Further Abuse of Privilege by the Hon Mark Latham MLC

Ms Sharpe says—

Mr PRESIDENT: I give notice that on the next sitting day I will move:

- (1) That this House notes that, under standing order 52,
 - a. a return to order is to include an indexed list of all documents tabled, clearly identifying which documents are subject to a claim of privilege,
 - b. where a document is considered to be privileged, the documents are made available only to members of the Legislative Council, and are not to be published or copied without an order of the House,
 - c. a member may dispute the validity of the claim of privilege in relation to particular documents by communication in writing to the Clerk, following which an Independent Legal Arbiter is appointed for evaluation and report as to the validity of the claim.
- (2) That this House further notes that the Honourable Mark Latham has on several occasions disputed the validity of the claim of privilege of documents contained in several returns to order, as outlined in paragraph (1)(c).
- (3) That this House notes:
 - a. During debate on a condemnation motion regarding abuses of privilege by the Hon Mark Latham MLC on 5 August 2025, Mr Latham revealed further information derived from a report delivered by the Law Enforcement Conduct Commission (LECC) in relation to Operation Askern,
 - b. During an interview on 6 August 2025 on Sydney radio station 2SM the Hon. Mark Latham repeated this information,
 - c. The report in question was returned to this House by the NSW Police Force and remains subject to a non-publication order, as well as remaining subject to claims of privilege and personal information, the validity of which have not been challenged by any member of this House,

- d. The report in question has not been published under a subsequent order of this House and remains protected under the claims of privilege and personal information.



Mr PRESIDENT:

- (1) That this House notes that in June this year, Macquarie University announced plans to cut a raft of key courses as part of a brutal restructure that will axe more than 75 jobs and drastically cut options for students.
- (2) That this House notes that the proposed cuts to courses mean that:
 - (a) Bachelors degrees in archaeology, music and ancient languages will be entirely cut,
 - (b) Bachelors degrees in sociology and ancient history will all be dramatically reduced, with ancient history staff and lecturers being reduced from a headcount of 14 to 3,
 - (c) Bachelors of Arts students will no longer be able to study politics, gender studies, criminology and psychological studies as majors,
 - (d) Masters degrees in electronics engineering, ancient history and two IT fields will also be discontinued.
- (3) That this House further notes with concern the scale of job cuts, across popular and growing faculties, including:
 - (a) 108 staff in scope for 43 job losses in the Faculty of Arts,
 - (b) 117 staff in scope for 33 job cuts in the Faculty of Science and Engineering.
- (4) That this House expresses its concern at this wave of job cuts occurring across the university sector, with NSW universities the centre of an explosion of redundancies that now number 1500 in just the last year, with UTS, University of Wollongong, Western Sydney University, and University of Newcastle and Charles Sturt University joining Macquarie University in this pursuit of savings at the expense of teaching and learning.

(5) That this House recognises its fundamental role in enabling and empowering these Universities through NSW legislation, and affirms its commitment to ensuring the highest standards of governance and accountability in these critical public institutions.

Mr PRESIDENT:

- (1) That this House acknowledges that last week marked one year since state and federal governments formally responded to the 222 recommendations of the landmark Disability Royal Commission released in September 2023.
- (2) That this House notes that:
 - (a) many of the issues identified by the Disability Royal Commission remain unresolved, with many having escalated in severity and scale, and communities left without clarity on what action is being taken and when,
 - (b) over the last year, many in the disability community have voiced frustration, disappointment, anxiety and devastation at the lack of urgency and ambition from state and federal governments, with many asserting that without change, the trauma of the Disability Royal Commission would have been for nothing,
 - (c) Greens Senator Jordon Steele-John, who was instrumental in getting the Disability Royal Commission set up in 2019, said governments "not only kicked the can down the road" last year they "crushed it",
 - (d) on the DCJ's website, it states that since the release of the NSW Government response to the final report of the Disability Royal Commission, the government has only held two stakeholder forums to inform implementation of recommendations:
 - (i) a Disability Royal Commission Education Roundtable with key stakeholders on 5 September 2024, hosted by the Department of Education, and
 - (ii) a forum to help inform development of the next 4 year NSW Disability Inclusion Plan on 3 October 2024, held by the Department of Communities and Justice,

