\*7989 CHESTER HILL HIGH SCHOOL DEMOUNTABLES—Ms Tania Mihailuk asked the Minister for Education—

Considering the high number of temporary demountables at Chester Hill High School will the 2018-19 Budget provide funding to replace these demountables with permanent classrooms?

Answer—

I'm advised that the 2018-19 Budget will be announced in June 2018.

\*7990 BANKSTOWN-LIDCOMBE HOSPITAL CARPARK—Ms Tania Mihailuk asked the Minister for Health, and Minister for Medical Research—

(1) Will the 2018-19 Budget provide the funding to upgrade the carpark at Bankstown-Lidcombe Hospital?

(a) If not, why not?

Answer—

The 2018-19 NSW Budget has not yet been released.

\*7991 RESPONSE TO CHINA'S STOP TO RECYCLING NEW SOUTH WALES PLASTIC—Mr Alex Greenwich asked the Minister for the Environment, Minister for Local Government, and Minister for Heritage—

(1) Will the Government give an undertaking that kerbside recycling will not be scaled back as a result of China's decision to stop taking our plastic waste for recycling?

(2) Will the Government give an undertaking not to increase landfill or incineration of recyclable plastic waste?

(3) To what extent will New South Wales push for the introduction of a mandatory minimum recycled content for packaging and other products at the national level?

(4) What work is being done with Government agencies and councils to ensure recycled products are purchased?

(5) What reforms will the Government consider to reduce single use plastics in the waste stream including mandatory product stewardship products and bans on single use plastic products?

(6) To what extent will the Government consider using waste levy funds to build new processing plants to recycle plastics?

Answer—

I am advised:

(1) Kerbside recycling is managed by local councils who decide the scale of their recycling program.

(2) and (3) The Government will determine opportunities to improve waste handling and recycling on the merits of each policy.

(4) The Government is investigating opportunities to use state and local government procurement to increase the use of recycled products.

(5) To refer you to Question on Notice LA Q7984.

(6) The current 'Waste Less, Recycle More' grant funding offers opportunities to Councils and business which may be used to promote recycling innovation.

\*7992 BOARDING HOUSES LAND TAX EXEMPTIONS—Mr Alex Greenwich asked the Treasurer, and Minister for Industrial Relations—

(1) How many boarding houses in the Sydney metropolitan area received land tax exemptions in the 2017 tax year?

(a) Of these, how many provided occupants full board and lodging and how many provided occupants less than full board and lodging?

(b) Of these, how many were assisted boarding houses and how many were general boarding houses?

(2) How many boarding houses in the Sydney metropolitan area received land tax exemptions in each tax year from 2013 to 2016?

- (3) How does the Government ensure that occupants of boarding houses that receive an exemption from land tax do not incur charges in addition to their tariff or rent such as electricity and water?
- (4) How does the Government set the tariff limits used to determine a boarding house's eligibility for an exemption on land tax?
- (5) To what extent are the tariff limits set to ensure that an occupier on social security has enough money left for basic needs like clothes, food, transport and medical costs?

Answer—

These questions are more appropriately directed to the Minister for Finance, Services and Property.

\*7993 RETAIL SPACES WITHIN THE DARLING QUARTER—Mr Clayton Barr asked the Minister for Finance, Services and Property—

What was the rental income received from Government ownership and leasing of retail spaces within the Darling Quarter in each financial year from 2011-12 to 2015-16?

Answer—

(1) The Government does not earn rental income from leasing of retail spaces within the Darling Quarter, only ground lease rental income.

On 12 December 2016, the Government announced the sale of the rights to the ground lease rental income at Darling Quarter for 99 years, for an upfront payment of \$192 million. Prior to the sale, ground lease income was received for the following years:

- (a) 2012-13: \$9.6 million.
- (b) 2013-14: \$9.8 million.
- (c) 2014-15: \$10.1 million.

