## THE UNDEFINED REMAINS UNPROTECTED

Please accept this brief submission in relation to the above Bill, together with associated references.

- The concepts of conscience and religious liberty play a critical role in the formation of a common culture.
- Internationally, there are many examples of religious conscience being protected in law: taking witness oaths, wearing religious clothing, circumcision ceremonies, display of religious symbols (e.g. Christian crucifixes) in classrooms, etc.
- That NSW has (effectively) no religious freedom guarantee is a serious gap in the law when compared to many countries (and states within federations) overseas.
- Parliaments in Australia have been slow to develop religious freedom laws. NSW has been especially sluggish in this area.
- Other comparable countries (such Germany and the United States) have multicultural social environments similar to ours and provide far superior protections against discrimination on the basis of religious belief and activity.
