Answer-

- (1) Sewer systems involve private connections, trunk or network systems (pipes and carriers), as well as head works (sewerage pumping stations or treatment plants). Councils, owners of private properties connected to a council's sewer system and licenced contractors who carry out approved work, all have responsibilities for sewer system maintenance depending on which part of the system they deal with.
- (2) It is not possible to answer this question in general terms as the cause of a blockage may not be within the council's control.

(a) Of the 1521 of total horses removed during this time period, 1373 of these were within the retention area. All horses removed were in the northern section of Kosciuszko National Park.

No horses have been removed from wild horse retention management areas since 24 May 2024.

This is based on an undertaking provided by the National Parks and Wildlife Service (NPWS) to the NSW Supreme Court, where no more than 811 horses would be removed from wild horse retention management areas between 9 May and 30 June 2024. This target was reached on 23 May 2024.

Aerial shooting of horses is continuing in removal areas, where the population is required to be reduced to zero. However, due to winter weather the program has slowed down.

As you are aware, and as was the case when you were the relevant minister as recently as last year, data that has not been aged is unreliable. Data for April to June 2024 is not yet available.

Due to privacy requirements, not all information is able to be provided. Where necessary, some responses have been grouped to reduce risk of children being identified in accordance with privacy and confidentiality guidelines. If a figure is smaller than five it has been supressed. Where this figure could be derived from the remaining information, the second smallest figure has also been supressed.
