financial support does the Government provide specifically for these small tourism operators?
    - (c) What further help with the Government provide for small tourism operators to recover from pandemic restrictions?

#### Answer—

(1) Destination NSW tracks accommodation performance of hotels and serviced apartments in New South Wales in terms of occupancy rate, revenue and daily rate through data delivered by STR, a

global data analytics provider. This information is available on Destination NSW's website at: <u>www.destinationnsw.com.au/wp-content/uploads/2021/11/str-accommodation-snapshot-sept-qtr-2021.pdf</u>.

- (a) In 2021, during the statewide lockdown and to-date, the Government, via Destination NSW, held weekly visitor economy forums with key industry stakeholders from the hotel, hospitality, restaurant and attraction sectors, retail sector, aviation, with peak industry bodies and City of Sydney. Minister Ayres and his office attended the majority of these forums and answered questions from stakeholders. The weekly forums ensured pressing matters were raised and discussed and informed the road to recovery for Sydney and New South Wales.
- (b) During the pandemic, the Government introduced a suite of economic support measures for businesses, with dedicated assistance for small businesses. Measures included the JobSaver scheme, the 2021 COVID-19 business grant, the 2021 COVID-19 micro-business grant, tax relief measures, assistance programs for employees. The Government has introduced a new Hardship Review Panel, which is considering financial support for businesses that did not qualify for COVID-19 business support measures, including the business grant, micro-business grant and JobSaver.
- (c) The Government continues to deliver the Government Business Connect program, so more businesses can continue to obtain advice to navigate challenges resulting from the COVID-19 pandemic. The Government has also made permanent increase to the payroll tax threshold from \$1 million to \$1.2 million and reduced the payroll tax rate from 5.45 percent to 4.85 percent. It is providing small businesses with fees and charges rebate of \$1,500 until 30 June 2022 to help them with the cost of doing business.

The Government's tourism and major events agency, Destination NSW, is providing industry-wide assistance through its investment in events, destination marketing, PR and industry development programs to help businesses recover. Destination NSW has developed a new Sydney and NSW Visitor Brand Strategy, and launched a new marketing campaign, 'Feel New', which will benefit visitor economy operators by providing a compelling new visitor message to entice visitors back.

This is in addition to dedicated recovery initiatives, such as the Central Business District (CBD) Revitalisation Program to support events and activations in CBDs across Greater Sydney and surrounds, with an additional \$50 million allocated in October 2021, and the \$6 million allocation to bring business events back to the city through the Accelerate program.

The Government also allocated \$250 million to expand the Stay & Rediscover scheme and \$250 million to expand the Dine & Discover initiative. Sydney CBD businesses will also benefit from a \$50 million stimulus program, which will offer 500,000 New South Wales residents four \$25 vouchers for dining and entertainment experiences in the Sydney CBD on Fridays.

- \* 6682 PARTY BOAT ENFORCEMENT—Mr Alex Greenwich to ask the Minister for Planning and Public Spaces, and Minister for Transport and Roads—
  - (1) Considering increasing reports of intrusive noise from party boats late at night, what increased enforcement has the Government carried out beyond advising boat operators?
  - (2) What resources are allocated to marine noise enforcement and what additional resources have been allocated since LA Q 5778?

- (3) What action has been taken on the review of the 2008 'Code of Conduct for Charter Vessels Operating with Amplified Music Systems' as referenced in LA Q 5778?
- (4) How does the Government monitor charter vessel loading and unloading passengers at night through the Charter Wharf Booking System?
- (5) What complaints have been received about night noise and anti-social behaviour at Charter Wharves at :
  - (a) Campbells Cove?
  - (b) Casino?
  - (c) Ives Steps?
  - (d) King Street?
  - (e) Walsh Bay?
  - (f) Circular Quay?
- (6) What measures are in place to prevent noise and anti-social behaviour impacts at Charter Wharves at night?
- (7) What further action will the Government take to balance commercial use of the harbour and Charter Wharves with protecting adjacent communities from offensive noise and anti-social behaviour at night?

Answer—

I am advised:

- (1) Since 1 October 2021, NSW Maritime has conducted three evening patrols targeting noise. One noise abatement direction was issued to a boat operator.
- (2) NSW Maritime Boating Safety Officers, the NSW Police Force Marine Area Command, NSW Environment Protection Authority and local council all allocate resources to marine noise enforcement. In relation to NSW Maritime, additional patrols are planned over the Christmas and New Year period.
- (3) On 19 October 2021, a newly established industry working group first met. A Code of Conduct was reviewed with feedback being considered.
- (4) The loading and unloading of passengers is not monitored through the Charter Wharf Booking System.
- (5) There have been two complaints about noise levels at Charter wharves, both at Casino.
- (6) NSW Maritime and the NSW Police Force Marine Area Command conduct proactive patrols of Charter wharves to ensure compliance with relevant legislation.
- (7) NSW Maritime aims to ensure the equitable use and enjoyment of waterways is maintained for all stakeholders, by balancing the needs of adjacent residential communities with recreational boating and commercial operators.
- \* 6683 ELECTRIC VEHICLE CHARGING—Mr Alex Greenwich to ask the Minister for Planning and Public Spaces, and Minister for Transport and Roads—
  - (1) What action has been taken under the NSW Electric Vehicle Strategy to provide easy access to public Electric Vehicle (EV) charging?
    - (a) How many charging stations are operating and how many are planned under the proposed:
      - (i) EV Super-Highways?

- (ii) EV Commuter Corridors?
- (iii) EV off-street parking chargers?
- (iv) Tourist destination charging facilities?
- (b) How many of these charging facilities are in the inner city or planned for the inner city?
- (2) What further action will the Government take to provide and encourage electric vehicle charging?

- <sup>\*</sup> 6684 KIPPAX LAKE WILDLIFE PROTECTION—Mr Alex Greenwich to ask the Minister for Planning and Public Spaces, and Minister for Transport and Roads—
  - (1) What steps did the Government take to protect birdlife on Kippax Lake following attacks on the resident swans?
    - (a) What further action is planned to prevent future attacks on birdlife?
  - (2) What longer term measures will the Government implement to protect and support wildlife including birds around the lake?

Answer—

I am advised:

- (1) Greater Sydney Parklands has taken a number of steps to protect birdlife on Kippax Lake. It has installed new signage to inform visitors that dogs must be on leash within 10 metres of ponds, increased Centennial Parklands ranger patrols of the area to ensure compliance with the on-leash rule, and erected temporary fencing around a small area near the northern boat ramp of the lake to provide additional protection of the area where the swans commonly feed. Greater Sydney Parklands is also updating its dog brochure and will carry out ongoing marketing to educate the public and inform them that all of the Kippax Lake precinct is designated as a dog on-leash area. - (2) Greater Sydney Parklands takes the protection of its diverse wildlife very seriously. Planned longer-term measures to protect and support wildlife, including birds, include:
  - a review of potential habitat improvements, including an upgrade to the floating island in Kippax Lake, and planter boxes for reed beds.
  - landscape planning for the Kippax Lake precinct of Moore Park. This includes a review of planting strategies to improve habitat provision and design opportunities to better define on- and off-leash dog areas, especially around the lake.
- \* 6685 DARLINGHURST COURTHOUSE SITE—Mr Alex Greenwich to ask the Attorney General, and Minister for Prevention of Domestic and Sexual Violence—
  - (1) What review has the Government carried out into the fitness and suitability of the Darlinghurst Courthouse, considering its purpose, restricted accessibility and security requirements?
  - (2) What long term plans does the Government have for the future of the:
    - (a) Court operations?
    - (b) Courthouse buildings and site?
  - (3) Do the recently installed intrusive fence and barriers comply with heritage requirements for the site?

- (4) What consideration has the Government given to this site being used for other purposes including for arts and cultural activities?
- (5) What long term plans does the Government have for the Darlinghurst Courthouse site?

I am advised:

The Department of Communities and Justice regularly undertakes a review of its asset portfolio to assess the suitability and condition of assets and consider future use options for any underutilised assets.

The Darlinghurst Courthouse is an operational court that hears criminal trials by both the Supreme Court of NSW and the District Court of NSW. There are currently no plans in place to consider utilising the courthouse for any other purposes.

The security of the courthouse is currently being upgraded to help protect the safety of the judiciary, court personnel and members of the community who are required to attend the court.

All security upgrades being delivered at the courthouse are approved by the Heritage Council of NSW and have taken into consideration all necessary requirements to help preserve the heritage nature of the courthouse.

\* 6686 NATIONAL CONSTRUCTION CODE—Mr Alex Greenwich to ask the Minister for Planning and Public Spaces, and Minister for Transport and Roads—

(1) Transport for NSW's COVID-19 Taskforce engaged Healthcare Australia to provide onsite Rapid Antigen Testing (RAT) services at 16 critical operational sites across the Transport cluster as part of a pilot program. The objectives of the pilot are to implement an immediate additional layer of protection for workers to maintain operational resilience of the transport network and to evaluate the potential for RAT as a longer term, business-as-usual measure.

Testing was rolled out to the 16 sites from 30 August 2021 with the pilot program extended to 30 November 2021.

RAT is only one strategy that Transport for NSW has implemented to ensure the safety of staff. Other policies and procedures include the provision of Personal Protection Equipment and hand sanitisers, increased cleaning, two-hour paid leave for vaccination, on-line resources, facilitating Working from Home arrangements, and COVID-Safe changes to limiting staff numbers in offices to enable social distancing.

This program of work builds on the foundation set within Future Transport 2056 as well as the learnings taken in 2020 from the building of numerous pop-up cycleways in Sydney during the COVID-19 pandemic.

As part of the program, Transport for NSW will work with local councils to better understand their cycleway priorities to ensure there is alignment of connections to the planned strategic corridors.

Altrac is responsible for maintenance of Light Rail vehicles. Altrac subcontracts Transdev to provide operations and maintenance services for all three lines. Transdev subcontracts Alstom Maintenance to provide maintenance of the Sydney Light Rail including Light Rail vehicles. All track maintenance issues are reported through to Alstom Maintenance as the contracted maintainer. Eight technicians are employed to conduct Light Rail Vehicle Maintenance on the Inner West Light Rail.

The cracking on the Inner West Light Rail was discovered during preventative maintenance, including an under body visual inspection. As a result, further unscheduled inspections of the entire fleet took place which identified cracking in all vehicles. Preventative maintenance is completed every 30 days.

Drivers remain on a rotating weekly roster to perform shunting and movement of vehicles along the corridor and in the Lilyfield and Pyrmont Depots, where required. This is to ensure they remain connected with the business and their qualifications remain current so they are ready for the resumption of services.

(1) One Central Business District (CBD) and South East Light Rail Alstom Citadis vehicle travels on the Inner West Light Rail (IWLR) to the Lilyfield depot each night for heavy maintenance at a reduced speed. These Light Rail Vehicles (LRVs) are not currently suitable to operate in revenue service on the IWLR for a variety of operational and safety reasons, including differing wheel profiles, differing vehicle tracking systems, vehicle platform height differences, platform/LRV gaps and differing door locations.

- (2) Altrac and its operator and maintainer, Transdev and Alstom, are currently examining the operational and infrastructure risks and potential mitigations to enable CBD and South East Light Rail Alstom Citadis vehicles to operate on the IWLR. Altrac has not yet concluded its investigations into feasibility and costs.
- (3) The decision to separate the operation of the IWLR and the CBD and South East Light Rail allowed Transport for NSW to procure the best light rail vehicles and build the line with the most up to date advancements, including APS technology. Additionally, this configuration also meant that the best suited route conditions and service levels of the new network are used, without constraints from the existing light rail infrastructure.

- (3) Businesses with supressed ABNs can apply through the digital application for the Small Business Grant. For the Micro Business grant and JobSaver, businesses can apply via a manual process. These businesses can apply and have their applications processed manually.
- (4) Service NSW digital products integrate with public and private Australian Business Register application programming interfaces. The Australian Business Register responds with a suppressed indicator if the ABN is suppressed.

The Application Programming Interface (API) is currently being used by Service NSW on the COVID19 business grant to enable customers with suppressed ABNs to apply for grants in a secure and private way. The solution is currently being rolled out across other grant programs. The solution was developed in a secure way to ensure that the business details of vulnerable customers are not released to individuals that may claim to be a contact or associate of the business entity.

As an interim solution, Service NSW developed a non-digital solution to allow customers with a suppressed ABN to submit their application.

Desalinated water and purified recycled water are produced from different water sources.

Purified recycled water is water recycled from industry and homes (including from kitchens, showers and toilets) that has been purified to meet strict Australian Guidelines for Water Recycling to supplement drinking water sources.

Desalination refers to drinking water that is sourced from seawater and treated (usually through reverse osmosis) to remove salt and other impurities to produce water of drinking quality before it is introduced to the drinking water supply.

In line with the recommendations of the draft Greater Sydney Water Strategy, Sydney Water has commenced detailed planning for a purified recycled water demonstration facility and is assessing potential locations.

Progress on Project Remediate is published on the NSW.gov website. This is because of the increased risk to public safety associated with potentially arson or terror threats against these buildings. This risk has been confirmed by Fire and Rescue NSW and NSW Police.

However, representatives of any potentially affected building can contact the Office of Project Remediate to discuss the building's circumstances and their eligibility for assistance.

The Walama List pilot will provide an opportunity to trial and evaluate a novel court process in the District Court, which may inform future investments to support specialist approaches for sentencing Aboriginal offenders. No primary legislation is required for the pilot.

#### Answer-

Businesses in industries with vaccination requirements for staff and customers under the Public Health Orders are required to "take reasonable steps to prevent unvaccinated people entering" the business premises.

Extensive information on appropriate measures to comply with this requirement, including detailed information on acceptable proofs of vaccination, along with downloadable posters to support these measures, was made available on the Service NSW website ahead of reopening on 11 October 2021.

A range of communication channels have been used to support small businesses across New South Wales, including in the Bankstown electorate, in taking reasonable steps to prevent unvaccinated people entering business premises, including by checking customers' vaccination certificates, including:

- A series of emails with summaries of this information and links for further information and resources were sent in early October to all businesses registered with the Australian Business Register as a New South Wales business. These emails included a telephone number and link to a call back service for personalised advice from the Service NSW Business Concierge.
- Stakeholder briefings with specific industry groups including through participation in community and business webinars hosted by Mr Jihad Dib, MP and Mr Tony Burke, MP.
- The provision of information to Culturally and Linguistically Diverse (CALD) audiences, through in-language advertising, translated versions of posters and animations, and electronic digital messages to stakeholders with translated toolkits and resources for distribution to CALD communities.

From 15 October 2021, customers have had the option of integrating the COVID-19 Digital Certificate demonstrating double vaccination status which is provided through the Express Medicare App with the Service NSW app to enable seamless check-in and display of proof of vaccination.

As of 6 December 2021, over 2.587 million customers had chosen this option and used it for over 199 million check-ins.

Small businesses have adapted to the requirement to check vaccination status and the vast majority of customers treat staff requesting proof of vaccination with kindness and respect.

NSW Police are available to respond – as always – to small businesses who need assistance in dealing with would-be customers acting unlawfully.

Southern NSW Local Health District intends to apply for further Commonwealth Government funding to open the other 10 beds by mid-2022.

The expansion of the Moruya Emergency Department is on track to be completed around mid-2022. The expansion includes a two-bed resuscitation zone, a central clinical hub, and four additional treatment bays for low acuity care.

The Allied Health Rural and Remote HECS-HELP incentive package is a four-year comprehensive incentive package focused on recruitment and retention to areas of critical need in rural and remote NSW. It is designed to attract early career Allied Health professionals with a HECS-HELP loan debt.

The Western NSW Primary Health Network (PHN) commissioned a range of services within the District footprint to meet identified gaps and improve outcomes for patients. These activities are funded by the Australian Government under the PHN Program, and are usually on a contract basis.