\*7994 TELEMATICS TRIAL—Mr Clayton Barr asked the Minister for Finance, Services and Property—

- (1) What is the total cost of purchasing, installing and monitoring the telematics in 1,000 vehicles in Western Sydney?
- (2) How are the participants selected, if the number of registrations exceeds 1,000?
- (3) How are young drivers notified of the opportunity to participate in the trial?
- (4) What is the definition of Western Sydney for the purpose of this trial?
- (5) Will the trial be extended to other regions of New South Wales?
  - (a) If so, where?
- (6) How will the data recorded by the telematics be used by the Government or insurance companies?
- (7) Can participants opt out of the trial once the device has been installed in their vehicle?
  - (a) If so, what is the process?

Answer—

(1) A total of \$1.6 million has been allocated for the trial over the 2017-18 and 2018-19 financial years.

(2) State Insurance Regulatory Authority (SIRA) is undergoing a public registration of interest, inviting drivers between the ages of 17 and 24 and living in Western Sydney or regional New South Wales. Participants will be selected on pre-determined sampling criteria which includes considerations of frequency of driving, postcodes, age of vehicle and participant age. Eligible participants will then be formally invited to participate. Should the number of young drivers volunteering for the trial and meeting the criteria exceed 1,000, participants will be selected in order of their application to join the trial.

(3) SIRA has set up a pre-registration page on its website: <https://www.sira.nsw.gov.au/forms/telematics-road-safety-pilot-pre-registration>. This is being promoted through various channels, including social media as well newspaper and television news stories.

(4) For the purposes of this trial, Western Sydney is defined as any suburb in the following local government areas:

(6) The final dataset will be provided to the Government in an anonymised format and used for research purposes only. The data will provide insights about young driver behaviour such as speed, frequency of hard braking, acceleration and cornering and help understand whether telematics based feedback can moderate risky driving behaviours.

Additionally, this data will help the Government understand any trends across genders, age groups, licence class, geographic location, vehicle age and vehicle type. It will provide a robust evidence base for designing future road safety initiatives for this group of drivers. This data may also assist SIRA in regulating the pricing of Compulsory Third Party insurance (CTP) policies in the future.

As well as existing arrangements under SIRA's Privacy Management Plan, SIRA will put in place additional data management protocols to ensure participant privacy.

All third parties contracted by SIRA for this project will be contractually obliged to delete any identifiable information such as names and addresses, and to provide written confirmation that this has been done.

Raw data collected from the trial will not be shared with insurance companies.

(7) Consistent with research protocols participants may opt-out at any time.

(a) Exact details of how they can do this, along with other elements of the trial, are still being finalised. All participants will be fully briefed as part of their formal onboarding so they know exactly what they're signing up for.

\*7995 STAFF FOR THE NEW DEPARTMENT OF FINANCE, SERVICES AND INNOVATION OFFICE IN GOSFORD—Ms Liesl Tesch asked the Minister for Finance, Services and Property—

(1) The Department of Finance, Services and Innovation (DFSI) has been coordinating an expression of interest across DFSI sites from individual staff members whose roles could potentially be undertaken from Gosford.

(a) 44 staff have been confirmed to take up this opportunity.

(b) Around 300 roles have already been identified, predominantly from Revenue NSW (224) and Customer Experience (70) in the Better Regulation Division, to relocate to Gosford by the end of 2018.

(2) A business decision has been made to move certain functions that can be easily relocated to Gosford.

(a) Yes, Revenue NSW and Customer Experience.

(b) Yes.

(c) The required numbers (300 roles) have already been identified.

\*7997 MONORAIL STATIONS—Ms Jenny Leong asked the Minister for Transport and Infrastructure—

(2) If it is not the responsibility of Transport for NSW, who is responsible for the removal of these stations?

Answer—

I am advised:

- (1) Transport for NSW (TfNSW) does not have any remaining legal interests in the monorail stations and as such, does not have any rights to remove the structures. TfNSW is not aware of any plans by current owners to have the monorail stations removed.  
(2) TfNSW has not been involved with the monorail stations since 2015 at which time TfNSW finalised the last commercial settlement with all relevant parties associated with the monorail stations. The responsibility for the monorail stations remains with the various current landowners. TfNSW understands that certain landowners had intended to use the structures for alternative commercial uses, rather than to have the stations removed.

Answer—

I am advised:

The NSW Police Force has advised that a total of 2,113 asbestos surveys were conducted over the period 2011 to 2017, with asbestos discovered on 299 occasions. One officer sought and received medical treatment in 2011 for possible asbestos exposure.

