Thank you for your letter on behalf of the Public Accounts Committee asking the then Department of Planning, Industry and Environment (DPIE) to provide the Committee with a submission outlining its response to the Auditor-General's report, *Procurement Management in Local Government*, tabled on 17 December 2020.

In her report, the Auditor General recommended that, by June 2022, DPIE should:

- publish comprehensive and updated guidance on effective procurement practices – including electronic tender submissions and procurements below the tender threshold, and
- review and update the *Local Government (General) Regulation 2005* (Regulation) to reflect the increasing use of electronic tender submissions rather than paper copies.

In its response to the Auditor General's report, DPIE advised that it supports the recommendation. DPIE advised that:

- a review of the tendering provisions of the Regulation will be undertaken in consultation with the local government sector, and
- the Office of Local Government's (OLG) existing *Tendering Guidelines for NSW Local Government* will be withdrawn and replaced with more comprehensive and updated guidance.

The tendering provisions of the Regulation have been reviewed and a consultation paper was issued in September 2021 to seek the views of the local government sector on proposed amendments to the Regulation. The consultation paper is available on OLG's website <u>here</u>. Submissions closed on 15 October 2021. The submissions received indicate broad support for the proposed amendments to the Regulation. These will be progressed and finalised before June 2022.

In relation to the proposed new and updated guidance on procurement practices, as indicated in DPIE's response to the Auditor-General, this is a substantial project requiring a significant investment of resources.

While scoping work on the project has commenced, it cannot be progressed until amendments to the tendering provisions of the Regulation have been finalised, as these will need to be reflected in the new guidance. In addition, much of the proposed guidance does not currently exist and will need to be developed in consultation with the local government sector and expert procurement practitioners. Bearing this in mind, it is unlikely that the guidance will be completed before the end of 2022.

Please find enclosed, DPIE's completed submission template. The six audited councils have responded directly to the Auditor General in relation to the recommendations relating to them. Information about the councils' responses to those recommendations and their progress in implementing them can be obtained directly from the councils concerned.