The M5 Cashback Scheme does not apply for motorists using the M5 East. The Cashback Scheme was introduced for users of the M5 South-West Motorway on 1 January 1997.

- \* 6774 GRIFFITH BASE HOSPITAL EMERGENCY SHORT STAY UNIT—Mrs Helen Dalton to ask the Minister for Health and Medical Research—
  - (1) Given the Griffith Base Hospital Master Plan Summary Report, published in May 2018, includes reference to an 8-bed short stay emergency unit, but more recently plans do not include reference to this short stay emergency unit:
    - (a) Has the Government scrapped plans for an 8-bed short stay emergency bed unit at Griffith Base Hospital?
      - (i) If so, why has the Government made this decision?
      - (ii) What consultation did the Government have with hospital staff and the community before the decision to scrap the unit was made?
      - (iii) Has the recently announced plans for a short stay mental health unit replaced the short stay emergency unit?
    - (b) Why is the updated version of the Griffith Base Hospital master plan not published online?
      - (i) When will the updated master plan be published online and on what website will the public be able to access it?

## Answer—

Emergency Department Short Stay Unit models of care are not always appropriate for rural facilities due to workforce requirements and capacity. The Griffith Base Hospital Emergency Department will offer an open planned department supporting enhanced patient flow. Local clinicians have been active participants in designing their work environment.

A Griffith Base Hospital redevelopment web page is regularly updated on the progress of the redevelopment.

\* 6775 NEW REFUGES AND AFFORDABLE HOMES—Mrs Helen Dalton to ask the Treasurer, and Minister for Energy and Environment—

Considering the 75 new women's refuges and 200 affordable homes that the Government recently announced, how many will be allocated to the Murray electorate?

Questions relating to women's refuges should be referred to the Attorney General, and Minister for Prevention of Domestic and Sexual Violence.

Questions referring to affordable housing should be referred to the Minister for Minister for Water, Property and Housing.

- \* 6776 COVID-19 SUPPORT PAYMENT DELAYS—Mrs Helen Dalton to ask the Treasurer, and Minister for Energy and Environment—
  - (1) Considering reports from businesses that have been approved for COVID Support payments (Business grants, JobSaver, etc.) and have yet to be paid:
    - (a) Does the Government have the funds to pay all of the eligible businesses?
    - (b) What is the reason for the delays in payments, especially delays longer than four weeks?
    - (c) When can all businesses expect to receive their payments in full?

#### Answer-

This is a matter for the Minister for Finance and Small Business.

- \* 6777 MATERNITY UNIT AT SHELLHARBOUR HOSPITAL—Mr Ryan Park to ask the Minister for Health and Medical Research—
  - (1) In relation to the new Shellharbour Hospital:
    - (a) Will there be a full maternity unit located at the new hospital?
      - (i) If so, what specific maternity services will be available?
      - (ii) If not, why not?

#### Answer-

Antenatal and postnatal services will be provided at the new Shellharbour Hospital. Access to the Midwifery Group Practice based at the Wollongong Hospital will also be available.

Birthing services will continue to be provided at Wollongong Hospital for Shellharbour and Kiama residents. For safety reasons, it is important the existing birthing and inpatient neonatal and paediatric services remain at Wollongong Hospital, alongside their specialist support services.

\* 6778 RESEARCH ON EDUCATIONAL BENEFITS OF MURWILLUMBAH MEGA CAMPUS—Ms Janelle Saffin to ask the Minister for Skills and Tertiary Education representing the Minister for Education and Early Childhood Learning—

When will the four public school communities of Murwillumbah receive the promised research which explains the educational benefits for students of its proposed mega school campus on the current Murwillumbah High School site?

Answer-

Communication materials shared with the community over the past 12 months have consistently included information about the educational benefits of the campus, as well as the positive, tangible education outcomes that have been recorded following similar school mergers in the region.

One of the benefits of the campus is that it will enable the Department of Education to provide students and teachers from all public schools in Murwillumbah with access to new, flexible learning environments that better support contemporary teaching approaches.

Information provided at a virtual information session in September 2021 outlined the evidence-based benefits of flexible learning spaces and a link for further information and research about contemporary learning and teaching and flexible learning environments.

## \* 6779 WOMEN'S REFUGE MURWILLUMBAH—Ms Janelle Saffin to ask the Premier—

While welcoming the Government's \$484.3 million investment to tackle domestic and family violence (DFV), can one of the 75 extra women's refuges be built and funded in Murwillumbah, where one was abruptly closed in 2015 to the shock of DFV survivors and the local community?

Answer—

Thank you for your question. I have referred the matter to the Minister with portfolio responsibility, the Minister for Mental Health, Regional Youth and Women.

\* 6780 EXTENSION OF COVID-19 MICRO-BUSINESS GRANT—Ms Janelle Saffin to ask the Treasurer, and Minister for Energy and Environment representing the Minister for Finance and Small Business—

Will the Government consider extending its COVID-19 Micro-Business Grant (now closed) for eligible businesses who rely heavily on Northern Rivers arts and crafts markets for trade, particularly as these markets are unlikely to resume until early next year due to the New South Wales roadmap for easing COVID-19 restrictions changing to 95 per cent double vaccination or from 15 December 2021, whichever comes first?

Answer—

The Government is always considering the best way to support small businesses throughout New South Wales.

The COVID-19 Micro-Business Grants have been targeted at supporting small businesses with an annual turnover of less than \$75,000 through the period of COVID-19 restrictions from 26 June 2021 to 30 November 2021, who experienced a 30% or more decline in turnover due to those restrictions.

The Government has provided \$747.27 million in COVID-19 Micro-Business Grants to 62,226 small businesses, including 1,894 small businesses in the Northern Rivers region.

The Public Health Order currently in force allows "markets that do not predominantly sell food", including arts and crafts markets, to operate subject to a requirement to take reasonable steps "to ensure that an unvaccinated adult is not on the premises". Any decision not to open while the restrictions are in place is a matter for each market to decide.

Under the roadmap for easing COVID-19 restrictions this requirement will no longer apply from 15 December 2021.

The Government is now focused on supporting the economy to rebound from the recent lockdown. The recently announced \$2.8 billion recovery package will continue to support the State's small businesses to reopen and recover from the lockdown. The package includes the expansion of the small business rebate for fees and charges from \$1,500 to \$2,000 to help reduce the costs of establishing or running a small business.

To assist small businesses deal with the challenges of COVID-19, the Government extended the Business Connect program with a total commitment of \$39.3 million over four years. Free expert business advice is available for small businesses impacted by COVID- 19, including from experts in arts and recreation services in the Northern Rivers region.

\* 6781 RURAL MATHS TEACHERS—Ms Janelle Saffin to ask the Minister for Skills and Tertiary Education representing the Minister for Education and Early Childhood Learning—

What strategy does the Government have in place to redress the situation whereby one in five mathematics classes in some parts of rural and regional New South Wales are being taught by teachers who lack any maths training?

Answer—

On 15 October 2021, the Government announced a \$125 million investment into the Teacher Supply Strategy. A number of initiatives under this strategy specifically target high demand subjects and locations, including science, technology, engineering and mathematics (STEM) subjects, and rural and remote locations.

As part of the Teacher Supply Strategy, there will be opportunities for experienced teachers to retrain in high-demand subjects, particularly in rural and remote schools.

Teacher Supply initiatives that target maths teacher supply include Recruitment beyond New South Wales and Mid-career programs. The existing Teach and Learn Scholarship program will also be reviewed and enhanced in 2022 to upskill more teachers, including those currently teaching out-of-field.

Additionally, as a part of the Government's Maths Strategy, the Department of Education offers the teach.MathsNOW scholarships targeted towards mathematics industry professionals and STEM undergraduates seeking a career change to maths teaching. As a newly launched program, the teach.MathsNOW scholarship program is continually being reviewed and refined. There are up to 320 scholarships available over a four-year period, with the first cohort commencing study in 2020.

\* 6782 PROFESSIONAL SCHOOL PHOTOGRAPHERS—Ms Janelle Saffin to ask the Minister for Skills and Tertiary Education representing the Minister for Education and Early Childhood Learning—

Will the Government lift current restrictions to allow professional school photographers to return to public schools on the Northern Rivers and Northern Tablelands to fulfill their end-of-year work in a COVID-safe manner?

Answer-

Following changes to school settings introduced on 8 November 2021, school photos, namely class and individual photos, have been allowed outdoors on all school sites. Providers supporting school photos must be fully vaccinated and sign in using the school check-in app.

\* 6783 CRITICAL HEALTH ACCOMMODATION FOR TENTERFIELD DISTRICT HOSPITAL—Ms Janelle Saffin to ask the Deputy Premier, Minister for Regional Transport and Roads, and Minister for Regional New South Wales—

Will Tenterfield District Hospital benefit from Hunter-New England Local Health District being the first to trial new critical health accommodation to be built under the Government's \$35 million Regional Housing Package announced earlier this month?

Answer—

I am advised:

This is a matter for the Minister for Health and Medical Research.

\* 6784 REGIONAL HOUSING DELIVERY PLANS—Ms Janelle Saffin to ask the Deputy Premier, Minister for Regional Transport and Roads, and Minister for Regional New South Wales—

Of the \$5 million the Government has allocated to deliver Regional Housing Delivery Plans, will this initiative seek the involvement of Lismore City, Kyogle, Tenterfield Shire and Tweed Shire councils in the Electorate of Lismore?

On 28 October 2021, the Government announced a \$35 million Regional Housing Package as part of the \$200 million Regional Recovery Program. As part of this package, \$5 million has been allocated to deliver Regional Housing Delivery Plans, working with local councils, industry and regional communities to develop practical, local solutions to manage their housing needs.

The Department of Regional NSW is currently developing criteria to select the Regional Housing Delivery Plan locations. The Department will work closely with Councils, industry and local communities in developing the Regional Housing Delivery Plans.

\* 6785 CONTINGENCY PLANS FOR COVID-19 OUTBREAKS IN INDIGENOUS COMMUNITIES—Ms Janelle Saffin to ask the Minister for Health and Medical Research—

What contingency plans are in place – i.e. additional emergency accommodation and services – for dealing with COVID-19 outbreaks in Indigenous communities in the Northern Rivers and Northern Tablelands regions, where overcrowding of homes can present challenges for residents?

Answer—

The Northern NSW Local Health District provides support to all COVID-19 positive individuals. The District works with Aboriginal Medical Services, Aboriginal Health, Public Health and the local Aboriginal Communities to ensure the safety of COVID-19 positive people, who often prefer to remain at home. If an outbreak occurs in an Aboriginal community, the District offers Community Based Testing and Vaccinations services in that community.

Where it is not possible to safety isolate at home, a variety of health supported accommodation is available and is provided in consultation with Elders of the community.

# \* 6787 200 EXTRA HOMES - DOMESTIC AND FAMILY VIOLENCE - LISMORE—Ms Janelle Saffin to ask the Premier—

Of the Government's \$52.5 million investment in social housing announced last month, how many of the projected extra 200 homes for women experiencing domestic and family violence will be built in the Electorate of Lismore?

Answer-

Thank you for your question. I have referred the matter to the Minister with portfolio responsibility, the Minister for Mental Health, Regional Youth and Women.

\* 6789 SCHOOLS RENEWABLES GRANT PROGRAM—Ms Janelle Saffin to ask the Premier—

Why were no public schools in the Electorate of Lismore selected for the Government's \$20-million pilot Schools Renewables Grant program to fund solar power systems and batteries?

I am advised:

There is no "Schools Renewables Grants program".

If your question refers to the Schools Renewable Energy Infrastructure Pilot Project, it should be noted that this is not a grants program.

Rather, the \$20 million pilot project will see a number of schools trial batteries in combination with solar photovoltaic (PV) systems. The pilot project will assess the benefits and costs of large-scale implementation of solar systems and batteries, together with other initiatives that have the potential to reduce demand on the electricity network.

The schools that have been selected to participate in Tranche 1 of the pilot project are those that have been identified as requiring electrical infrastructure upgrades to provide the additional electrical capacity quired to run ,the air conditioning being installed as part of the Cooler Classrooms program.

\* 6790 COOLER CLASSROOMS PROGRAM—Ms Janelle Saffin to ask the Minister for Skills and Tertiary Education representing the Minister for Education and Early Childhood Learning—

How many public schools in the Electorate of Lismore are among the 432 schools statewide which are still to have air-conditioning installed as promised under the Government's Cooler Classrooms program?

Answer—

The NSW Government is investing a record \$500 million over five years to provide a sustainable air conditioning program in thousands of classrooms and library spaces in more than 900 public schools. This is the first time there has been a dedicated program to install air-conditioning in NSW public schools with priority given to schools in the hottest part of the state.

More than 600 schools were automatically eligible for the program as, based on data from the Bureau of Meteorology, they experience a mean maximum January temperature of 30 degrees Celsius and above. This includes 19 schools in the Lismore electorate.

Schools that experience a mean maximum January temperature below 30 degrees Celsius were invited to submit an application to the Cooler Classrooms Fund. 24 schools in the Lismore electorate submitted an application with 11 schools approved for delivery.

It is important to note that an application to the Cooler Classrooms Program does not indicate a school does not have existing air-conditioning.

\* 6791 REDIRECTING MURWILLUMBAH MEGA CAMPUS BUDGET—Ms Janelle Saffin to ask the Minister for Skills and Tertiary Education representing the Minister for Education and Early Childhood Learning—

Why is the Government proposing a mega school campus for Murwillumbah insteading of directing the reported \$100 million cost towards infrastructure and maintenance upgrades to Murwillumbah High School, Murwillumbah East Public School, Wollumbin High School and Murwillumbah Public School?

Answer-

After exploring a range of possible options, it was found that investing in one primary school and one high school at the Murwillumbah High School site offered the best opportunity for meeting Murwillumbah's current and projected education needs and maximising benefits to students and the community.

While investing in multiple sites might deliver new and upgraded learning spaces for some students, many existing buildings are not suitable for conversion to innovative learning environments and this would not overcome the constraints and issues associated with the existing school sites.

\* 6792 MURWILLUMBAH MEGA SCHOOL CAMPUS BUDGET—Ms Janelle Saffin to ask the Minister for Skills and Tertiary Education representing the Minister for Education and Early Childhood Learning—

- (1) Has the Government made any cuts to the reported \$100 million budget allocated to the planning, construction and fit-out of its proposed mega school campus for Murwillumbah?
- (2) Do these cuts relate to the removal of a performing arts centre which could be used by students and the wider community?

Answer—

- (1) No.
- (2) See response to LA Q6390.
- \* 6793 DIVESTMENT OF MURWILLUMBAH TAFE CAMPUS—Ms Janelle Saffin to ask the Minister for Skills and Tertiary Education—

Will the Government rule out its planned full divestment in 2022 of the Murwillumbah TAFE Campus, located at 146 Murwillumbah Street, as it is still offering courses to further the vocational education of local residents?

Answer-

There are no approved plans to divest the TAFE NSW Murwillumbah site.

- \* 6794 UNPLANNED POWER OUTAGES IN HERMIDALE AND CANBELEGO—Mr Roy Butler to ask the Treasurer, and Minister for Energy and Environment—
  - (1) How many unplanned outages have consumers experienced, both residential and rural, in the past 12 months?
  - (2) How long have consumers been without power during these unplanned outages?
  - (3) During one week in the Canbelego area, there were three outages; 3 November 2021 from 2.30 to 3.30pm unplanned; 5 November 2021 from 8.42pm to 10.07pm planned; and 5 November 2021 from 2.30pm to 9.16pm unplanned, what investigative measures are in place to minimise these disruptions and stabilise electricity delivery to its consumers and their businesses?
  - (4) Is Essential Energy at full staff capacity for maintaining this Western New South Wales area?
    - (a) If not, what positions are vacant?
  - (5) Does the Minister credit the time lost by its customers with these unplanned outages?
    - (a) If not, why not?

