The <u>Centre for Education Statistics and Evaluation</u> (CESE) is focused on improving the effectiveness, efficiency and accountability of education in New South Wales by supporting decision-making in education devaluating educational programs and strategies and gauging NSW education performance over time. CESE's program of evaluations supports the Department to identify what works in major reforms and programs.