- (e) simply engaging in consultation through forums and information sessions does not equate to genuine ongoing co-design; People with Disability Australia (PWDA) have called for all levels of government to actually allow people with disability, their families and carers and their representative organisations to be recognised as equal partners in determining reforms flowing from the Disability Royal Commission.
- (3) That this House expresses its profound disappointment at the complete lack of courage and leadership taken by the NSW government, in not only failing to implement critical reforms following the Disability Royal Commission, but neglecting to engage in genuine co-design with the disability community, families, advocates and representatives.
- (4) That this House calls on the NSW government to use this once in a generation opportunity for change to drive ambitious, meaningful and lasting reforms that will not only advance but fully enshrine and enforce the rights of people with disability in our state, by taking far bolder action and empowering people with disability to lead these reforms.

Mr PRESIDENT:

- (1) That this House recognises that Tuesday 5 August 2025 marked the first anniversary of the fall of Bangladesh's 17-year authoritarian regime following a mass uprising, which is now known as the Monsoon Revolution.
- (2) That this House notes that:
 - (a) many in Bangladesh and across the world have referred to the Monsoon Revolution as Bangladesh's "second liberation" after its independence from Pakistan in 1971,
 - (b) this week, Bangladesh's interim leader Professor Muhammad Yunus has unveiled a roadmap of democratic reforms the nation marks this historic anniversary, pledging to write to the Chief Election Commissioner requesting the national election be arranged in February 2026, before the start of Ramadan,
 - (c) in his address, Professor Yunus affirmed that the three core responsibilities of the interim government are reform, justice and the conduct of a national election, asserting that "we will step into the final and most important phase after delivering this speech to you, and that is the transfer of power to an elected government. On behalf of the government, we will extend all necessary support to ensure that the election is free, peaceful and celebratory in spirit",
 - (d) Professor Yunus also formally read out the July Declaration, a 28-point document that seeks to give constitutional recognition to the student-led uprising, and confirmed that trials for those responsible for the July killings of 2024 are progressing swiftly,

- (e) democracy cannot be rebuilt on compromised foundations, and it is critical that the interim government's electoral roadmap is accompanied by urgent action to carry out widespread reform across Bangladesh's systems,
- (f) since 5 August 2024, the transitional period has exposed deep structural and institutional failures; while the interim administration led by Professor Yunus has expressed reformist intentions, many of the institutions that enabled authoritarian control remain untouched,
- (g) the Rapid Action Battalion (RAB) continues operating with impunity despite decades of allegations involving extrajudicial killings and enforced disappearances, and
- (h) Bangladesh's judiciary remains politicised, law enforcement lacks accountability and victims of violence and their families have expressed fear of their propsects for seeking justice.
- (3) That this House reaffirms its commitment to democracy and human rights, and expresses solidarity with the people of Bangladesh in their pursuit of justice, national sovereignty, political stability and lasting peace.
- (4) That this House calls on the Australian government to:
 - (a) advocate for justice and accountability for the victims of the Monsoon Revolution and their affected communities,
 - (b) stand in solidarity with the people of Bangladesh in calling on the interim government to ensure the recently announced electoral roadmap includes:
 - (i) free, fair and internationally monitored elections,
 - (ii) the creation of an independent Election Commission with robust anti-fraud mechanisms, and
 - (iii) equal access to political participation for all parties,
 - (c) advocate for the disbanding of the Rapid Action Battalion (RAB), prosecution of those involved in human rights violations and establishment of a restructured and rights-respecting law enforcement system,
 - (d) support judicial reform in Bangladesh that aligns with international human rights obligations and norms, and
 - (e) encourage systemic anti-corruption measures including transparent long-term institutional reform to rebuild public trust in governance.