\*8012 CORRECTIVE SERVICES ASBESTOS AUDITS—Mr Guy Zangari asked the Minister for Counter Terrorism, Minister for Corrections, and Minister for Veterans Affairs—

- (1) How many asbestos audits have been conducted for buildings owned or operated by Corrective Services NSW in each year from 2011 to 2017?  
(a) On how many occasions was asbestos discovered or identified at any of the aforementioned locations?  
(b) Were any Corrective Services NSW personnel or other individuals from these locations required to seek medical treatment for any possible exposure to asbestos?  
(i) If so, how many individuals received medical treatment?

Answer—

I am advised:

In accordance with the requirements of the Work Health and Safety Regulation 2017 the Department of Justice maintains a register of Corrective Services NSW sites where asbestos has been identified. Each site where asbestos has been identified must have a management plan in place. The Department has engaged a consultant to ensure the management plans for each site are up to date.

No new sites have been added to the register in the period specified.

\*8013 RURAL FIRE SERVICE ASBESTOS AUDITS—Mr Guy Zangari asked the Minister for Police, and Minister for Emergency Services—

- (1) How many asbestos audits have been conducted for buildings owned or operated by NSW Rural Fire Service in each year from 2011 to 2017?  
(a) On how many occasions was asbestos discovered or identified at any of the aforementioned locations?  
(b) Were any NSW Rural Fire Service personnel from these locations required to seek medical treatment for any possible exposure to asbestos?  
(i) If so, how many individuals received medical treatment?

Answer—

I am advised:

Building assets on sites used by the NSW Rural Fire Service (NSW RFS) are vested in local councils. The NSW RFS is aware that four of these sites had surveys conducted by the relevant local council or agency in the specified period. Asbestos was found at each of the four sites and removed by the agency responsible.

No NSW RFS personnel needed medical treatment for possible asbestos exposure at these sites.

\*8014 STATE EMERGENCY SERVICES ASBESTOS AUDITS—Mr Guy Zangari asked the Minister for Police, and Minister for Emergency Services—

- (1) How many asbestos audits have been conducted for buildings owned or operated by NSW State Emergency Services in each year from 2011 to 2017?  
(a) On how many occasions was asbestos discovered or identified at any of the aforementioned locations?  
(b) Were any NSW State Emergency Services personnel from these locations required to seek medical treatment for any possible exposure to asbestos?  
(i) If so, how many individuals received medical treatment?

Answer—

I am advised:

The NSW State Emergency Services (NSW SES) is aware that 249 asbestos audits have been conducted in the specified period, with asbestos identified at 89 sites.

There were no reports of NSW SES personnel seeking medical treatment for any possible exposure to asbestos.

\*8015 ALLOCATION OF ADDITIONAL POLICE—Mr Philip Donato asked the Minister for Police, and Minister for Emergency Services—

(1) Did you recently receive an email from a senior member of the NSW Police Force that identified no increase in front line Police at Parkes since implementation of your re-engineering of the NSW Police Force on 11 March 2018?

(a) If so, will you respond by allocating additional Police to meet your promise of delivering more boots on the ground?

Answer—

I responded to the email cited in the question, noting that the re-engineering of the NSW Police Force (NSWPF) was designed to allow a more tailored focus on local communities such as Parkes. Re-engineering provides the NSWPF with greater flexibility to adapt policing techniques and resources to each community in response to its own challenges.

The allocation of officers is a matter for the Commissioner of Police.

\*8016 LAKEMBA ELECTORATE BUDGET FUNDING—Mr Jihad Dib asked the Treasurer, and Minister for Industrial Relations—

Will you include in the upcoming Budget fair funding for the Lakemba electorate?

Answer—

The Government is committed to building the infrastructure that a growing Sydney, and State, requires. This includes world class hospitals, more and better schools and twenty first century transport links. These investments will include infrastructure both within the electorate of Lakemba, and across Sydney, that will directly benefit the people who live in the electorate.

