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Unregistered trails bikes riding in local community areas is a big problem for the police. Thousands of hours are spent each year by police, attending to complaints relating to unregistered motor cycles and these complaints often escalate to local members of parliament.

If rec recreational registration was introduced, I have no doubt the number of illegal riders would be substantially reduced, as these people would be able to access dedicated and legal riding areas. Which would both appease community members and reduce police response to trivial matters.

As with the NSW fishing licence funds going directly to the governing body it relates to, so could a small fee from the registration go towards NSW Forestry.
