In the Great Lakes Council area of my electorate we do not have any graffiti (or if we do we have it for no more than 12 hours) due to work of one Ted Bickford OAM (the OAM was awarded for his work in the community keeping it graffiti free.)

Mr Bickford will be making a submission to your committee. I believe Mr Bickford would make a good witness to your public hearings as his work is ground breaking, simple and effective both in cost and results.

My Dear Minister

Mr Ted Bickford, known as 'Mr Graffiti' in the Great Lakes area has been a stalwart in removing graffiti as it appears in the Great Lakes area.

Mr Bickford started doing this work voluntarily and almost anonymously as a part of a community service however it has come to the stage now where he is sponsored by the council and now routinely cleans graffiti when and where it occurs.

More importantly however, Mr Bickford has established such a reputation and respect that the level of graffiti, particularly from residents of the Great Lakes area has almost ceased and when incidences of graffiti occur, it is often as a result people from of outside of the Great Lakes area. Because of Mr Bickford's networks, particularly with young people many of whom are ex graffiti artists, these people are often identified and can be pursued.

Additionally Mr Bickford has been able to involve young people in his graffiti removal work, also in many cases these young people were formerly graffiti artists themselves.

Mr Bickford has observed however, that there has been a change in the demographics involved in graffiti and finds that there are now younger people more inclined to be involved and has instances of 9 to 13 year olds being very involved in graffiti.

As a result of his observations and concerns and his dedication to his community Mr Bickford has now, with the permission of schools and the Great Lakes Council embarked on an education program within the schools.

Mr Bickford attends Primary Schools within the Great Lakes Council area and explains the social and criminal ramifications arising out of graffiti. It is a fully integrated program where he actually has a young person with him who has been convicted of graffiti offences and is now assisting in cleaning up graffiti. The program interactively involves the young students in what he is doing by way of enlisting them as "spotters" for graffiti and of course, educating them against entering the graffiti field.

Great Lakes Council is fully supportive of Mr Bickford. Some of the incentives Mr Bickford uses are Council certificates to young people who assist him in removing graffiti, as well as "spotting" where graffiti has occurred or for participating in courses in school activities where Mr Bickford has attended and spoken.

Attached is a number of the initiatives that Mr Bickford has implemented such as the certificates of appreciation, photographs of children interacting in dress-up costumes, his truck which is synonymous with his work, wash-off transfers, and the like.

It would appear to me that Mr Bickford's School Education Program has been an outstanding success and this is evidenced by Mr Bickford's feelings and more particularly by the hundreds of students that have attended the talks.

Mr Bickford believes it is a matter that could be extended throughout the State on an education process that may alleviate many of the problems facing the community in relation to graffiti.

I invite you to consider the program that Mr Bickford has undertaken and the attached information and perhaps a relevant officer of your department could contact me or Mr Bickford (who can be contacted at 2/43 Pacific Parade Tuncurry, 6555 2315) to discuss his initiatives and how they might be developed further.


Mr Bickford does not seek reward for this program but is merely undertaking it as part of his contribution to his community.


Ms McKay said the new laws, which coincide with a police raid on statewide graffiti "hot spots", were in line with community expectations.


"The community has simply had enough with vandals and we are taking steps to significantly reduce the number