Answer-

I am advised:

- (1) In the Hermidale and Canbelego area there were 25 unplanned outages and 11 planned outages in the past 12 months.
- (2) The average duration of these unplanned outages was 4.60 hours and 3.65 hours for the planned outages.
- (3) In the Canbelego area, Essential Energy reports an unplanned outage on 3 November 2021 from 2.23 to 3.35pm and a planned outage on 5 November 2021 from 8.42am to 12.52pm.

Under the requirements of the licence conditions, Essential Energy measures the performance of individual feeders and must investigate where the standard has not been met. The Nyngan West feeder servicing the Hermidale and Canbelego areas is performing within the individual feeder standards.

- (4) Yes.
- (5) Compensation claims for unplanned outages can be made directly to Essential Energy as Customer Service Standards payment.
- \* 6795 MODELLING STUDENT NUMBERS NEW WEE WAA HIGH SCHOOL—Mr Roy Butler to ask the Minister for Skills and Tertiary Education representing the Minister for Education and Early Childhood Learning—
  - (1) How many students will the new Wee Waa High School be able to cater for?
    - (a) How was this number determined?
  - (2) What are the student population modelling projections for the school and what is the data that informed these projections?

Answer—

- (1) The new Wee Waa High School will accommodate 200 students with the master plan allowing for expansion to 300 if future demand requires.
  - (a) School Infrastructure NSW produces enrolment projections for all public schools in New South Wales on an annual basis. The number of students expected to be enrolled in each school is projected over a five year timeframe.
- (2) Wee Waa High School has 141 students in 2021. This number is projected to remain stable over the next 5 years. The Department of Education uses a number of sources to help it forecast student population requirements including Census data, Local Government Area forecasts and Department of Planning Industry and Environment's population projections.
- \* 6796 COAL SEAM GAS ROYALTIES—Mr Roy Butler to ask the Treasurer, and Minister for Energy and Environment—
  - (1) Is the royalty due to the Government for Coal Seam Gas ten percent of the value at wellhead?
    - (a) Can project expenses be deducted to reduce this value?
  - (2) On what grounds would discretion be exercised as allowed by section 86 of the Petroleum (Onshore) Act 1991?
  - (3) Has the proponent of the Narrabri project Santos requested relief for this project?

Answer-

These questions should be referred to the Deputy Premier and Minister for Regional New South Wales, the Hon. Paul Toole MP.

- \* 6797 OVERSIGHT OF IRRIGATION CORPORATIONS—Mrs Helen Dalton to ask the Minister for Water, Property and Housing—
  - (1) Given that Irrigation Corporations are often the only suppliers of water for essential needs, and that such corporations are not signed up to Ombudsman schemes or subject to direct local government control:
    - (a) What recourse do private individuals who are reliant on Irrigation Corporations for essential utilities have in disputes with the Irrigation Corporation?

- (b) What government body, if any, conducts independent oversight on the governance of such Corporations?
- (c) What legislation, if any, ensures that Irrigation Corporations act in the best interests of all stakeholders in the areas they serve, and what avenues are open to individuals in those areas to seek dispute resolution or redress?

- (1) (a) It depends on the nature of the dispute (see below).
  - (b) Irrigation corporations are private companies holding bulk water entitlements on behalf of their shareholders. They are required to hold water access licences and works and use approvals under the Water Management Act 2000 (WMA). The Natural Resources Access Regulator monitors compliance with these licences and approvals.

Irrigation corporations are also required to hold an operating licence. Compliance with operating licences is subject to Ministerial oversight under the WMA.

Irrigation corporations are subject to statutory duties of directors, office holders and employees under the Corporations Act 2001 (Cth) and, where relevant, the Cooperatives National Law, which provides a detailed scheme governing the operation of entities registered under it.

Irrigation corporations are also subject to Australian Consumer Law and the Fair Trading Act 1987. The Australian Consumer Law contains extensive rules regulating the conduct of entities and sets out general and specific protections for consumers. It also creates several offences.

The ACCC is responsible for enforcing compliance with the Competition and Consumer Act 2010, which incorporates the Australian Consumer Law . The object of that law is to enhance the welfare of all Australians through the promotion and enforcement of competition and fair trading with provision for consumer protection.

- (c) Under the Fair Trading legislation the NSW Civil and Administrative Tribunal can hear customer disputes.
- \* 6798 COOLER CLASSROOMS PROGRAM AND AIR QUALITY ASSURANCE PROGRAMS—Mrs Helen Dalton to ask the Minister for Skills and Tertiary Education representing the Minister for Education and Early Childhood Learning—
  - (1) Which of the 59 schools in the electorate of Murray listed as recipients under the Cooler Classrooms Program have had the works completed to install air conditioning?
    - (a) Which schools are currently in either design, tender or delivery stage of the Cooler Classrooms Program?
  - (2) Of the 59 schools in the electorate of Murray, which will be part of the School Air Quality Assurance Program?

# Answer-

(1) There are 58 schools in the Murray electorate under the Cooler Classrooms Program. As at 18 November 2021, a total of 35 schools have had air conditioning systems fully installed.

Three schools are currently in the construction phase, eight projects are being tendered and 12 have been assessed as having fit for purpose air-conditioning systems in all eligible learning spaces and libraries.

(2) The Government is delivering a \$100 million air quality assurance program to support ongoing improvements to air quality in NSW schools. Under the program, the Department of Education will provide air purifiers to schools as required.

The vast majority of spaces in schools are adequately ventilated through natural and mechanically assisted ventilation.

Air purification is only recommended where air quality is compromised by bush fire smoke or where natural ventilation cannot be achieved. This approach is strongly supported by expert advice.

- \* 6799 GRIFFITH BASE HOSPITAL CANCER TREATMENT—Mrs Helen Dalton to ask the Minister for Health and Medical Research—
  - (1) Why have the Murrumbidgee Local Health District refused Riverina Cancer Care's offer to send more oncology specialists to Griffith Base Hospital to treat cancer patients?
  - (2) Have cancer patients waited for five weeks to access their first cancer treatment due to staff shortages?
  - (3) Do the long wait times for cancer treatment at Griffith Base Hospital create significant health risks for cancer patients?
  - (4) What is Murrumbidgee Local Health District doing to recruit more oncology nurses at Griffith Base Hospital?
  - (5) Between 1 January 2021 and 31 October 2021, how many Griffith Base Hospital patients had to travel to Wagga, Albury or Sydney for cancer treatment?

## Answer-

(1) to (3) I am informed that Murrumbidgee Local Health District has no record of Riverina Cancer Care Centre offering extra medical oncology services, however the District has advised that all new referrals who are suitable for medical oncology consultation and treatment at Griffith Base Hospital can be accommodated.

(4) Griffith Oncology Service has a 0.4 full time equivalent nursing vacancy which is currently being recruited to.

(5) This information is not centrally available. Patients from Griffith Base Hospital may receive treatment in other areas for a variety of reasons. For more complex cancers that require surgery, evidence shows that people may have better outcomes if they have surgery at a specialist centre that performs the procedure regularly, and this may require travel at some distance from the patient's residence.

\* 6800 PUBLIC HOUSING WAIT TIMES IN AUBURN/GRANVILLE—Ms Julia Finn to ask the Minister for Families, Communities and Disability Services—

Considering the expected waiting time for a 2-bedroom property in the GW02 Auburn/Granville allocation zone is 10+ years; and 741 applicants are on the general waiting list, what is being done to shorten the wait time for applicants?

Answer—

I am advised:

In 2021-22, the Government is spending over \$1.19 billion on housing and homelessness through assertive outreach, early intervention and social and affordable housing programs.

In October 2021, the Government announced a COVID-19 economic recovery strategy that will significantly increase the supply of social and affordable housing, with an additional \$183 million dedicated to fast-tracking more than 1,400 new social and affordable homes. Part of this package includes

\$50 million for the delivery of approximately 290 new social houses in partnership with community housing providers through the Community Housing Innovation Fund (CHIF).

Also in October 2021, the government announced a further additional \$52.5 million over four years for the CHIF partnership with the community housing sector as part of the Premier's announcement of additional funding for domestic and family violence (DFV) services. The funding will provide approximately 200 sustainable, social and affordable housing dwellings for women experiencing DFV.

The Communities Plus program is delivering up to 23,000 social housing, 500 affordable housing and 40,000 private dwellings over 10 years.

The \$1.1 billion Social and Affordable Housing Fund (SAHF) is delivering over 3,400 social and affordable dwellings under the first two phases of the program. The program is expected to deliver access to 3,485 additional social and affordable homes across the state by the end of 2023, with a target of 30 per cent of all homes to be delivered in regional New South Wales. As of 30 September 2021, SAHF providers have delivered 2,589 new social and affordable homes across New South Wales.

The provision of primary care services is a responsibility of the Commonwealth Government. Despite this, Hunter New England Local Health District has supported the GP Access After Hours services over the years by contributing funding, facilities and equipment for the clinics. From 2011 to 2020 financial years, funding has ranged from \$494,800 to \$630,600, and \$102,000 in 2021.

The GP Access service operated by Hunter Primary Care provides after-hours primary care services to the Hunter region. When the GP Access service was established in 2011, there were limited primary care after-hour options in the region. I am advised that over the past 10 years, there have been new options for after-hours primary care, which have been enhanced with federally funded telehealth and mobile services. All after-hours primary care services provide patients with options to receive lower acuity care, outside the normal business hours of GPs, rather than attending an emergency department.

The Commonwealth Government is the primary funder of GP Access services, via funding to the Primary Health Network and by reimbursement from the Medicare Benefits Scheme to the commissioned service provider. The decision to close the Calvary Mater service and reduce hours at other services was made by Hunter Primary Care, under an agreement with the Hunter New England-Central Coast Primary Health Network.

In line with the District's core responsibilities, Hunter New England Local Health District is focused on delivering acute and tertiary health services, and will redistribute State funding to acute services at John Hunter Hospital.

I have made representations to the Commonwealth Minister for Health and Aged Care, who is responsible for funding of the GP Access services, seeking his commitment to ongoing funding to enable the service to continue operating under its current arrangements for the people of Hunter New England.

It includes portable Variable Message Signs on New South Wales and council controlled roads and corflute signs on private properties.

The total cost of the campaign is \$130,000, and includes \$40,000 from the Heavy Vehicle Safety Program. The remainder has been funded by the Level Crossing Safety Program and a contribution of \$10,000 from Graincorp.

(b) As the coflute signs are not prescribed control devices and are for use on private property, compliance with Standards Australia signage guidelines is not required.

(c) As the corflute signs are not prescribed control devices and are for use on private property, approval is not required.

(d) The corflute signs have clear labels indicating they are not regulatory signs.

(e) The corflute signs are not designed to be used on the New South Wales road network as they are for use on private property, therefore are not required to be included on the traffic sign register.

# I am advised:

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The signs are part of the Harvest Season campaign, a partnership with GrainCorp, which provides warning signs on key freight routes and level crossings across western New South Wales, reminding drivers to take extra care on the roads during the harvest season. It includes portable Variable Message Signs on New South Wales and council controlled roads and corflute signs on private properties.

The total cost of the campaign is \$130,000, and includes \$40,000 from the Heavy Vehicle Safety Program. The remainder has been funded by the Level Crossing Safety Program and a contribution of \$10,000 from Graincorp.

Portable, trailer-mounted Variable Message Signs (VMS) have been placed on selected routes and busy level crossings during the November 2021 to January 2022 harvest season to advise of road and rail safety messages. There are 35 boards, 17 on selected routes and 18 near level crossings.

Transport for NSW considers various factors and performance criteria when determining the placement and operation of portable VMS within a road related area.

When portable VMS are used for special events, such as the Harvest Campaign, the Government Guide to Traffic and Transport Management for Special Events must be complied with.

The signs are portable trailer mounted temporary Variable Message Boards that will be in place until January 2022.

These signs are leased from various suppliers and will be removed at the end of the campaign. Transport for NSW has engaged a number of contractors to supply and place the VMS boards.

- \* 6837 NSW TRAINS PERFORMANCE REPORT (REGIONAL)—Ms Jenny Aitchison to ask the Deputy Premier, Minister for Regional Transport and Roads, and Minister for Regional New South Wales—

# Answer—

I am advised:

- (1) Performance reports for NSW TrainLink are publicly available on the Transport for NSW website. Transport for NSW is not aware of any recent or past disruption in the published data. Performance data is regularly refreshed by NSW Trains and can be filtered by financial year as well as other criteria.
- (2) NSW TrainLink regional train services can be delayed by a number of factors. Many are outside NSW TrainLink's control, including but not limited to:
  - Significant weather events.
  - Speed restrictions set by the rail infrastructure maintainer.
  - Infrastructure and rolling stock issues.
  - Anti-social behaviour and customer emergencies.
  - Issues with freight trains.

NSW TrainLink works closely with the rail infrastructure and fleet maintainers to minimise disruption to its customers and improve reliability. This includes regular meetings to determine the cause of disruptions, prioritise remedial actions and to confirm fault rectification and track improvement works.

Answer-

(1), (2) and (7) Service NSW does not hold data to be able to report on the number of learner drivers who have held learner driver licences for set time periods. This question should be referred to the Minister for Transport and Roads.

(3) Approximately 80 Driver Tests are conducted at the Maitland Service Centre per week.

(4) and (5) Customers on a learner driver licence must complete 120 driving hours to be eligible to take a practical driving test. Service NSW does not hold data on the number of driving hours completed by customers with a current learner driver licence is therefore not able to report on the number eligible to take a test.

(6) Service NSW is actively recruiting up to 100 new driver testers to better meet the high demand for tests across the state. Following the successful completion of training, the new driver testers will be appointed to a relief pool and deployed to areas experiencing the highest demand.

In addition to recruiting additional driver testers, Service NSW is increasing the number of tests available to customers through the introduction of 'Super Saturdays' at some sites.

The Government is investing a record \$500 million over five years to provide a sustainable air conditioning program in thousands of classrooms and library spaces in more than 900 public schools. This is the first time there has been a dedicated program to install air-conditioning in NSW public schools with priority given to schools in the hottest part of the state.

More than 600 schools were automatically eligible for the program as, based on data from the Bureau of Meteorology, they experience a mean maximum January temperature of 30 degrees Celsius and above. This includes 17 schools in the Maitland electorate.

Schools that experience a mean maximum January temperature below 30 degrees were invited to submit an application to the Cooler Classrooms Fund. As per the response to LA QON 4178, Francis Greenway High School submitted an application, which was approved and the project is complete. Millers Forest Public School and Thornton Public School, have also been approved for funding under the Cooler Classrooms Fund.

The number of air conditioned spaces at schools in the Maitland electorate will continue to change as air conditioning is delivered as part of this five-year program.

All new and upgraded facilities delivered as part of the Government's record investment in school infrastructure are fitted with air-conditioning systems.

All demountable teaching spaces are fitted with air conditioning.

\* 6840 MENTAL HEALTH SERVICES FUNDING—Ms Jenny Aitchison to ask the Minister for Health and Medical Research—

The Government's record \$130 million extra investment in mental health will assist people whose mental health has been impacted by the COVID-19 pandemic. Hunter New England Local Health District has received \$260,833 in 2021-22 to employ an Aboriginal mental health care navigator, an Aboriginal health and wellbeing peer worker and an eating disorders clinician. This investment will increase to \$490,000 from 2022-23.

In addition, the Hunter New England and Central Coast Primary Health Network (which includes the population served by the District) will be allocated \$6,139,000 over two years (2021-22 to 2022-23) to boost surge capacity of the mental health clinical workforce. The allocation of remaining investment to other organisations is still being progressed.