Mr PRESIDENT:

- (1) That this House notes that conservation councils across Australia have come together to release *States of Transition* in June 2025, a report tracking renewable energy progress across states and territories which found that:
 - (a) NSW is currently ranked fourth out of seven states and territories on the percentage of energy currently from renewable sources, with only 37% renewable energy generation,
 - (b) 63% of NSW's energy needs are being met by coal and gas, 13% by rooftop PV, 10% by large-scale solar, 10% by wind and 4% by hydro,
 - (c) most states and territories have enough renewable energy project proposals 'in the pipeline' to meet 2030 renewable energy targets; for NSW, we could meet our targets 2.5 times over,
 - (d) to reach 83% renewables by 2030, the level of renewable generation required under the AEMO ISP step change scenario, NSW will need to accelerate its renewable energy deployment as it is currently not on track to achieve this based on current build rates,
 - (e) NSW has a significant amount of renewable generation capacity in its pipeline, however very little of the pipeline is in the advanced stages of deployment with only 3% under construction (i.e., beyond the committed status of deployment) and the remaining 97% of the pipeline only 'anticipated' or 'publicly announced',
 - (f) NSW has considerable potential to deploy significantly more rooftop PV across residential, commercial and industrial rooftops; accelerating the uptake of rooftop PV in NSW can reduce the need for as much investment in large scale generation and storage capacity and transmission infrastructure, particularly in the short term, and

- (g) the NSW Consumer Energy Strategy has significant opportunity to accelerate CER uptake to complement large-scale deployment, however the details of the NSW government's allocation of \$290 million is yet to be confirmed.
- (2) That this House commends the work of all those involved in the creation of the *States of Transition* report, including the Nature Conservation Council of NSW which has been the voice for nature in NSW for over 65 years.
- (3) That this House calls on the NSW government to commit to working with communities and experts to improve strategic planning of renewable projects, to accelerate our renewable energy transition and promote environmental protection, restoration and connectivity.

 - d. The Parliamentary Friends of France commends the unhesitating courage of Mr Silas Despreaux and Mr Damien Guerot for stepping in to protect others and support Police Inspsector Amy Scott to stop the offender and save lives.
 - e. The ceremony was honoured to include speeches in support by the Governor, Her Excellency the Hon. Margaret Beazley AC KC, NSW Premier, the Hon. Chris Minns MP, NSW Opposition Leader, Mark Speakman SC MP, and Ambassador of France to Australia, H.E Pierre-Andre Imbert.
- (2) That this House extends its sinere condolences to the victim's families, and recognises the heroic actions of Mr Silas Despreaux, Mr Damien Guerot and NSW Police Inspector Amy Scott.

Mr PRESIDENT:

I give notice that on the next sitting day I will move:

- (1) That this House notes that on 1 July 2025, an expert report that analysed data from the Bureau of Crimes Statistics and Research prepared by Academics Don Weatherburn and Anna Ferrante from the Justice and Equity Centre revealed that:
 - (a) Aboriginal young people were 11.7% more likely to be checked by police than non-Aboriginal young people in their first 30 days of bail,
 - (b) when checked, Aboriginal young people were subjected to 42% more checks on average than non-Aboriginal young people,
 - (c) Aboriginal young people were more than twice as likely to be targeted with frequent bail checks, with nearly one in eight Aboriginal young people being checked more than 12 times, compared to around one in twenty non-Aboriginal young people,

(2) That this House notes that:

- (a) the report was commissioned on behalf of two Aboriginal clients, brothers aged 11 and 13, who were subjected to more than 150 bail compliance checks by NSW Police over a 20-month period despite having no bail conditions requiring or authorising police checks,
- (b) the 11-year old boy with no significant history of offending and on bail awaiting trial for a minor offence was checked 101 times over a 7-month period, including 20 times in a single month, and
- (c) the Justice and Equity Centre has filed a racial discrimination complaint against the NSW Police on behalf of the family for the excessive bail compliance checks.

