Cost-effectiveness is one of the five investment principles guiding the BCT.  To meet these various aims, the BCT may fund agreements with differing Biodiversity Value Scores and value-for-money rankings (BVI) across different regions. The various drivers of BCT investment may lead to variable funding outcomes across regions that are nonetheless consistent with the BCIS's priority investment areas, investment principles and targets.  The BCT will, by September 2019, publish further and clearer information to show how BCT investment decisions align with the priorities, principles and targets set in the Biodiversity Conservation Investment Strategy.