- (a) The total cost is \$130,000, with \$80,000 funding from the Level Crossing Safety Program, \$40,000 from the Heavy Vehicle Safety Program and a \$10,000 contribution from Graincorp.
- (b) Transport for NSW considers various factors and performance criteria when determining the placement and operation of portable Variable Message Signs (VMS) within a road related area. When portable VMS are used for special events, such as the Harvest Campaign, the Government Guide to Traffic and Transport Management for Special Events must also be complied with.
- (c) There are 35 boards, 17 on selected routes and 18 near level crossings. These portable, trailer-mounted VMS have been placed on selected routes and busy level crossings during the November 2021 to January 2022 harvest season to advise of road and rail safety messages.
- (d) The portable VMS signs managed by Transport for NSW and used on the New South Wales State Road network must comply with Australian Standards AS 4852.2 Variable message signs, Part 2: Portable sign. Relevant legislation and guidelines for installation of the signs must also be followed. The signs meet AS/NZS 1906.1.
- (e) The Australian Standards Road Traffic Signals Committee is not required to approve signage on variable message boards as the messages included on these signs are short and concise, to ensure readability for drivers.
- (f) These messages are not in the traffic sign register as they are not standard traffic signs. The messages displayed on the temporary VMS are short and concise and consistent with other road safety messages used throughout the state.
- (g) Portable VMS are only for temporary use and meet design requirements. The messages displayed on the temporary VMS are short and concise and consistent with other road safety messages used throughout the state.
- (h) No, approval is not required as the signs are not prescribed control devices and are provided as advisory during a temporary campaign.
  - (i) No, the signs are not prescribed traffic control devices.

- (j) The Harvest Season campaign is a partnership with GrainCorp aimed at reminding road users to take care on roads during the busy harvest season. Transport for NSW promotes the campaign on its Road Safety Facebook page.

- (a) What dates was the office closed?
- (b) What was the reason for the closure of the office?

Answer—

As at 26 November 2021, the Maitland Service Centre has been closed on two separate occasions since 1 January 2021 in line with NSW Health advice as a result of COVID-19 exposures and close contact classifications at the site.

The centre was closed from 2pm on 10 August and all day on 11 August 2021 and again on 1 and 2 November 2021. Details of the centre closure were published on the Service NSW website and signage was put in place onsite.

The Maitland Service Centre serves approximately 350 to 400 customers per day.

# I am advised:

While Transport for NSW does not have a classification of 'inactive' in relation to level crossings on rail lines, in this context there are level crossings on non-operational and disused rail lines. There are more than 3,000 kilometres of non-operational lines on the New South Wales rail network, with the vast majority located on the Country Regional Network (CRN).

In 2016, Transport for NSW identified the need for a comprehensive works program to be undertaken across the CRN to assess each level crossing on non-operational line. Consultation also occurred with the applicable road manager and where appropriate, ensured that the road signage was altered to be reflective of the actual road and rail condition.

- \* 6846 MORPETH RAILWAY STATION MAINTENANCE—Ms Jenny Aitchison to ask the Minister for Agriculture and Western New South Wales—
  - (1) Who is responsible for the maintenance and upkeep of the building and lands at the old Morpeth Railway Station?

- \* 6847 CONTINGENCY PLANS FOR COVID-19 CLOSURES IN SCHOOLS—Ms Jenny Aitchison to ask the Minister for Skills and Tertiary Education representing the Minister for Education and Early Childhood Learning—
  - (1) Were school bus operators advised that New South Wales schools would be shut down prior to them being shut down?
    - (a) If so, by whom?
    - (b) What operational plans were put in place to protect students who attended other schools but caught the same buses?
  - (2) What operational plans were put in place by the NSW Department of Education to isolate students who were siblings of students at shut down schools?
  - (3) What contingency plans have been put in place to assist students facing HSC exams with completing the exams where their school was closed?

### Answer-

- (1) The State Emergency Operations Centre is advised when a school is made non-operational and disseminates information to other agencies including Transport for NSW and NSW Police Force. Where a school is made non-operational during a school day parents are advised to collect their children directly from the school. Principals provide on the ground co-ordination of arrangements for students where a school is made non-operational during the school day.
- (2) The identification of close contacts is undertaken in consultation with NSW Health in line with NSW Health approved risk framework. Cohorts are kept separate to reduce risk of transmission. A positive case is advised by NSW Health and household members are required to self-isolate as part

of their contact tracing processes. A sibling of a positive case would be collected by a parent from the school if they were identified as a close contact during the school day.

- (3) Additional safety measures were put in place to ensure COVID-safe HSC exams. This included screening of students, hygiene packs, ventilation and identification of alternate venues. With these layered measures in place, approximately 400,000 individual exam sessions were successfully delivered state-wide with no COVID-19 disruption.
- (4) Detailed information on regarding COVID-safe HSC exams was provided to schools at the start of the term and was also available publicly. Principals also received a reminder of this advice in the lead up to the exams.
- (5) Non-government schools operate under the same NSW Health risk framework as government schools, undertaking their own contact tracing processes in consultation with NSW Health. The Department assists in the recording and reporting of this information.

The Department continues to work with NSW Health and the Commonwealth Government to respond to the COVID-19 pandemic. The Department regulates rather than operates early childhood education and care (ECEC) services, including Out of School Hours Care Services, in accordance with the National Law and National Regulations, except for preschools attached to NSW public schools. The National Regulations stipulate that approved providers must ensure that reasonable steps are taken to prevent the spread of infectious disease, and that there must be policies and procedures in place in relation to dealing with infectious disease.

The Department is working closely with NSW Health to ensure that appropriate information is available for ECEC services. Guidance is available on the Department's website and services are informed via email when further information is available. The Department also has an Information and Enquiries line and provides assistance with enquiries and requests from the sector.

Contingency plans and COVID-related procedures for Departmental preschools are the same as the public schools to which they are attached. They have an added requirement to notify the Regulatory Authority when the school or preschool is closed due to a COVID-19 case.

- \* 6848 COUNTRY UNIVERSITIES CENTRES—Mrs Helen Dalton to ask the Minister for Skills and Tertiary Education—
  - (1) How much in total has the Government spent on all Country Universities Centres since the first Centre was opened in 2017?
  - (2) How many students in total have been supported by all Country Universities Centres since 2017?

Answer-

- The Government has committed two \$8 million grants to Country University Centres since 2017 (\$16 million in total) of which \$11.26 million has been expended to date.
- (2) This information is reported in the Annual Reports for Country University Centres. According to those reports, 2,727 students have been supported in New South Wales centres since 2017.
- (3) Australian universities have contributed \$873,784 to Country University Centres since 2017.
- (4) This information is reported to the Commonwealth Department of Education Skills and Employment, which publishes aggregate student statistics online.

- (5) The current Government grant runs until 2023. The Country University Centre is responsible for its financial strategy including diversification and sustainability.
- \* 6849 FISHERS ACCESS TO HUNTHAWANG SECTION OF LACHLAN VALLEY NATIONAL PARK— Mrs Helen Dalton to ask the Treasurer, and Minister for Energy and Environment—

Considering the Hunthawang section of Lachlan Valley National Park is closed for general public access, will the Government consider a trial, allowing a small number of fishers to access Hunthawang for on-park fishing and camping opportunities?

Answer-

I am advised that the National Parks and Wildlife Service (NPWS) has permitted limited vehicle access to the Hunthawang section of Lachlan Valley National Park in support of the annual Hillston Hook Line and Sinker Fishing Festival. Other opportunities to launch small boats and undertake fishing are available in the immediate vicinity of the park, as in the nearby Lachlan River Campground beside the Kidman Way. Once on the river, fishers can access the park along the river as the river is not part of the park.

\* 6850 SELF-HARM IN MURRUMBIDGEE REGIONAL HIGH SCHOOL STUDENTS—Mrs Helen Dalton to ask the Minister for Skills and Tertiary Education representing the Minister for Education and Early Childhood Learning—

How many students at Murrumbidgee Regional High School self-harmed or attempted suicide in each of the calendar years 2018, 2019, 2020 and 2021?

Answer—

The Department of Education has an obligation to maintain student privacy and confidentiality. Releasing the requested data may enable the easy identification of a student and therefore it will not be provided.

- \* 6851 YANCO AGRICULTURAL HIGH SCHOOL—Mrs Helen Dalton to ask the Minister for Skills and Tertiary Education representing the Minister for Education and Early Childhood Learning—
  - (1) Given that, contrary the original advice of 18 January 2021, the project to upgrade the girls' boarding facilities at Yanco Agricultural High School has not progressed from the planning phase (as of 3 November 2021), what are the specific reasons for the delay in progressing these major works?
    - (a) By what date will construction commence?
    - (b) By what date will it be completed?

Answer-

The Government is increasing its investment in public education infrastructure, with funding for 44 new and upgraded school projects announced as part of the NSW 2021-22 Budget. This includes an upgrade of Yanco Agricultural High School and will include an upgrade to the boarding facilities to ensure they are fit for purpose for current and future students.

The progress of individual projects is communicated to school communities through regular project updates as they become available on the School Infrastructure NSW website at www.schoolinfrastructure.nsw.gov.au

# \* 6852 HIGH-VOLTAGE ELECTRICITY INFRASTRUCTURE ANNUAL RENT—Mrs Helen Dalton to ask the Treasurer, and Minister for Energy and Environment—

In lieu of the current one-off, compulsory-acquisition compensation payment, will the Government consider paying an annual rent, along the lines of that paid to hosts of renewable energy generators, to landholders who are forced to host new high-voltage electricity infrastructure, so as to retain overall land values, compensate for loss of productive land, and avoid lumping farmers with a capital gains event?

# Answer-

The Land Acquisition (Just Terms Compensation) Act 1991 sets out a process for the compulsory acquisition of land for electricity infrastructure and the relevant considerations for the amount of compensation paid to landholders, which includes, among other matters, the market value of the land, special value and loss due to severance or disturbance.

Questions on the efficacy of the compulsory acquisition process should be referred to the Minister for Water, Property and Housing.

As part of its role in implementing the Government's Electricity Infrastructure Roadmap and delivering Renewable Energy Zones (REZs), the Energy Corporation of NSW (EnergyCo NSW) is exploring opportunities to ensure the contribution landholders make in hosting essential transmission infrastructure is fairly and respectfully recognised. This is in recognition of the supporting role of regional communities in the delivery of a modern electricity grid for New South Wales.

\* 6853 NSW CIVIL AND ADMINISTRATIVE TRIBUNAL - INTERSTATE JURISDICTION—Mr Alex Greenwich to ask the Attorney General, and Minister for Prevention of Domestic and Sexual Violence—

Does the NSW Civil and Administrative Tribunal have interstate jurisdiction for consumer complaints?

Answer-

I am advised:

The NSW Civil and Administrative Tribunal (NCAT) has interstate jurisdiction for consumer complaints up to the value of \$40,000 where a contract was entered into, goods supplied or services given in NSW and if one of the parties is, at the time of lodging an application at NCAT:

- a corporation,
- a resident of a territory,
- a non-permanent resident of a different state, or
- a party who resides overseas.

NCAT does not have jurisdiction for consumer complaints if, at the time of lodging an application at NCAT, one party is a permanent resident of one state and the opposing party a resident of a different state.

- (1) What specific actions are being taken by Transport for NSW to act on reports of sexual assault on ride share platforms?
- (2) What actions are being taken in response to the confidential audit conducted by the NSW Point to Point Transport Commission around incidents on the UBER platform?
  - (a) Why was the audit not published?

Answer-

I am advised:

The Point to Point Transport Commissioner is New South Wales's independent regulator for taxis, rideshare and hire vehicles. Regular audits are one of the ways the Commissioner ensures compliance with the law by point to point drivers and operators as well as the safety of point to point customers.

Point to point transport law requires drivers to go through a range of thorough checks – when they are being on boarded and ongoing – such as background criminal checks and driver eligibility checks. The Commissioner has made it easier for the point to point industry to run their businesses safely by providing them with an online tool – the Driver Vehicle Dashboard – which enables them to run ongoing checks on drivers and vehicles in New South Wales.

More than 22 million checks were run on drivers and more than 9.5 million on vehicles during the last financial year.

Under the Point to Point Transport (Taxis and Hire Vehicles) Act 2016 (the Act), taxi and booking service providers must notify the Point to Point Transport Commissioner of a notifiable occurrence, that being an occurrence of a serious nature that affects a passenger service, including sexual assault. Failure to do so is an offence prescribed by the Act.

The Point to Point Transport Commissioner recently issued Uber with 13 improvement notices and approximately \$200,000 in fines following an audit under the Act. The Commissioner's staff are actively working with Uber to ensure they make the required changes and improvements.

The Act limits disclosure of information obtained in connection with the administration or execution of the Act and its associated Regulations.

\* 6856 URBAN SENSITIVE WATER DESIGN—Ms Jo Haylen to ask the Minister for Planning and Public Spaces, and Minister for Transport and Roads—

What actions is the Government taking to strengthen urban sensitive water design in the NSW Planning system?

### Answer-

I am advised:

The Department of Planning, Industry and Environment (the Department) recently released the draft Design and Place State Environmental Planning Policy (SEPP) for public exhibition in December 2021.

The SEPP package includes a new Urban Design Guide which will apply to planning proposals and development on land to which the SEPP applies that has a site area greater than 1 hectare.

One objective within the Urban Design Guide is specifically dedicated to water quality, retention and management – all elements of water sensitive urban design.

The draft SEPP and draft Guide are available to view on the NSW Planning Portal at <u>https://www.planningportal.nsw.gov.au/design-SEPP-2021</u>.

The Department is also ensuring State-led planning and rezonings include stronger controls and requirements for water design. For example, the Aerotropolis development control plan applies a landscape-led approach, with specific controls provided for management of blue and green infrastructure to ensure they are considered at the start of the design process.

Additionally, the recently completed Wilton development control plan ensures any new development is consistent with the Wilton 2040 vision of creating a liveable new place in the natural environment. Specifically, the plan will ensure that water management measures for development incorporate key principles of water sensitive urban design to help protect, maintain or restore waterway health of identified high value waterways with a minimum requirement of maintaining current health.

\* 6857 MARRICKVILLE SOUTH COVID-19 SUPPORT—Ms Jo Haylen to ask the Minister for Families, Communities and Disability Services—

What additional support services has the Department of Communities and Justice deployed to communities living in social and community housing in South Marrickville over the course of the Delta outbreak?

Answer-

I am advised:

The Department of Communities and Justice (DCJ) has provided wide ranging support to social and community housing tenants during the Delta outbreak.

These supports have included;

- Suppling facemasks to all social housing residents living in multi-unit dwellings
- Providing regular Health alerts and updates via SMS messages
- Providing information on vaccination locations, dates and times. Including, links to make vaccination appointments were also provided.

In response to a small number of COVID-19 positive cases or exposure to COVID-19, DCJ hand delivered letters to tenants and sent SMS messages. These letters and messages contained information from NSW Health, and information about how to access supports and information from DCJ.

A1800-hotline was activated by DCJ once it was aware of COVID-19 exposure in multi-unit dwellings in Marrickville. This 1800 number was available to the tenants of properties in Marrickville, enabling them to contact DCJ for support.

Community housing providers (CHPs); St George Community Housing (SGCH), Bridge Housing, Metro Housing and the Women's Housing Company also provide a small number social housing homes in the Marrickville area.

CHPs continue to provide welfare calls to vulnerable clients, referrals to support services as appropriate and support households impacted by wage reductions related to the pandemic. CHPs provide engagement and wellbeing activities online using technology to connect people and the community, sharing up-to-date health information on websites and across a range of social media platforms, in line with messaging distributed by DCJ and NSW Health. CHPs also distributed masks to Marrickville clients and increased common area cleaning in high density complexes.

- \* 6858 PUBLIC HOUSING AT LIVINGSTONE ROAD, MARRICKVILLE—Ms Jo Haylen to ask the Minister for Water, Property and Housing—
  - (1) What maintenance work is currently being conducted at the public housing at the corner of Addison Road and Petersham Road, Petersham?
    - (a) What is the total amount of money being spent on these maintenance works?
    - (b) When these maintenance works are completed, what will be the total cost of the remaining backlog of maintenance works at the property?

