Thank you for your letter to Dr Mary Foley, Director-General Ministry of Health regarding a submission from the Ministry on the implementation of recommendations of the Auditor-General's Report on 'The Effectiveness of Cautioning for Minor Cannabis Offences.' As this matter falls within my portfolio your letter has been forwarded to me for response.

Please find enclosed a submission for your consideration outlining responses and actions to date on the recommendations of the Audit that relate to the Ministry. Thank you for providing the template to assist the Ministry in developing a response.

The Ministry continues not to support recommendations 1, 2 and 10 as they are outside the scope of the scheme which is designed to divert those cautioned from the court system and encourage them to seek help as opposed to providing treatment or punishment.

You will also note that Recommendation 4 of the Audit has not been completed by the due date of December 2011. The Ministry is involved in discussions around the resourcing needs for this particular initiative. I acknowledge the importance of collecting data on the profile of those cautioned offenders who access the Ministry's drug and alcohol health and education/information phone line.
