Repeat Recommendations of the Auditor General's 2012 Financial Audits

I refer to your letter of 17 May 2013 in which you request that I provide the Public Accounts Committee with a submission outlining my Department's response to the Auditor General's 2012 recommendation in relation to Victims Compensation.

In October 2012, Cabinet approved the replacement of the Victims Compensation Scheme to a new financially sustainable model called the Victims Support Scheme.

The Victims Support Services Bill was introduced into Parliament on 7 May 2013 to legislate for a victims' compensation scheme which will focus upon the ongoing support and treatment of victims with minimal reliance upon lump sum payments.

The bill was passed in both Houses of Parliament on 30 May 2013 and assented to on 3 June 2013 establishing the Victims Rights and Support Act 2013 No 37 (VRSA).

In addition to the above measures Treasury will provide my Department with a further one-off Grant of \$130million, in equal instalments, across the 2013-14 and 2014-15 financial years to fund the unresolved claims that were lodged under the old compensation scheme. This will extinguish the backlog of claims.

The Victims Support Scheme is designed within the budget to provide fast and effective payment of matters and to minimise the risk of any potential backlog.