I am advised:

- (1) The Land and Housing Corporation (LAHC) is undertaking upgrading works at Livingstone Road, Marrickville. Works include conservation and repairs to the facades of the buildings, roof replacements, structural repairs, and stormwater, electrical and fire safety upgrades.
  - (a) Approximately \$2 million.
  - (b) LAHC bases its maintenance expenditure on priority and need.
- \* 6859 COVID-19 MISINFORMATION—Ms Jo Haylen to ask the Minister for Health and Medical Research—
  - (1) How many reports or complaints of misinformation about COVID-19 or vaccinations for COVID-19 have been reported to the Health Care and Complaints Commission (HCCC) since the Delta outbreak in June?
    - (a) How many of these complaints have been investigated by the HCCC?
    - (b) How many of these investigations have resulted in a criminal or adverse finding?

Answer—

(1) I am advised that the Health Care and Complaints Commission (HCCC) case management system does not separately capture and record COVID-19 complaints concerning 'misinformation' or 'vaccination' as a specific issue category. Complaints are recorded across a range of the standard issue categories, including treatment, conduct, communication, medication, and consent.

For the period 1 June to 20 November 2021, there have been 1,362 complaints received about COVID-19 related matters.

- (a) Of the total number of COVID-19 complaints received during the period 1 June to 20 November 2021, 61 complaints have been referred for formal investigation.
- (b) Criminal findings are a matter for police and the courts. The HCCC refers any elements of potential criminality to police as part of the investigative process. These investigations are recent and the associated actions and findings are still in the process of being determined.
- \* 6860 ECONOMIC IMPACT OF THE INNER WEST LIGHT RAIL—Ms Jo Haylen to ask the Minister for Planning and Public Spaces, and Minister for Transport and Roads—
  - (1) Is the Government modelling the economic impact of shutting down the Inner West Light Rail for up to 18 months?
    - (a) If not, why not?
    - (b) If so, what is the projected economic impact of the closure?

- (2) What contact has the Government made with impacted local businesses along the line?
- (3) Given the impact on these businesses, particularly following the long shutdown due to the COVID-19 Delta outbreak, is the Government preparing a compensation package?
  - (a) If so, when will businesses be able to apply?
  - (b) What will be the criteria for businesses to be eligible for compensation?
  - (c) How much compensation will businesses be able to apply for?

Transport for NSW recognises that, with the backdrop of the COVID-19 economic recovery, collaboration with local Government, businesses and community is key to achieving good outcomes.

Transport for NSW is working alongside the Small Business Commissioner to engage with and support businesses impacted by the light rail suspension.

Transport for NSW's initial engagement and communication was focused on implementing and communicating the long-term replacement service plan. Transport for NSW has supported Transdev, the operator of the Sydney Light Rail network, in liaising with key stakeholders including schools about these changes.

Transdev has issued notification emails to over 230 business and community groups along, or with an interest in, the L1 Dulwich Hill Line, as well as the L2 Randwick Line or L3 Kingsford Line and surrounding areas. Additionally, courtesy calls were made to schools and major stakeholders. As part of these communications, Transdev provided advice on the replacement bus services available.

Transport for NSW and Transdev will continue to provide extensive proactive communications, both onmode and on-line, about the closure of the L1 Dulwich Hill Light Rail Line, particularly in relation to the alternative transport arrangements that are in place.

- \* 6861 INNER WEST LIGHT RAIL REPLACEMENT BUS ACCESSIBILITY—Ms Jo Haylen to ask the Minister for Planning and Public Spaces, and Minister for Transport and Roads—
  - (1) Are all replacement buses servicing the Inner West Light Rail line fully accessible, including featuring LED destination signs on the front of the bus to assist those who are vision impaired?

- (3) Transport for NSW project management and contractors attended the factory in Spain and were present at various stages during the manufacturing process.
- \* 6865 METRO WORKS SHUT DOWN—Ms Jo Haylen to ask the Minister for Planning and Public Spaces, and Minister for Transport and Roads—

The next stage of major work to upgrade the T3 Bankstown Line to metro standards will take place between 26 December 2021 and 9 January 2022, when there are fewer customers on the rail network.

Rail replacement bus services will be provided during this period. A number of bus services will also operate to transport customers to select stations on the T8 Airport and South Line.

Consultation with the local community is now open on proposed temporary parking changes to accommodate the additional bus services and keep customers moving during the upgrade works.

There are over 8,500 covered outdoor learning areas (COLAs) and shade structures in Government schools, with 368 COLAs and shade structure projects completed in the past 2 years.

There is a comprehensive range of measures in place, including the staggered return of students, vaccinations of all school staff, servicing and cleaning of air conditioning systems, outdoor teaching, use of masks, additional hygiene supplies and enhanced cleaning.

Schools continue to be provided with updated advice and support on a range of infection control and hygiene measures, as well as a stock of hand sanitiser and supplies of personal protective equipment.

Future Directions is a ten year strategy to drive better outcomes for social housing tenants and is underpinned by three strategic priorities: more social housing; more opportunities, support and incentives to avoid and/or leave social housing; and a better social housing experience.

The time an applicant waits for social housing depends on:

- The number of suitable vacancies, and how many social housing properties are in the allocation zone
- The number of approved applicants looking for the same type of property in their allocation zone

- Acceptance of offers of public housing, community housing or Aboriginal housing (for eligible applicants)
- The number of people approved for priority housing above people who do not have a priority need.

Applicants with complex housing requirements must demonstrate they are in need of urgent housing and are not able to rent privately by showing they have tried to find accommodation in the private rental market before they can be considered for priority housing.

Private rental assistance (PRA) can be offered to clients, either in place of social housing or while they are waiting on the NSW Housing Register. PRA helps clients to establish or keep a sustainable tenancy in the private rental market.

PRA products include Rentstart which includes Rentstart Bond Loan (an interest-free loan to help clients start a private rental tenancy) and Advance Rent (extra financial support for clients in crisis, to establish a private rental tenancy). Additionally Private Rental Brokerage service, Bond Extra and Private Rental Subsidies are options available under the private rental assistance offered by DCJ. Further details about these PRA products are available on the DCJ website.

- Deploying NSW Police Force Multicultural Liaison Officers (MCLOs) to engage with local domestic violence networks and support agencies to provide education and guidance. MCLOs have worked alongside other NSW Police Force personnel to deliver key messaging in multiple languages.
- In March 2020, a MCLO was specifically assigned to the Fairfield City PAC to assist the Command's Domestic Violence Team.
- In April 2021 the Fairfield City Capability and Prevention team was established. The Team prioritises the arrest of domestic violence offenders, monitors their compliance with Apprehended Domestic Violence Orders (ADVOs), and bail conditions.
- Fairfield City PAC is also currently in the process of establishing the Women's Domestic Violence Court Assistance Support (WDVCAS) co-location project. It is anticipated that this project will commence in early 2022.
- The Fairfield City PAC also takes part and utilises other NSW Police Force projects and initiatives to address domestic violence in the Fairfield area.

## Answer—

The Government's COVID-19 Economic Recovery Strategy sets a state-wide roadmap to recover jobs, support vulnerable communities, and restore business activity and confidence.

The \$5 billion WestInvest Fund will support medium-term economic recovery, help create jobs and improve the quality of life of the people and communities of Western Sydney. The Fairfield LGA is one of the 15 eligible LGAs that will be able to access the WestInvest Fund.

\$3 billion is allocated for:

- parks, urban spaces, and green space
- enhancing community infrastructure
- modernising local schools
- creating and enhancing arts and cultural facilities
- revitalising high streets
- clearing local traffic.

\$2 billion is allocated for high priority projects, to be developed in consultation with local communities.

What measures does the Government have in place to support families in the Fairfield electorate who care full-time for children with disabilities?

## Answer-

The Government is investing \$3.6 billion in the NDIS in 2021-2022.

At 30 September 2021, there were 72,713 children and young people in New South Wales (under the age of 18) being supported directly through NDIS plans and a further 4,525 being supported through the Early Childhood Approach.

\* 6915 MANUFACTORING SECTOR JOB LOSSES—Mr Guy Zangari to ask the Minister for Jobs, Investment, Tourism and Western Sydney, and Minister for Trade and Industry—

What measures does the Government have in place to ensure no more jobs are lost in the manufacturing sector in Fairfield and Southwest Sydney?

New South Wales is a leader in established and emerging manufacturing sectors such as food and beverage manufacturing, medtech, aerospace and defence, sectors which the Government has prioritised for support in our 2040 Economic Blueprint, Advanced Manufacturing Industry Development Strategy and Global NSW Strategy.

New South Wales produces almost one-third of Australia's total manufacturing output, generating around \$32 billion in industry value, and directly employs around 270,000 people, almost a third of all jobs in the sector nationwide. Western and South Western Sydney are critical to our manufacturing sector.

The Premier has recently announced a Commissioner for Modern Manufacturing. The Commissioner's role will be to identify local research and ideas that we can turn into manufacturing opportunities and jobs. This work will be supported by a taskforce headed by Tony Shepherd.

The Government is already supporting New South Wales manufacturing companies to diversify their supply chains and expand domestically and internationally. We are expanding our international trade and investment network to open doors to manufacturing businesses and industries to participate in global supply chains, connecting New South Wales with more suppliers, buyers and investors.

The Government will continue to fund the Industry Capability Network to provide supply chain matching services to SMEs, in sectors including manufacturing, to access private and public sector projects.

The Government's \$250 million NSW Jobs Plus program is supporting the expansion of New South Wales productive capacity and the reshoring of manufacturing supply chain components. Jobs Plus is designed to support Australian and international companies, including manufacturers, who want to enter or expand their footprint in New South Wales by reducing the cost of establishment, financial risk or increasing their speed to market.

The Government has announced funding for the First Building in the Bradfield City Centre - a multipurpose facility that will support advanced manufacturing capabilities covering additive manufacturing, machining, composites and manufacturing digitisation and automation technology. This First Building is a significant first step towards the larger scale Advanced Manufacturing Research Facility.

And the Government is further supporting the state's advanced manufacturers through targeted and specialised workforce development and manufacturing skills programs such as:

- VET Diploma of Applied Technologies
- Driving Digital Skills program; and
- Digital Engineering Higher Apprenticeship model.
- \* 6916 PROBLEM GAMBLERS IN FAIRFIELD—Mr Guy Zangari to ask the Minister for Customer Service, and Minister for Digital—
  - (1) How many problem gamblers have been identified in the Fairfield electorate as at November 2021?
    - (a) Has this number increased or decreased since the beginning of the COVID-19 pandemic in 2020?
    - (b) What measures has the Government put in place to combat online problem gambling?

Answer-

- - (a) This information is not available.

(b) The Commonwealth Government has primary responsibility for online gambling through the Interactive Gambling Act 2001 (Cth). The Commonwealth Government prohibits certain online services such as online casinos, in-play sports betting and betting on unlicensed wagering provider platforms to protect consumers.

The Government is working with the Commonwealth Government and other States and Territories to deliver the National Consumer Protection Framework for Online Wagering (NCPF). The NCPF is a set of ten consumer protection and harm minimisation initiatives aimed at supporting consumers manage their online wagering activity. Measures delivered already include requirements to offer budgeting tools and easy account closure processes, as well as a ban on certain harmful inducements to gamble.

The Government has also taken steps to remove certain harmful inducements to gamble from being advertised in New South Wales. New South Wales represents the high-water mark in Australia with respect to advertising inducements to gamble. Advertisements that include an inducement to participate or participate more frequently in any gambling activity are prohibited in New South Wales, as are the promotion of live odds during a sporting event. Breaches of these restrictions are actively prosecuted by Liquor and Gambling NSW (L&GNSW).

The Government through the Office of Responsible Gambling develops and implements programs, such as the GambleAware counselling service, that minimise the risk of gambling harm in the community. During the COVID-19 Pandemic between 2020-21, GambleAware saw a shift to online counselling, supporting over 5,300 people with over 29,400 counselling sessions delivered through face-to-face, telephone and online channels.

- \* 6917 HIGH SEVERITY CROWN FIRES—Mr Alex Greenwich to ask the Deputy Premier, Minister for Regional Transport and Roads, and Minister for Regional New South Wales—
  - (1) What assessment has the Government made of the research report 'The severity and extent of the Australia 2019-20 Eucalyptus forest fires are not the legacy of forest management' published in Nature Ecology & Evolution (May 2021)?
  - (2) What action has the Government taken in response to the evidence that trees in previously logged areas were as likely to crown scorch on the mildest bushfire days as were trees in undisturbed forests on severe bushfire days?

## Answer-

A member of the Government's Department of Planning, Industry and Environment is one of the report's authors. Its findings are consistent with those of scientific research by the Department of Primary Industries in 2020, which found no causal link between the extent or severity of the 2019/20 bushfires and native forestry. The DPI study looked at the entire fire-affected area in New South Wales across national parks, State forests and private forests and found that at the landscape scale fire severity was much the same regardless of tenure. The key finding of the Bowman et al research is reflected in the title, "The severity and extent of the Australia 2019–20 Eucalyptus forest fires are not the legacy of forest management".

While there have been a number of construction delays due to the COVID-19 pandemic and the associated Public Health Orders as well as unseasonal wet weather, Transport for NSW is working with the vendors to finalise the upgrade and complete all remaining works.

Ongoing road safety and heavy vehicle compliance programs are continuing without disruption at alternate locations along the Newell Highway and across the entire Western region.

# Answer-

The NSW Suicide Monitoring System data show that suicide deaths in rural and regional New South Wales decreased by nearly 10 per cent in 2020 compared to 2019 (down from 456 to 414). The Suicide Monitoring System data for the Murrumbidgee region is consistent with long term averages and population growth. There were fewer deaths in 2020 (47) than in 2019 (54).

The Black Dog Institute has progressed four pilot programs, called Lifespan, across New South Wales to test the hypothesis that a whole of systems approach to suicide prevention would be most likely to reduce suicides.

The Murrumbidgee Region was one of the pilot sites with the Murrumbidgee Primary Health Network as the lead agency, supported by the members of the Murrumbidgee Mental Health and Drug and Alcohol Alliance and other organisations including NSW Police Force and the NSW Department of Education. Results of the pilot are not yet available as it requires tracking over time.

  - (2) Will the number of staff employed in the Griffith Base Hospital pathology service be reduced?
  - (3) Will the Government maintain the pathology service in Griffith Base Hospital?

Answer-

- (1) All vacant positions at NSW Health Pathology's laboratory located at Griffith Base Hospital are advertised in line with NSW Health recruitment and selection of staff guidelines. Recruiting and retaining medical and scientific positions in rural and regional areas is a recognised challenge across Australia.
- (2) I am advised that there is no plan to reduce the number of staff employed at NSW Health Pathology Griffith.
- (3) NSW Health Pathology is planning to further develop its Griffith laboratory services to meet the current and future clinical needs of the hospital and community. NSW Health Pathology is working with Murrumbidgee Local Health District to plan, design and develop a new Griffith laboratory as part of the \$250 million redevelopment of Griffith Base Hospital.
- \* 6929 DEVELOPMENTAL LANGUAGE DISORDER—Mr Alex Greenwich to ask the Minister for Skills and Tertiary Education representing the Minister for Education and Early Childhood Learning—
  - (1) What data does the Government have about the number of school students who have developmental language disorder (DLD):
    - (a) How many of these students are in schools in the Sydney electorate or inner city?
  - (2) What evidence does the Government have about the likelihood of children with DLD experiencing anxiety, clinical depression and learning difficulties?
  - (3) What measures does the Government have in place to ensure students with DLD are identified and supported in school?