- (3) That this House notes that the recent Law Enforcement Conduct Commission Report into Bail Compliance Checks in NSW provided to the NSW Parliament on 17 April found that:
 - (a) "there is a powerful argument that bail curfew and residential compliance checks involving entry onto private property may not be undertaken by the NSW Police Force in the absence of an enforcement condition fixed by a court under s 30 of the Bail Act",
 - (b) bail compliance checks on private property have an "intrusive nature",
 - (c) NSW Police had been conducting bail compliance checks without court enforced conditions or authorisation on the basis of "implied licence" which it considered a "weak legal principle" that is "leaving the Force open to complaint and claims of trespass",
 - (d) the Commissioner of Police should seek enforcement conditions from courts under Section 30 of the Bail Act in all matters where authority to conduct bail compliance checks on private property is sought and amend the Bail Compliance Check Standard Operating Procedures to do so, and
 - (e) if the Commissioner of Police fails to adopt these recommendations, the Attorney-General should seek to amend Section 30 of the Bail Act to make clear that the authority for the NSW Police to undertake bail curfew and residential compliance checks on private property should be sought from a court.
- (4) That this House calls on the Government to:
 - (a) follow the recommendation of the Law Enforcement Conduct Commission to amend Section 30 of the Bail Act to make clear that authority for the NSW Police to undertake bail curfew and residential compliance checks on private property should be sought from a court to remove police reliance on implied licence,
 - (b) support the First Nations family represented by the Justice and Equity Centre in reaching justice for experiencing racially targeted and excessive bail compliance checks by NSW Police, and

(c)	urgently acknowledge and work towards eliminating the racially targeted
	policing against First Nations young people by the NSW Police Force

- (1) That this House notes that:
 - (a) on 22 January 2023 two NSW Police Officers conducted a welfare check on a 48 year old woman with schizophrenia at Emu Plains,
 - (b) what begun as a welfare check divulged into the women, who was naked at the time, being punched, kicked, dragged by her hair and pepper sprayed 6 times,
 - (c) the vulnerable woman was pepper sprayed on her grazed back, an act only done to inflict pain onto her,
 - (d) At one point one of the officers was heard laughing at the situation and when the woman had been taken to Nepean Hospital in Western Sydney one of the officers told the staff 'you have to do what you have to do'
 - (e) both officers pleaded guilty to assault occasioning actual bodily harm, using a prohibited weapon without a warrant and three counts of common assault, and
- (2) That this House notes that:
 - (a) in September 2021 seven officers responded to a concern of welfare for a woman in Western Sydney,
 - (b) during this incident the police officers broke down the woman's door, climbed up onto her balcony, chased her out of her own home, tasered her dog and pepper sprayed her without warning, and
 - (c) this woman now suffers from severe anxiety and post traumatic stress disorder due to the actions of the NSW Police.

- (3) That this House notes that:
 - (a) Colin Burling was a 45 year old who had mental health difficulties,
 - (b) on 15 July 2025 law enforcement were responding to a concern for Colin's welfare,
 - (c) what was meant to be a check on his mental health resulted in Colin being pinned to the ground, screaming for help and begging for his life while being smothered by NSW Police who were yelling stop resisting, and
 - (d) Colin died as a result of these police actions.
- (4) That this House recognises that:
 - (a) In 16 weeks of mandatory training, NSW Police currently receive just one day of training on mental health incidents, which includes no roleplays or scenario work,
 - (b) an updated Memorandum of Understanding between NSW Health, NSW Police and NSW Ambulance was said to be in negotiations on 4 September 2024,
 - (c) since then two vulnerable people have died due to the NSW police escalating mental health situations, and
 - (d) The NSW Police's own internal review, published in April 2024, stated that the mere presence of police uniforms, firearms, lights, and sirens can escalate a mental health situation.

(4)

That this House calls for:

- (a) the prompt release of an updated Memorandum of Understanding that accurately considers the escalating presence of law enforcement on mental health situations, and
- (b) an acknowledgement that the NSW Police Force should not be the first responders to welfare checks and if they are should be applying de-escalating tactics such as not wearing uniforms and concealing weapons,
- (c) the acceptance of the Greens-led mental health inquiry's recommendation for additional mandatory training for police officers in responding to mental health emergencies, and
- (e) the continuation and expansion of the PACER Program to all Police Area Commands and additional mandatory mental health training for police officers from the Mental Health Intervention Team
