Changes to section 257 of the <i>Crimes</i> ( <i>Administration of Sentences</i> ) Act 1999 were made in April 2015 to facilitate the exchange of data on who is in custody, and their various levels of fine-related debt. There is now a basis for regular exchange of information between CSNSW and State Debt Recovery.  Completed (satisfied) WDOs rose from 102 in the first quarter to 113 in the second quarter of 2015.  In total, \$432,356.25 of debt was cleared by WDOs in correctional centres between January 2015 and June 2015.  Third quarter date to September 2015 is pending.  Policies and procedures are currently under review to maximise the access to, uptake and completion of, and compliance with WDOs in all correctional centres. This includes streamlining identification of eligibility for WDOs and enhancing the scope of approved activities in CSNSW. It also includes multi-media promotion of WDOs in all correctional centres and linkage of WDO eligibility to CSNSW case plans.	DOJ