- (1) The Department of Education does not collect this data centrally.
- (2) The Department understands that developmental language disorder (DLD), as a specific learning disorder, is a risk factor for emotional and behavioural difficulties and is associated with higher levels of psychological distress.
- (3) The Department has specialist learning and support teacher positions across New South Wales to assist students with additional learning and support needs, including those with DLD, and their teachers. Schools have access to counselling and psychological services. The school counselling service provides psychoeducational assessments and provides psychological guidance around planning and implementation of support for students with disability, including those with language difficulties. The Department has developed a range of literacy diagnostic assessments for students from Kindergarten through to Year 12. These assessments support teachers to know more about students' literacy and numeracy skills at different stages mapped to New South Wales syllabuses and the National Literacy and Numeracy Learning Progressions. Feedback from these assessments allow for targeted teaching that meets students' specific learning needs. A range of other departmental services are available to schools to support students including specialist learning and wellbeing advice, behaviour supports and transition supports.
  - (a) Schools in the inner Sydney area have access to learning and support positions as well as counselling and psychological services.
    - (i) The Department of Education does not hold this information centrally.
    - (ii) There are no waitlists for students to access the services provided by the Department of Education.
- (4) Through the low-level adjustment of disability (LLAD), schools receive funding to support education of all students who have additional learning and support needs, including those with language difficulties. Students do not need a formal diagnosis of DLD to access support through the LLAD. Students with learning difficulties such as DLD, who also have a confirmed disability, may be eligible for Integration Funding Support (IFS). IFS provide schools with additional funding to support students with disability in mainstream classes who have moderate to high learning and support needs. The COVID Intensive Learning Support Program (COVID ILSP) saw additional funding, professional learning and resources, including student assessment tools, provided to schools to support students whose learning has been most affected by the impact of COVID-19 and other disruptions. Implementation of the COVID ILSP included options for schools to use funding allocations to employ Allied Health Providers, including Speech Pathologists, to support small group tuition.
- (5) The Department has a strong focus on professional learning to build teacher skills to identify and respond to the learning and support needs of students, including students with DLD. Key professional learning and resources include:
  - Three 20-hour and one 40-hour tutor led New South Wales Education Standards Authority (NESA) accredited specialist courses:

Speech, Language and Communication Disorders

Dyslexia and Significant Reading Difficulties

Understanding Autism Spectrum Disorder

• Disability Strategy Inclusion Hub of evidence-based resources and professional learning for teaching and supporting students with disability, including DLD.

Every mainstream New South Wales public school has access to a specialist learning and support teacher to build capacity of teachers to support students with disability, including those with DLD.

Resources are available to assist teachers to access and analyse assessment feedback, inform teaching and learning and communicate with parents and carers about student progress.

- (a) The Department will continue to assess its professional learning and resources to ensure all students can access and fully participate in learning.
- (6) The Department will continue to build on the suite of universal resources to ensure that all students can access and fully participate in learning.

As part of a \$256 million investment, more than 1,350 full time equivalent new Assistant Principals, Curriculum and Instruction positions will be supporting 1,755 schools with Preschool to Year 6 enrolments with an explicit focus on literacy and numeracy. A core part of these roles will support curriculum implementation with the new Kindergarten to Year 2 English and mathematics syllabuses rolling out from 2022.

The positions have an explicit focus on leading schools with evidence-based teaching and assessments to improve student outcomes. The leadership roles will support a strong instructional leadership model in all schools, coordinating professional learning for teachers, monitoring student outcomes, and supporting families to be key partners in student learning.

The new program will begin from 2022, with all positions in place ahead of full implementation of the new K-2 English and Mathematics Syllabuses in 2023.

Answer—

(1) and (2)

Population and development trends are continuously monitored so that the Department of Education can plan to meet enrolment needs at schools across the State. The Sydney Secondary College network is currently able to accommodate student demand and is expected to continue to do so in the short to medium term. Numerous strategies are used in the short to medium term to manage enrolment demand. This can include interventions such as reviewing school intake areas and enforcing the Department's enrolment policy. The use of demountable buildings also allows the Department to be highly responsive to school enrolment needs. Capital works interventions may be considered in cases of longer term or sustained enrolment growth.

(3) and (4)

The Department is aware of the Pyrmont Peninsula Place Strategy and is in close consultation with the Department of Planning Industry and Environment regarding the projected changes to the local population and the service needs for the area. The Department is providing ongoing input as part of the planning work through a Bays West Working Group, as well as feedback on planning proposals through the Statutory Planning process.

(5 and (6)

The Department observes a strategic, place-based approach to school planning that considers changes in land use and supporting infrastructure, so that schools will keep pace with enrolment growth and changing accommodation needs. The Department works with all relevant agencies to ensure school planning is well-coordinated with the delivery of new developments and supporting infrastructure.

When planning for new and upgraded schools the Department considers a range of factors including long term trends in population growth, the likely uptake of new housing by those with school aged children, the ratio of government and non-government school attendance and the size and location of existing schools. A broad range of capital and non-capital works interventions are evaluated and prioritised in the context of the education needs of all schools and school communities across the state.

The Department currently has no plans to add Ultimo and Pyrmont to the Inner Sydney High School local intake area. Enrolments will continue to be monitored in and around Ultimo and Pyrmont to ensure that student enrolment needs are catered for.

High school aged students living in the Ultimo and Pyrmont area are considered local enrolments for Sydney Secondary College, Balmain Campus for Years 7-10 and Blackwattle Bay Campus for Years 11-12. No further action is planned at this stage.

- \* 6931 POLICING OF PEOPLE EXPERIENCING HOMELESSNESS—Mr Alex Greenwich to ask the Minister for Police and Emergency Services—
  - (1) Has the Government reviewed the Public Interest Advocacy Centre (PIAC) and Homelessness NSW report 'Policing Public Space: the experiences of people sleeping rough'?
    - (a) What action has been taken to implement the recommendations?
  - (2) How does the Government ensure NSW Police officers refer people sleeping rough in public spaces to accommodation and support services?
  - (3) How does the Government ensure strong working relationships between police area commands and homelessness services to make certain referrals are made?
  - (4) What training does the Government provide police officers in dealing with vulnerable people who are sleeping rough?
    - (a) What plans are there to update and expand this training?
  - (5) How does the Government ensure that police do not use move on directions and stop and search powers arbitrarily against people who are sleeping rough in the public domain?
  - (6) How does the Government assess how police officers apply the Protocol for Homeless People in Public Places to prevent entrenching disadvantage and to ensure respectful treatment of vulnerable people sleeping rough?

- (7) How does the Government ensure there are no barriers for vulnerable people experiencing homelessness to make complaints about police treatment?
  - (a) How many complaints from people who are homeless have been received in the Sydney City, Kings Cross and Surry Hills commands over the past five years?
  - (b) What action has been taken in response to these complaints?
- (8) What further steps will the Government take to increase accountability for police dealing with vulnerable people who are homeless?

Answer—

I am advised:

(1) to (6) The Department of Communities and Justice is the lead agency of the Protocol for Homeless People in Public Spaces – Engagement and Communication Strategy. The NSW Police Force is one of the signatory agencies to the Protocol.

As a signatory agency to the Protocol, the NSW Police Force is committed to working with the Department of Communities and Justice to enhance the effectiveness of the Protocol by improving accountability and complaints mechanism, promoting better practice and systemic improvements and further staff education and training.

The NSW Police Force's Police Area Commands and Police Districts continue to work closely with local homeless services. The need for collaboration was particularly heightened during the COVID-19 pandemic and the extended lock down periods in New South Wales.

Regular detailed operational advice regarding the COVID response to people experiencing homelessness was circulated to police commands, including the locations and contacts of Specialist Homelessness Services and Vaccination Centres, as well as detailed advice on the application of the Public Health Orders to people experiencing homelessness who tested positive or were identified as close contacts.

(7) The NSW Police Force works with the community and other government agencies through the mechanisms set up under the Protocol for Homeless People in Public Spaces to improve services and reduce barriers for people experiencing homelessness, including improving accountability and complaints processes.

NSW Police Force recording systems allow the complainants homelessness status to be identified, but do not make it compulsory. Complainants are not required to provide this information or if they do, only such information as they choose. Accordingly, accurate statistics cannot be provided.

(8) The NSW Police Force has protocols in place for engaging with vulnerable people, including people who are experiencing homelessness. In addition, the NSW Police Force supports an outreach program specifically for women, and for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander People.

- \* 6932 THERMAL PERFORMANCE OF SOCIAL HOUSING PROPERTIES—Mr Alex Greenwich to ask the Minister for Water, Property and Housing—
  - (1) What data does the Government have about thermal performance in social housing homes and how does the Government assess whether these homes meet liveability standards?
    - (a) What liveability standards does the Government use?
  - (2) How many social housing dwellings in New South Wales operate outside the healthy temperature recommendations of the World Health Organisation (WHO), especially in winter?

(4) What further plans does the Government have to retrofit social housing properties to reduce costs and meet building health standards?

Answer-

(1) This question is a matter for the Treasurer and Minister for Energy and Environment.

(a) The NSW Land and Housing Corporation (LAHC) uses the 'LAHC Dwelling Requirements' and 'Good Design for Social Housing', which incorporate liveability standards and guidelines as its standards for new LAHC dwellings. The documents are publicly available at <u>https://www.dpie.nsw.gov.au/land-andhousing-corporation/news/good-design-for-social-housing</u>.

The design and specification of new Aboriginal Housing Office (AHO) homes is informed by the AHO Design Guidelines. The Design Guidelines were endorsed by the AHO Board in August 2021. The AHO Design Guidelines use the NatHERs star rating system to rate the energy efficiency of a home based on its design and thermal performance. The Design Guidelines identify five key climate zones across New South Wales and set minimum NatHERS ratings that new homes must achieve depending on the climate zone in which they are located.

(2) LAHC and AHO dwellings are designed and constructed to meet New South Wales legislative requirements, including the requirements of the National Construction Code.

(3) and (4) LAHC has retrofitted solar systems at 5,168 properties and energy efficient air conditioners at 2,007 properties since July 2017. Solar systems and air conditioners are prioritised for communities most affected by climatic conditions.

The AHO has a number of retro-fit programs that aim to improve the liveability and energy performance of dwellings across the portfolio. This includes the installation of energy efficient air conditioning split systems and solar PV systems, as well as recladding, roof replacement and window replacement programs. These programs are being delivered through both existing capital upgrade programs and stimulus-funded programs.

As at end of FY20/21, the AHO has delivered solar panels to a total of 3,931 Aboriginal homes/families, which is circa 67 per cent of AHO's property portfolio. The AHO is currently rolling out the solar stimulus program that will provide solar PV systems to a further 1,760 properties. When the program is completed at 30 June 2022, 100 per cent of AHO properties will have solar panels installed.

As at end of FY20/21, the AHO has delivered energy efficient air conditioning and passive energy upgrades (LED lights, door seals, ceiling fans) to a total of 1,200 Aboriginal homes/families so far. The AHO is continuing to roll out the air conditioning program on a further 1,663 properties with the program scheduled to be completed by 30 June 2022.

Recognising that roof failure can have significant impact on asset condition and tenant wellbeing, the AHO has invested heavily in upgrades to roofs. AHO has undertaken over 200 roof replacements across the last two financial years. The roof replacement program includes the upgrading of insulation to improve the thermal performance of the dwelling and reduce the need for mechanical heating/cooling. The AHO also inspects and/or installs insulation when upgrades are untaken on the properties as part of the capital upgrade program.

The AHO has undertaken a project to replace old timber windows with aluminium sliding windows, and to remove external AC sheet and replacing with insulated vinyl cladding. The removal of 'drafty' windows and installations of new cladding provides significant thermal upgrades to our older stock. A total of 294 properties have been upgraded as part of this program.

# \* 6933 COVID-19 ALLOWANCE FOR FRONTLINE HEALTH WORKERS—Mr Alex Greenwich to ask the Minister for Health and Medical Research—

- (1) Considering the Victorian Government has recognised the extraordinary contribution of frontline public health workers through a 'Hospital surge support allowance', what recognition or compensation is the Government providing for frontline public health workers in New South Wales?
- (2) What additional support or compensation is the Government providing to recognise the additional pressure of COVID-19 and Personal Protective Equipment (PPE) requirements for intensive care, emergency and paramedic workers?
- (3) What further action will the Government take to acknowledge and reward frontline public health workers during the extreme pressures on the public health system due to the COVID-19 pandemic?

## Answer—

NSW Health has introduced several measures to support and assist health care workers during the COVID-19 pandemic, including paid special leave, temporary free car parking, access to hotel accommodation where needed for isolation, special leave payment for vaccination outside of normal working hours, flexible work practices, and employee assistance programs.

NSW Health hospital staff are otherwise remunerated in accordance with their applicable award(s). Current Personal Protective Equipment (PPE) policies and guidelines continue to apply.

The Clinical Excellence Commission (CEC) regularly updates and develop new resources to support NSW Health staff. Several educational resources to ensure up to date information on skills and competency as well as health worker safety are available online at <u>https://www.cec.health.nsw.gov.au/</u>

A range of other resources are available to support health workers and their families, including:

- Employee Assistance Program
- <u>JMO Support Line</u>
- <u>Resources for Caring for Yourself and Others</u> during COVID-19 available via the Health Education and Training Institute
- Pandemic Kindness Movement
- The <u>"Shift" App</u> designed in partnership with the Black Dog Institute is aimed specifically at junior doctors to help them safeguard their mental health and manage the demands of their profession.

The Clinical Excellence Commission is also supporting five New South Wales Hospitals to test the implementation of <u>Schwartz Rounds</u>. Schwartz Rounds are a type of structured group forum where clinical and non-clinical staff meet regularly to discuss the emotional and social aspects of working in healthcare. Schwartz Rounds provide an opportunity to take 'time-out' to reflect on work in a collegial and safe space.

The Clinical Excellence Commission also provides all staff with access to tools and resources to promote <u>psychological safety</u> and an awareness of <u>Human Factors</u> for healthcare staff, including the What Matters to Me? Team work and Wellbeing program, which recognises that the ability for staff to provide safe effective person-centred care is affected by how well they feel cared for themselves.

Local health districts and specialty health networks have also developed specific local wellbeing programs that include:

• <u>MDOK in Sydney Local Health District</u>, which is designed specifically for medical staff and supports programs that cover mentorship wellbeing for dealing with busy schedules, healthy preparation for exams, and physical and mental health; and

• The <u>Nursewell App</u> in South Eastern Sydney Local Health District, which provides nurses and midwives with tools to support their self-care. NSW Health continues to work with other agencies across the health system to implement wellbeing strategies, with a particular focus on the impacts of COVID-19.

These include statewide programs offered through the Service for the Treatment and Rehabilitation of Torture and Trauma Survivors, or the Commonwealth funded Open Arms Veterans and Family Counselling service. In Districts that do not offer individual or group treatment with a specific PTSD focus, individuals with PTSD are managed by existing comprehensive adult mental health services, as these consumers often have more than one diagnosis.

It was assessed with all other identified level crossings to be funded under the Program and received a low rank against the other ARTC sites and the Transport for NSW sites.

The Government has demonstrated a commitment to lowering taxes for businesses and reducing the burden that they face so they can re-invest in their business and create new jobs.

In the lead up to the 2019 State Election, the NSW Liberals and Nationals set out a pathway to raise the payroll tax threshold from \$750,000 to \$1 million by 2021-22. These tax cuts were opposed by the NSW Labor Party, which means that businesses would have faced higher tax under a Labor Government.

In addition, as part of the 2020-21 NSW Budget, The payroll tax threshold was permanently increased from \$900,000 to \$1.2 million as of 1 July 2020.

The payroll tax rate for 2020-21 and 2021-22 was also reduced from 5.45 per cent to 4.85 per cent. These tax cuts are expected to provide NSW businesses with around \$2.1 billion in savings in total across 2020-21 and 2021-22.

The due date for the payroll tax 2020-21 annual reconciliation and for monthly returns for July to December 2021 has been extended until 14 January 2022.

Additionally, the Government is providing a 50 per cent reduction of payroll tax liability for customers with grouped wages of no more than \$10 million in 2021-22, who have experienced a 30 per cent decline in turnover.

