Port Macquarie Longboarders is a Local Club formed in 1992 to promote surfing on traditional Malibu or longboards usually over 9 foot in length. The Clubs membership comprises a mix of juniors, women and young men and retirees. We have in our midst many members who compete on regional, state and national levels at various locations up and down the coast and interstate. We have a fairly broad range of members in both experience and expertise. Since 2013 we have all noticed a spike in Shark numbers and not long after we had the fatalities and shark attacks up and down the coast.

We are not alone in this phenomenon as currently there are several hot spots around the world the main ones being Reunion Island, Western Australia, Eastern Australia, Hawaii {Maui} and Southern California.

So as to get a bit of a cross section of opinions of what can be done to improve current shark management options we did a survey at our last competition and have attached our results.

Being the compiler of this survey, it was rather interesting to see the vast differing opinions and their solutions.

As far as I can tell Port Macquarie has no current Shark Management options other than the occasional Aerial shark patrols and the Surf Life Saving measures which seem to concentrate on flagged areas which Longboarder's don't surf in.

The Survey was in two parts the first part were generalised questions about Shark Managament the second part put some solutions in no particular order and we asked them to rank them in order.

The first part was quiet easy as the questions very generalised and the yes's won those easily .

It was fairly divided what measures would make a difference but overall the Drum Baits or long lines as used in Queensland have the runs on the board and don't need any trials or debate they just work as they lure the Sharks away from the beaches.

The shark nets being extended to the mid north coast had support but would only work at certain beaches there was also concern about the collateral damage to other species such as dolphins.

The investigation into preventative technology such as sonar was another good option but was unproven and still relies on people doing the investigation on where the sharks are and not going in near them.

The aircraft or drone surveillance over popular beaches is good but very expensive and you would have to cover from Bega to Kingscliff and you are still relying on communication being spread to surfers and assuming everyone has a mobile phone.

There were two proposals that were quite popular about just tracking and culling just problem sharks.

Not sure how that would work, do you wait for someone to be attacked by a so called problem shark then you track it down and cull it?

Another popular option was a shark cull of certain shark species to get their numbers down to a level which is sustainable. The most noticeable being Great White ,Tiger and Bull Sharks.

Finally the most misunderstood solution of removing the Great White off the protected species until an accurate picture can be painted on what the number of sharks have grown to since 1995.

In conclusion we look to the NSW Government to do something very soon as there is a lot of very spooked out surfers looking down a lot into the water not knowing what is under them.

More investigation needs to go into finding out why the sharks have changed their behaviour and what are the actual numbers we are dealing with.

There has been several shark alarms and beaches closed at Port Macquarie in the past few weeks and confidence in the current system is very low.

Most competitions up and down the coast now have the added cost of employing a water safety jet ski just to protect the surfers. Two examples are Loggerheads at Scotts Head and Crescent Head Classic.