Major infrastructure projects that will deliver lasting improvements in transport accessibility for the people of the electorate include: the \$16.8 billion WestConnex project, which will ease congestion on the M5 Motorway by increasing capacity and improving road safety conditions; and the \$12.0 billion Sydney Metro, City and South West, linking the electorate to the CBD, North Shore and the growing employment areas around Macquarie Park by frequent rail services.

The residents of the Lakemba electorate will also benefit from the \$300 million redevelopment of the St George Hospital in Kogarah, which will provide residents in the surrounding areas with access to another world class hospital, improving the speed of delivery and quality of health care.

Finally, over \$34.8 million is budgeted this year to be spent on upgrading and building new social housing in the Lakemba electorate which as an ongoing program will continue in 2018-19.

\*8017 CHULLORA TAFE—Mr Jihad Dib asked the Minister for Tourism and Major Events, and Assistant Minister for Skills—

Answer—

- To remain the leading skills provider and meet the requirements of students and industry in a competitive market, TAFE NSW must sustainably invest in facilities that support the training for current and future industry requirements.
- Each year TAFE NSW reviews its state-wide asset portfolio to ensure that TAFE facilities meet industry standards and are efficient and fit for purpose, particularly in regional and rural areas. Chullora TAFE is part of this review.

Answer—

The use of demountables allows the department to be highly responsive to changing needs in schools across the state. All demountable classrooms are air-conditioned and receive regular maintenance.

The department constantly monitors the use of demountables. Where a long term need for additional school accommodation is established and funding is available, this is provided by expanding existing schools and/or building new schools as necessary.

A record breaking \$747 million is being invested over the next four years to tackle planned maintenance in schools across New South Wales.

\*8034 MOTOR VEHICLE REPAIRERS AND FAIR TRADING—Ms Yasmin Catley asked the Minister for Innovation and Better Regulation—

However, Fair Trading does not intervene in such disputes because the Motor Vehicle Insurance and Repair Industry Code of Conduct (the Code) sets out an alternative dispute resolution process. Compliance with the Code is mandatory under the Fair Trading Act 1987. The Code Administration Committee administers the Code on a national basis and is comprised of three appointees of the Insurance Council of Australia and three appointees of the Motor Trades Association of Australia.

(a), (b), (c) and (d) Fair Trading is unable to provide an exact number of contacts made as these matters are not separately categorised within Fair Trading's complaints database. It is estimated that numbers are minimal, largely due to the existence of the Code.

\*8036 CHILDCARE PLANNING—Mr Alex Greenwich asked the Minister for Education representing the Minister for Early Childhood Education, Minister for Aboriginal Affairs, Assistant Minister for Education—

- (1) How does the Government assess the supply and demand for childcare places?
- (2) What data does the Government have about current supply and demand in the inner Sydney area, particularly the Sydney electorate?

- (3) It is not the role of the Government to assess demand for child care places.
- (4) It is not the role of the Government to assess supply and demand for child care places.
- (5) The Government has listened to the concerns of working families and the sector about the availability of child care places, and has simplified the approvals process for child care centre operators responding to the market. It introduced the State Environmental Planning Policy for Educational Establishments and Child Care Facilities in 2017 to make it easier for education and child care providers to build high-quality facilities. The planning policy simplified and removed unnecessary constraints on approval processes for child care centres.

The Government has invested a total of \$23 million in three rounds of capital works grants since 2013 to support an additional 1,194 preschool places across the state.

(6) The Commonwealth Government has primary responsibility for funding long day care and family day care services, and provides most of the funding for the sector through the Child Care Benefit and Child Care Rebate. This will be replaced by the New Child Care Package in 2018. There are annual inspections of all 337 fire stations owned or operated by Fire & Rescue NSW (FRNSW). Currently there are no sites in the portfolio that have been evaluated as having asbestos with a high risk to staff. Remediation of high-risk asbestos identified during annual inspections is undertaken immediately.

Currently there are 225 fire stations that contain asbestos and 49 that are presumed to contain asbestos - classified in this way as they are not practical to test, have surrounding hazards and are generally considered low risk, for example: switchboard backing boards. Since 2011, 44 fire stations have been replaced or undergone major renovations, reducing the number of sites affected by asbestos.

No FRNSW personnel have had to seek medical treatment in response to the discovery of asbestos at these locations.