To assist businesses beyond 14 January 2022, the Government is providing the option of a 12-month interest free payment plan for all deferred payroll tax payments.

Over the last three years, Sydney Metro has received approximately 10 complaints about work at Campsie station, 40 complaints about Canterbury station and 75 complaints about Hurlstone Park. Issues raised by residents in the Canterbury electorate via the Metro Community Line include standard construction related issues such as noise, dust, lighting, and work hours.

Sydney Metro uses a range of noise mitigation measures where feasible, including scheduling high noise impact activities to occur during day-time hours, scheduling respite periods for high noise activities as well as offering alternative accommodation and respite activities to eligible residents and monitoring noise and vibration levels to ensure compliance.

Planning funds were allocated in 2021 and will continue into 2022 to finalise the development of an updated Clinical Services Plan and Investment Proposal for Canterbury Hospital.

Canterbury Hospital is part of the Sydney Local Health District and is strongly networked with both Concord and Royal Price Alfred Hospitals. As part of this network, Canterbury Hospital has the necessary capacity and support to respond to any future healthcare demands related to the COVID-19 pandemic.

(1) The Department of Education and New South Wales Education Standards Authority (NESA) prepared HSC exam guidelines to protect the health and safety of students to minimise the risk of disruptions during the HSC exams. The Department's priority was to ensure schools had appropriate contingency plans in place to enable all students to sit their exams with minimal disruption. Additional measures implemented included mask wearing, ensuring 1.5 metre separation in exam rooms, access to appropriate cleaning and hygiene supplies and plans for alternative venues if a confirmed case of COVID-19 was to impact a school enabled the HSC exams to progress in a form of close to normal operations.

(2) and (3) The Government is delivering a \$100 million air quality assurance program to support ongoing improvements to air quality in New South Wales public schools. Under the program, the Department will provide air purifiers to schools as required.

The vast majority of spaces in schools are adequately ventilated through natural and mechanically assisted ventilation.

Air purification is only recommended where air quality is compromised by bush fire smoke or where natural ventilation cannot be achieved.

This approach is strongly supported by expert advice. Our buildings allow sufficient ventilation and meet the recommended ventilation guidance from the World Health Organisation.

(4) The HSC examinations were completed on 3 December 2021. Schools had identified alternative exam locations in the event an examination was unable to proceed in the planned location. - (1) Total bed numbers at Deniliquin Hospital at 1 July 2021 was 59. This has not changed since 1 July 2018.

- (3) There are currently staff vacancies at the Deniliquin health service in the position of full time equivalent (FTE) permanent registered nurse, FTE temporary registered nurse, FTE permanent enrolled nurse and FTE temporary enrolled nurse. Local health districts have mechanisms in place

to identify vacancies and recruit to positions in accordance with service delivery needs and models of care across their hospitals.

Over 700 properties owned by the NSW Land and Housing Corporation (LAHC) and managed by the Department of Communities and Justice in the Murrumbidgee District have been retrofitted with air conditioners. Air conditioners are prioritised for communities most affected by climatic conditions. Answer-

Services provided by the Western NSW Local Health District have not been reduced.

- <sup>\*</sup> 7003 TEACHING STAFF CRISIS EXPERIENCED ACROSS BARWON—Mr Roy Butler to ask the Minister for Skills and Tertiary Education representing the Minister for Education and Early Childhood Learning—
  - (1) What action is the Minister undertaking to replenish the current teacher crisis within the New South Wales, and in particular Western and Far Western New South Wales?

- (2) Can the Minister confirm how many scholarships will be offered to regional students looking to study education at university over the next 5 years?
- (3) What incentives will the Minister be offering those teachers who seek teaching positions in Western New South Wales towns?
- (4) Lower wages, increased workloads, and lack of new teachers entering the system are said to be amongst the reasons attributed to the decline. Can the Minister advise the benefits of the 'Teacher Supply Strategy' recently introduced by the Government and how will this effectively attract and grow quality teachers, especially in regional and remote areas of New South Wales?

(1) There is no 'teacher crisis' in New South Wales. The premise of this question is untrue and misleading.

To ensure a strong pipeline of teachers joining the profession now and into the future, this year I announced the NSW Teacher Supply Strategy.

The \$125 million Teacher Supply Strategy has three key priorities:

- growing the workforce by making it more attractive to teach;
- retraining and upskilling more teachers in high-demand subjects and specialist areas; and
- boosting the supply of teachers in regional and remote communities.

The Strategy is in addition to an existing spend each year to boost teacher supply, and to implement priority initiatives in response to the review into the Rural and Remote Incentives Scheme.

Key initiatives to boost teacher supply in regional communities include, for example: Recruitment beyond NSW, FASTstream, Casual Work Support, Retraining Teachers, an increase to Teach.Rural scholarships and expanded Rural Experience Program.

- (2) Up to 230 Teacher Education Scholarships, 120 teach.Rural Scholarships, 80 teach.MathsNOW Scholarships and 20 Graduate Teacher Scholarships are available each year to support future teachers, including regional students, while undertaking an initial teacher education qualification. Students will increase their chances of being awarded a scholarship should they be willing to teach in rural or remote locations.
- (3) There are a range of rural and remote incentives available to teachers in eligible rural and remote schools in Western New South Wales, such as the Rural Teacher Incentive, up to 90 per cent rental subsidy, retention benefit, experienced teacher benefit, and recruitment bonus.

Teachers can also access non-financial incentives such as additional leave and professional development days, priority transfers and climatic allowances.

As part of the Rural and Remote Incentives Review, the Government also committed to expanding incentives to temporary teaching staff, and to introduce a range of other measures to improve the attractiveness of teaching in a rural and remote school.

The Teacher Supply Strategy will double the total placements offered under the successful teach.Rural scholarships to 120 per year to attract high quality teachers in rural and remote areas. Furthermore, the Rural Experience Program will be expanded to up to 50 teachers per year.

(4) Building on our existing successful pipeline of teachers, the Strategy will deliver an additional 3,700 teachers with the right subject qualifications placed in locations of need over the next 10 years. This includes delivering 1,600 of these teachers over the first five years of the Strategy.

The Strategy has other benefits in diversifying our teacher pipelines - such as attracting careerchangers, with the right supports - and investing in our existing workforce - such as upskilling school learning support officers (SLSOs) into teaching, and retraining teachers in high-need subject areas.

Answer—

Psychiatrists and psychiatry trainees are employed to provide care to mental health patients. Local health districts and hospitals vary staffing profiles and numbers to appropriately meet operational need at any point in time.

All child and adolescent presentations are triaged and assessed by child and adolescent mental health services (CAMHS) clinicians, then reviewed by a multidisciplinary team to determine the level of response required.

The District CAMHS provides a range of services in the local community to children, adolescents and their families for a range of difficulties that are seriously impacting their mental health and emotional wellbeing.

- \* 7005 FISHERIES OFFICER POSITIONS—Mr Roy Butler to ask the Minister for Agriculture and Western New South Wales—
  - (1) What risk profile would be required for additional Fisheries Officers to be deployed to the Darling River from Bourke to Dareton?

Answer—

(1) The Department of Primary Industries, Fisheries Compliance unit uses a risk based and outcomes focused regulatory framework to assess regulatory risks under its legislative responsibilities and to deploy resources accordingly.

Fisheries Officers work flexibly and are often deployed away from their office locations to respond to new and emerging risks. For example high water levels and aggregations of native fish at certain locations in inland rivers have seen a recent increase in illegal fish trapping being detected in our inland rivers. Localised resources as well as resources from coastal districts under the Temporary Inland Mobile Squads (TIMS) program have been deployed to respond.

- (2) First Year Fisheries Officer roles will be located at Tamworth and Dubbo. The newly recruited roles are for existing positions that have been vacant.
- \* 7006 PURCHASES OF NARRIEARRA STATION AND AVENAL/MOUNT WESTWOOD STATION—Mr Roy Butler to ask the Treasurer, and Minister for Energy and Environment—
  - (1) Will the Minister publish the Socio-Economic assessment for the purchases of both the Narrierra Station and Avenal/Mount Westwood Station with reference to:

- (2) Has the relevance with nationally agreed biodiversity targets been included in the decision to purchase these estates?

- (1) The recent acquisitions were carefully selected, concentrating on areas of the State where important biodiversity and other values have little or no protection in existing national parks and reserves. The acquisitions contain exceptional conservation values. For example, Narriearra Caryapundy Swamp National Park contains the only population of the threatened Grey Grasswren in NSW and Avenel-Mount Westwood contains three regional ecosystems that are not protected anywhere else in the State. Both sites contain significant Aboriginal cultural heritage.
- (2) New South Wales national parks attract more than 60 million domestic visits annually, contributing \$17.9 billion in economic activity and supporting more than 74,000 jobs. Across western New South Wales in 2020-21, more than 47,000 people spent over 134,000 visitor nights in national park campgrounds and accommodation. New acquisitions have already generated additional employment; a new campground has opened at Narriearra Caryapundy Swamp National Park; and substantial investment will occur at Metford-Langidoon and Koonaburra in the next 12 to 18 months.
- (3) The decision to acquire these properties was based on a range of factors including their contribution to the comprehensiveness, representativeness and adequacy of the national parks system (e.g. they contain regional ecosystems not protected in other reserves), as well as the fact they contain habitat for threatened species. This is consistent with State and national biodiversity targets and policies.
  - (a) A summary of the information was published as part of the former Minister's announcement of the new reserves.

Answer-

I refer the Member to the response provided at LA 6328 and note that the Royal Flying Doctor Patient Transport Service is a non-commercial provider that receives government funding. However, if patients incur other costs due to travel or accommodation as part of their treatment, they may be eligible for subsidies for these expenses.

Answer—

Following review of 10 rural floodplain management plans in the Lachlan, Murrumbidgee and Murray valleys, the Department of Planning, Industry and Environment – Water (the Department) is preparing to replace all three floodplain management plans in the Lachlan valley with at least one valley-wide, connected plan.

The Department will use the <u>Technical Manual for Rural Floodplain Management Plans under the Water</u> <u>Management Act 2000</u> (developed for the northern Murray-Darling Basin floodplain management plans) to guide the planning process. Rural floodplain management plans prepared under the Water Management Act 2000 provide the legal framework for coordinating flood work development to:

- Minimise future changes to flooding behaviour
- Improve the environmental health of floodplains, and
- Increase awareness of the high-risk flood areas in rural floodplains.

The Georges Riverkeeper is working with its eight member councils, the Government and the community to transition the Coastal Zone Management Plan into a Coastal Management Program, in accordance with the Coastal Management Act 2016. The Government contributed \$63,692.50 towards the cost of Stage 1 of the Coastal Management Program through the Coastal and Estuary Grants Program. Further, the NSW Litter Prevention Grants Program has funded several grants within the Georges River catchment since the grant program began in 2012-13.

The Government is also using its regulation of potentially polluting activities to reduce pollution impacts on the Georges River. Specifically, the NSW Environment Protection Authority (EPA) is requiring Sydney Water to undertake maintenance works through a pollution reduction program under its environment protection licence to reduce the potential for dry weather sewer overflows reaching the Georges River. A separate risk-based framework is being applied to reduce the potential risk to the environment and human health posed by wet weather sewer overflows.

Additionally, the EPA partners with Sydney Councils and local catchment groups to undertake coordinated inspections twice a year as part of the Get The Site Right Campaign. The campaign coordinates inspections to enforce best practice on commercial and residential building sites and major infrastructure projects to protect our urban waterways, active in the Georges River Catchment.

The NSW Liberals Nationals Government has demonstrated a commitment to lowering taxes for businesses and reducing the burden that they face so they can re-invest in their business and create new jobs.

In the lead up to the 2019 State Election, the NSW Liberals and Nationals set out a pathway to raise the payroll tax threshold from \$750,000 to \$1m by 2021-22. These tax cuts were opposed by the NSW Labor Party, which means that businesses would have faced higher tax under a Labor Government.

In addition, as part of the 2020-21 NSW Budget, The payroll tax threshold was permanently increased from \$900,000 to \$1.2 million as of 1 July 2020.

The payroll tax rate for 2020/21 and 2021/22 was also reduced from 5.45 % to 4.85%. These tax cuts are expected to provide NSW businesses with around \$2.1 billion in savings in total across 2020/21 and 2021/22.

The due date for the payroll tax 2020/21 annual reconciliation and for monthly returns for July to December 2021 has been extended until 14 January 2022.

Additionally, the Government is providing a 50 per cent reduction of payroll tax liability for customers with grouped wages of no more than \$10 million in 2021/22, who have experienced a 30 per cent decline in turnover.

To assist businesses beyond 14 January 2022, the Government is providing the option of a 12-month interest free payment plan for all deferred payroll tax payments.

# Answer-

The Far West Local Health District acted on advice from the NSW Ministry of Health to engage external consultancy firm Johnstaff to support the District to complete the Clinical Service Plan. This action ensured the project would not be delayed as the District did not have available Service Planning capacity. The Ministry paid for the external consultant.

The consultant undertook all stakeholder, community and consumer consultation via virtual modes at the request of the District, and in line with community expectations and COVID-19 related travel restrictions in New South Wales at the time.

The consultant undertook more than 30 virtual stakeholder and consumer engagements during October and November 2021. There was engagement with more than 50 consumers, key stakeholders and other health organisations. This included the local council, other local health and service agencies and the Member for Murray. The virtual community consultation sessions were advertised via local radio, and social media, and undertaken on 10 and 11 November 2021, with eight community members choosing to participate.

#### Answer-

- (1) The Department of Planning, Industry and Environment sells and purchases water allocation periodically, for the following purposes:
  - (a) Generate revenue to contribute to the payment of water use fees associated with water licences (the same costs apply to all water licence holders)
  - (b) Support small infrastructure projects which enhance delivery of water to important river or wetland sites
  - (c) Purchase water for use in another valley or river reach
  - (d) Enable carryover of water into future years.

- (2) A small proportion of water is sold or purchased periodically for the purposes stated depending on environmental demand. A thorough assessment of environmental needs is undertaken prior to making any account water available for sale.
- (3) The Department does not seek to identify individual market participants. The water access licenses that received the water sold by the Department are listed on the public NSW Water Register.
- (4) The Department makes small parcels of water available for purchase via various on-line market exchanges and/or brokerage services. All licence holders within the relevant water source can access these services and the Department offers water in this way to reach the widest range of potential buyers.

I am advised:

Between 21 June 2021 and 21 November 2021, the Department of Communities and Justice (DCJ) provided temporary accommodation to 13,440 households across New South Wales, of which 2,056 were rough sleepers.

DCJ continues to work with people in temporary accommodation to exit into secure and sustainable housing. For those who are at high risk of exiting into homelessness, DCJ extends assistance, so long as they continue to engage with the department on a plan for suitable longer-term housing.

DCJ does not collect all the data requested by the asking Member.

Further investigative works including CCTV investigations were undertaken prior to June 2021.

The contractor, ConnectSydney, will continue to reactively respond to localised flooding at this location.

Answer—

The NSW Ministry of Health is working towards the release of the NSW LGBTIQ+ Health Strategy in early 2022, which includes a strategic priority focused on responding to the health needs of intersex people. The Ministry acknowledges the expertise contributed by Intersex Human Rights Australia to this work, and will further examine the Australian Human Rights Commission report recommendations following the Strategy's forthcoming release.

- \* 7076 AGRICULTURE PHOSPHOROUS RECOVERY—Mr Alex Greenwich to ask the Minister for Agriculture and Western New South Wales—
  - (1) Noting the increasing cost of phosphate fertilizer, unreliable overseas supply chains and scarcity of high-quality rock phosphate, what programs does the Government provide or fund to recover phosphorous used in agriculture?
  - (2) What further action will the Government take to recover phosphorous used in agriculture?

