The use of food additives, including intense sweeteners such as Stevia is regulated at a national level under the Australia New Zealand Food Standards Code Standard 1.3.1.

Food Standards Australia New Zealand (FSANZ) is responsible for assessing the safety of Stevia and setting appropriate acceptable intake levels.

The FSANZ have set an Acceptable Daily Intake level of Stevia that is in line with the level set by the European Food Safety Authority and their latest review of Stevia in 2011 found no public health or safety concerns.

Further questions about the safety of Stevia should be addressed to Food Standards Australia New Zealand (FSANZ).

# 6 MAY 2015

- \*13 PRIMARY INDUSTRIES—DROUGHT IN NEW SOUTH WALES—Mr Buckingham asked the Minister for Primary Industries, and Minister for Lands and Water—
  - (1) Which areas of New South Wales are currently in drought?

Answer-

The NSW Government is committed to effective drought programs consistent with the terms of the Intergovernmental Agreement on National Drought Program Reform.

As such, the NSW Government has replaced state drought declarations with Regional Seasonal Conditions Reports. These reports are a more strategic and sophisticated advisory tool that focuses on farm management preparedness and resilience.

The reports are also used by the Regional Assistance Advisory Committee to provide feedback to the NSW Government on the vulnerability of rural communities to climate-related downturns, and advise on potential farm business, farm family and community support programs and initiatives.

- \*14 PRIMARY INDUSTRIES—LAND AND WATER COMMISSIONER—Mr Buckingham asked the Minister for Primary Industries, and Minister for Lands and Water—
  - (1) What has the Land and Water Commissioner done since 1 January 2015?
  - (2) Which stakeholders has the Land and Water Commissioner been in contact with since 1 January 2015?

Answer—

- (1) The Commissioner has undertaken an extensive round of meetings with landholders, representatives of primary producers, resources and energy companies, and state and local government. The Commissioner has also chaired the following meetings:
  - Four meetings of the Narrabri Gas Project Community Consultation Committee in Narrabri
  - Three meetings of the Gloucester Dialogue in Gloucester

- Two meetings of the Petroleum Access industry stakeholder group in Sydney
- (2) The Commissioner has visited and met with key stakeholders in the following districts Sydney, Narrabri, Grafton, Coffs Harbour, Bellingen, Kempsey, Port Macquarie, Walcha, Gunnedah, Moss Vale, Gilgandra, Breeza, Dubbo, Coonamble and Coonabarabran.
- \*15 PRIMARY INDUSTRIES—AGRICULTURAL SUSTAINABILITY AND FOOD SECURITY—Mr Buckingham asked the Minister for Primary Industries, and Minister for Lands and Water—
  - (1) When will the Strategic Action Statement for Agricultural Sustainability, currently being developed by the Office of Agricultural Sustainability and Food Security and scheduled to be released in late 2013, be released?
  - (2) When will the Strategic Action Statement for Food Security, currently being developed by the Office of Agricultural Sustainability and Food Security and scheduled to be released in late 2013, be released?
  - (3) What role does the Office of Agricultural Sustainability and Food Security undertake that is not related to resource projects?

(1) and (2) The development of the Strategic Action Statements for Agricultural Sustainability and Food Security has been incorporated into the NSW Agriculture Industry Action Plan. This Plan was released in September 2014 and is a partnership approach between the NSW agricultural sector and the NSW Government to drive growth and sustainability of the agriculture sector in the State.

(3) The Office of Agricultural Sustainability and Food Security provides support to the Primary Industries Ministerial Advisory Council (PIMAC) and the Land and Water Commissioner. It oversees the development of the NSW Agriculture Industry Action Plan and continues to support its implementation. It also provides advice generally on land use planning issues relating to agricultural industry development, agricultural sustainability and food security.

### \*16 LANDS AND WATER, PRIMARY INDUSTRIES—MENINDEE BORE DRILLING PROJECT—Mr Buckingham asked the Minister for Primary Industries, and Minister for Lands and Water—

- (1) What impact is the decision to temporarily embargo irrigators pumping from the Barwon-Darling river system expected to have on the total storage in the Menindee Lakes system and the total water available to the towns of Broken Hill and Menindee?
- (2) Regarding the Menindee bore drilling project:
  - (a) How much water is expected to be yielded?
  - (b) How long will it take the aquifers to be replenished once this water has been extracted?
  - (c) When is water from these bores expected to be used as part of Broken Hill's water supply?
  - (d) How much water is expected to be needed from these bores per day over the next 12 months to ensure a reliable supply of water to Broken Hill?
  - (e) What are the Total Dissolved Salts and Electrical Conductivity measured in the water to be extracted?

Answer-

(1) The NSW Office of Water has placed temporary restrictions on flows in regulated and unregulated rivers in northern and western NSW in order to increase inflows to the Menindee Lakes. The Menindee Lakes supply water for critical human needs to the town of Broken Hill and are at very low levels. The embargoed water that has made it into the Lakes, and the water that is still flowing down the river is expected to extend supply by several months. Regular updates on the size and location of flows are available on the NSW Office of Water website.

(2)

- (a) Only enough to satisfy Essential Water requirements under demand restrictions.
- (b) Yield recovery tests are under investigation. These are shallow aquifers influenced by the filling of Lake Menindee and the Darling River Channel. Shallow bore fields are planned as a short-term solution only.
- (c) It is expected that the current supply of surface water will last until mid-2016. If necessary, the

bores will be utilised in a staged approach.

- (e) Early test results vary for each test well but are in the range of 1500EC, meaning that the use of this water for potable supplies is likely to require desalination to meet Australian Drinking Water Guidelines.
- \*17 JUSTICE AND POLICE—MAULES CREEK—Mr Buckingham asked the Minister for Roads, Maritime and Freight, and Vice-President of the Executive Council representing the Deputy Premier, Minister for Justice and Police, Minister for the Arts, and Minister for Racing—

- (a) Has Barwon Local Area Command's (LAC) investigation into allegations that there were unlicensed private undercover intelligence officers present at the protest camp in Maules Creek concluded?
- (b) If so, what were the findings?
- (c) If not, when is this expected to be concluded?

Answer—

The NSW Police Force has advised me that it is currently awaiting a legal assessment of this issue.

- \*18 TREASURER—PROJECTED COAL PRICES—Mr Buckingham asked the Minister for Roads, Maritime and Freight, and Vice-President of the Executive Council representing the Treasurer, and Minister for Industrial Relations—
  - (1) What is the projected coal price that the NSW Government is using for making economic decisions over the next 5 and 10 years?
  - (2) What have the total job losses in coal mining in New South Wales since 1 January 2015?

Answer-

- (1) The 2015-16 NSW Budget forecast will reflect the latest market expectations for coal prices (in US dollars), other key factors such as the volume of coal production and the relevant exchange rates.
- (2) The Australian Bureau of Statistics publishes labour force statistics.