Answer—

(1) The Government has and continues to undertake research and development that seeks to improve the efficiency of use, of applied phosphorus in partnership with industry. This work has been undertaken in collaboration with the grains, cotton, grazing, dairy and horticultural industries. The research is also developing new means of using previously applied phosphorus that is stored in soil but often not available to plants. This research and development has sought to provide farmers with knowledge to more accurately determine required rates of phosphorus and ultimately lead to reduce the use of applied phosphorus.

For example, specific work has focused on the adaptive traits of serradella species in permanent pasture environments to assess their suitability to replace or compliment subterranean clover to reduce phosphorus fertiliser requirements. Precision farming is helping to better target phosphorus applications and reduce overall use, by better understanding the spatial variability of soil chemical properties and limitations.

- (2) The Government has and continues to undertake research and development that fosters the recycling of phosphorus in a number of agricultural production systems. This is through programs that support the safe and efficient re-use of effluent from industries like the dairy industry and recycling of phosphorus containing by-products including biosolids, composts, manures and biochar. These strategies not only reduce phosphorus requirements through rock phosphate derived products but provide a broad range of additional production and environmental benefits.
- \* 7077 CROWN CASINO BREACHES—Mr Alex Greenwich to ask the Minister for Customer Service, and Minister for Digital—
  - (1) Noting continued Victorian Royal Commission exposure of Crown Casino embedded money laundering, regulatory capture, persistent responsible-service-of-gaming breaches and tax avoidance, what assessment has the Government made of the need for review of the New South Wales Barangaroo casino licence?
  - (2) What assessment has the Government made of report's finding that Crown is unsuitable to hold a casino licence due to "illegal, dishonest, unethical and exploitative" conduct and the recommendations for a "special manager" to be appointed to oversee extensive reform?
  - (3) What steps is the Government taking to:
    - (a) Increase penalties for breaches?
    - (b) Increase regulatory powers and resources?
    - (c) Monitor compliance and ensure tax compliance?
    - (d) Ensure industry funds oversight requirements?

  - (4) What protections is the Government implementing to ensure that Crown Casino New South Wales operations operate ethically and within the law?

Answer—

(1) Responsibility for licensing casinos, including disciplinary proceedings against licensees is a matter for the Independent Liquor & Gaming Authority (ILGA). A review of the Barangaroo Restricted Gaming Facility Licence has already been undertaken by ILGA who appointed the Hon. Patricia Bergin SC to inquire into allegations of unlawful conduct at Crown Melbourne and Crown Perth. Commissioner Bergin determined that Crown is currently not a "suitable person" to hold a restricted gaming license under the Casino Control Act 1992.

- (2) The Bergin Inquiry established by ILGA determined that Crown is not a "suitable person" to hold a restricted gaming licence under the Casino Control Act 1992. ILGA and Crown have commenced a consultation process regarding a potential pathway to suitability as required by the Agreements between ILGA, the Government and Crown. ILGA has appointed an Independent Monitor, Kroll, to oversee Crown's remediation reforms that it must implement before it can be considered "suitable".
  - (a) The Finkelstein Royal Commission into Crown Melbourne recently recommended that penalties in be increased. The Government is currently reviewing the Finkelstein recommendations and will consider implementing any recommendations from that inquiry as it implements the recommendations from the Bergin Report.
  - (b) The Bergin Report made 19 recommendations for reform to the regulatory framework for casinos in New South Wales including reforms to regulatory powers and resources. The Government has agreed to support all 19 recommendations either in full or in part. Further work is required to determine the best method of implementation of those recommendations within the broader liquor & gaming regulatory framework.
  - (c) The Bergin Report made 19 recommendations for reform to the regulatory framework for casinos in New South Wales including reforms to ensure ongoing compliance with State and Federal laws. The Government has agreed to support all 19 recommendations either in full or in part. Further work is required to determine the best method of implementation of those recommendations within the broader liquor & gaming regulatory framework.
  - (d) Casinos already pay for regulatory oversight by the Government through the casino supervisory levy.
  - (e) Lobbying and donations, including those involving casino operators, are separately regulated through the Election Funding, Expenditure and Disclosures Act 1981 and the Lobbying of Government Officials Act 2011.
- (4) Aside from implementing the recommendations in the Bergin Report, the Government is undertaking extensive work to impose more stringent conditions on Crown through its internal controls manual, particularly in relation to money laundering controls. The Government is also preparing a compliance plan for the first 100 days of Crown's operation, to be implemented if and when ILGA determines that Crown may open.
- (5) The Government does not support the Commonwealth Government taking the power to regulate casinos. The Government is working with other jurisdictions to ensure cooperation in relation to casinos' compliance with Government and Commonwealth Government laws and the differing regulatory requirements between jurisdictions.
- (6) The Bergin Report made 19 recommendations for reform to the regulatory framework for casinos in New South Wales including reforms to probity and oversight powers. The Government has agreed to support all 19 recommendations either in full or in part. Further work is required to determine the best method of implementation of those recommendations within the broader liquor & gaming regulatory framework.

- (2) Not all schools require security fencing. Alternative risk minimisation strategies are often sufficient to address the security needs of a school. Projects to deliver security fencing are funded as part of

the Department of Education's minor works program, Risk assessments for each school are assessed and approval of funding is based on the greatest need across the State.

(3) The Department of Education has a duty to take reasonable steps to keep students safe from risk of harm while they are at school and engaged in school related activities. The Department meets its duty of care obligations through the actions of its staff.

Staff will only allow students to leave school grounds during school time to the care of a either a parent/caregiver or as directed by court orders giving care of the child to the nominated parent on file.

The Department's Incident Notification and Response Policy and Procedures assist schools to actively respond and arrange appropriate support to ensure the health, safety and well-being of students. Emergency services are contacted as a priority where there is concern for the welfare of the student.

The Department's website provides dedicated information on Protecting and Supporting Children and Young People procedures and the NSW Mandatory Reporter Guide to assist schools in managing the risk where a student's whereabouts are unknown or have absconded from school.

- \* 7121 MORTGAGE RATE IMPACT MODELLING—Mr Paul Scully to ask the Treasurer, and Minister for Energy and Environment—

I am advised:

(1) The Reserve Bank of Australia (RBA) sets the official cash rate in the economy. Increases in the official cash rate impact the economy to the extent to which they influence other interest rates in the economy – particularly mortgage rates.

NSW Treasury have estimated the impact of RBA cash rate increases on the New South Wales economy as part of its economic modelling and forecasting function. This includes the impact of interest rate moves on the household sector, which encompasses household consumption and the housing market.

Based on NSW Treasury's econometric models, a 1 percentage point increase in the cash rate lowers overall state final demand by 0.6%, relative to what was expected.

- Household consumption would be approximately 0.6% lower than where it would have been otherwise, after approximately one year. This is a similar result to what the RBA's own models would suggest.
- Both dwelling investment and house prices would be around 4-5 per cent lower, after approximately one year. Once again, RBA modelling suggests a similar result, with dwelling investment approximately 4% lower.
- (2) Monetary policy is exclusively the domain of the Reserve Bank of Australia. The Government has no control over this policy lever.

No modelling has been undertaken on the relative impact of interest rate hikes across regions due to several factors:

- NSW Treasury does not directly control monetary policy. The Reserve Bank of Australia are dedicated to ensuring the optimum setting for monetary policy to achieve a set macroeconomic objective which includes an assessment of the financial strain on households.
- Interest rates are currently at extreme lows. Even with interest rate increases likely at some stage on the horizon, the setting for monetary policy is expected to remain highly expansionary for many years.
- Regional modelling requires a comprehensive data set which are not readily available. The more granular the geographic area, the less data are available to use as sufficient inputs for an econometric model.

# (1) (a) to (g)

Ettalong Ambulance Station was prioritised to be relocated as part of the \$232 million Rural Ambulance Infrastructure (RAIR) program.

NSW Ambulance and Health Infrastructure worked to identify a new location using best practice modelling software which maps Triple Zero (000) calls to determine the most suitable location for mobile emergency care in the region.

The new site, located at Woy Woy, will ensure paramedics will be in an optimal location to respond to the greatest number of emergency cases in the shortest time. The current station at Ettalong is located outside the area identified by NSW Ambulance Service Planning as providing the best response times for the community.

Current station staff were advised of the planned relocation on 19 November 2021 and this was accompanied by a community consultation program in which representatives from Health Infrastructure and NSW Ambulance doorknocked residents surrounding the proposed site on Ocean Beach Road. A letterbox drop, with a letter and information flyer offering a virtual briefing or follow-up phone call, was also undertaken. Flyers were provided to NSW Ambulance staff as well as to staff and patients at Woy Woy Hospital.

(h) to (k)

Decisions relating to assignment of staff at the new Woy Woy station are still being assessed.

Final allocations to meet current and future demand will be determined prior to the station commencing operations. The new station will include two of the new Intensive Care Unit ambulances being rolled-out in metropolitan and regional New South Wales.

(l) to (v)

NSW Ambulance has property values for all its sites across New South Wales, with the most recent valuation completed in September 2020. This information is commercial in-confidence. NSW Ambulance has not consulted any developers or potential buyers regarding the Ettalong site.

The planning and development application for new ambulance stations includes a traffic management plan. A draft traffic management report has been completed and the RAIR project team is engaging with Central Coast Council as part of the planning approval process.

After an analysis of the growth in demand for ambulance services, Ettalong received a paramedic staff enhancement in 2018-19. Following this enhancement, there was \$185,000 refurbishment on the first floor flat and establishing access to accommodate the staff.

The new station at Woy Woy is expected to be operational in 2023. The existing Ettalong Ambulance Station will remain operational until the new station is complete.

Paramedics are a mobile workforce and the response to an emergency call within the Central Coast area is provided by the nearest available paramedics at the time. This is consistent with the operational practices of ambulance services throughout Australia and overseas.

The new site at Woy Woy has been identified by NSW Ambulance Service Planning modelling as being the best location for a new ambulance station for the majority of the community. This means paramedics at the new station will be in an optimal position to respond to the greatest number of emergency cases in the shortest time.

For roads that are not subject to road upgrades and affected by high levels of road traffic noise, including the contribution from heavy vehicles, Transport for NSW's Noise Abatement Program provides noise mitigation for eligible properties. Over 20 dwellings on the Cumberland Highway have been provided architectural treatment for high levels of road traffic noise under this program. Further information about the program is available on Transport for NSW's website. Other measures in place to mitigate aspects of heavy vehicle noise include conducting regular inspection of heavy vehicles for faulty noise emission control equipment and issuing defect notices, where warranted, and installing compression brake signs on all major truck routes at strategic locations to advise truck drivers to limit the use of compression brakes near residential areas.

## Answer—

The Government has significantly increased funding to gambling harm prevention since 2018, with \$37 million allocated in 2021/22 from the Responsible Gambling Fund. This funding is administered by the

Office of Responsible Gambling who implements a range of programs and initiatives to prevent and reduce gambling harm, including education and awareness programs for the community.

In 2021, the Government implemented the first-ever gambling awareness gambling targeted at multicultural communities. The investment of \$1.4 million in the The Number that Changed my Life campaign was designed in consultation with culturally and linguistically diverse communities in South West Sydney, to raise awareness of gambling harm and reduce stigma in the Chinese, Vietnamese, Korean, Hindi, and Arabic communities.

Evaluation results show it is raising awareness of gambling problems and of GambleAware, generating strong community advocacy, normalising conversations about gambling and driving calls to the helpline and visits to the website. 75% of the primary audience who saw the campaign took some positive action

In addition a range of specific grants for gambling harm awareness programs located in the Fairfield Local Government Area (LGA) have been funded, including:

- Two Fairfield projects under the Odds on Youth program, with \$116,000 in funding for Fairfield Council's 'Pay to Play' project which is working on a series of co-designed videos with young people to raise awareness of gambling harm; and The Woodville Alliance's 'Game Over: the Vietnamese Youth Project' which is working with young people from the Vietnamese community on a series of youth-friendly and culturally appropriate videos to raise awareness.
- \$191,000 in grant funding under the Local Prevention Grants Program for Fairfield City Council's Responsible Gambling Community of Practice project. The project aims to educate, facilitate, promote, train, and build the capacity of local community organisations, community workers, and practitioners to deliver best-practice prevention and gambling harm reduction programs in the Fairfield LGA.
- \$235,600 in grant funding to South Western Sydney Primary Health Network to implement a pilot gambling screening tool for use in the Fairfield LGA and establish the Fairfield City Health Alliance, which includes membership from the South Western Sydney Primary Health Network (PHN), South West Sydney Local Health District (LHD), Fairfield City Council. Building from the success of this pilot, the screening tool is to be expanded more broadly within South West Sydney in 2022, with additional funding to be allocated to its expansion.
- \$156,000 grant funding for the Western Sydney Community Forum (Forum) to develop a culturally responsive framework to address gambling related harm. The Forum had representatives from across Western Sydney, including Fairfield City Council, South Western Sydney PHN and non-profit organisations that operate in the Fairfield region. This framework is now in use across South Western Sydney.

GambleAware services throughout New South Wales were established in New South Wales from 1 July 2021, following an extensive reform to the way support and services are delivered to those experiencing gambling harm in New South Wales. In 2021/22 \$17.5 million has been allocated to GambleAware services which provide community education, support and counselling via multiple modes including face to face, telephone and online.

GambleAware South West Sydney is operated by the University of Sydney and key centres include Fairfield, Bankstown, Liverpool, Campbelltown, Bonnyrigg, Wingecarribee and Wollondilly.

There is also a GambleAware Multicultural Service, which provides additional counselling and support to multicultural communities, where GamleAware Providers do not have capacity and work with GambleAware services to increase cultural capability in providing services to diverse communities.

  - The River Canoe Club of NSW and the Cooks River Association (\$100,000) to continue work commenced under the existing grant

Sydney Local Health District established mobile COVID-19 vaccination clinics in Ashfield during the Delta outbreak in partnership with local communities, to offer vaccines to local residents and vulnerable communities.

Overall, there are more than 3,200 COVID-19 immunisation providers across New South Wales, including general practitioners, GP respiratory clinics, community pharmacies and Aboriginal Controlled Community Health Services, in addition to NSW Health vaccination clinics. - (1) The Government is delivering a \$105.5 million program to support food waste recycling in New South Wales. This includes the Love Food Hate Waste education program to help households and businesses reduce food waste and initiatives to increase food donation, help councils introduce kerbside collection services, increase processing infrastructure and ensure there are strong markets for the recycling product.
- (2) Funding for food waste recycling spans multiple programs over multiple years. Waste Less, Recycle More includes \$105.5 million over nine years for food waste recycling. I am advised the EPA managed budget for food waste programs in 2021-22 is \$2.5 million.
- (3) The Government is continuing its long-standing support for councils to expand food waste recycling. Over the next five years, Government has allocated \$69 million to deliver on new mandates under the new Waste and Sustainable Materials Strategy for all New South Wales households and certain businesses to have source separated food and garden waste collections by 2030.

Students and staff upload their rapid antigen home test results through an app which is monitored by each school.
- (2) As at 13 December 2021, 26,385 rapid antigen home tests have been uploaded against a NSW public school in the system. To improve equitable access, a small number of families have been able to use a paper version which is not centrally tracked by the Department to alleviate administrate burden on schools needing to upload these results.
- (3) Rapid antigen home testing kits are being supplied by the Department at no cost to schools and will be distributed when there are identified close contacts due to a positive COVID-19 case at the school. Only kits provided by the school can be used under the rapid antigen home test-to-stay program.

- (2) From 16 November 2021, the Department of Education commenced reporting on confirmed cases where only the cohort has been requested to isolate for contact tracing. From 16 November 2021 through to 30 November 2021 there have been 78 New South Wales public schools who have had a confirmed case and only the cohort has been requested to self-isolate for contact tracing.
- (3) Confirmed cases of COVID-19 are only reported to the Department where the person has been on school grounds within the previous three weeks. Information requests regarding the number of students who have tested positive should be directed to NSW Health.
