Answers are required to be relevant to the question asked. (PDpp.4773, 5255)

Answers to questions on notice and answers to questions without notice must be provided within 35 calendar days after the question is asked. During any adjournment of the House, replies to these questions may be delivered to the Clerk. On the first sitting day after any lengthy adjournment, for example between budget and spring sessions, all answers to questions on notice received by the Clerk are published in Questions and Answers. Similarly, all answers to questions without notice received by the Clerk are published in Hansard. Staff in the Legislative Council Procedure Office and the office of the Leader of the Government are in regular contact to ensure compliance with the dates for submission of answers. To date there have been no instances of answers to questions being submitted late. (PDpp 4349-4350)

Questions should not contain argument or ask for an expression of opinion. (PDpp. 4487, 4657, 5461-2)

A question must not ask for a statement or announcement of the government's policy, and it is a matter for the Minister to determine whether a question involves a statement of government policy. (PDp. 915)

It is not orderly for a Minister to announce Government policy in response to a question. Members may not ask questions calling for an announcement of Government policy. (PDp. 1537)

There is nothing in the standing or sessional orders that precludes a Minister from asking a question. (PDp. 5855)

A supplementary question must seek clarification of the previous answer and must not contain new material. (PDpp. 4386, 4876)

The sessional order relating to rules for questions clearly provides that questions must not contain hypothetical matter. The same rule applies to supplementary questions. A supplementary question which seeks information of a hypothetical nature rather than elucidation of the Minister's answer is out of order. (PDp. 7756)

Pecuniary interest disclosures—

While questions may be asked about entries in a member's Pecuniary Interest Register, the question must be directly related to the entry in the pecuniary interest register. (PDpp. 4489, 5850)

Questions to do with a Minister's private affairs must be directly related to the Minister's entry in the Pecuniary Interest Register. (PDp. 4486)

Members do not have to answer for the actions of their families, only questions relating to Minister's own pecuniary interests. (PDp. 5850)

A Minister may be asked questions to do with public affairs correlating to his or her portfolio. Questions relating to Ministers' pecuniary interests may also be asked. However, as the Pecuniary Interests Register does not require a declaration by relatives of members, only questions relating to the Ministers' own pecuniary interests may be asked. (PDp. 6418)

Reflections—

Reflecting on the hours of sitting is not reflecting on a decision of the House. (PDp. 4081)

Members must not cast aspersions or imputations on another member except by substantive motion. (PDp. 1730, 2584, 4673)

Imputations of improper motives and all personal reflections on members are disorderly. (PDpp. 456, 946, 1375, 2718, 2896, 3387, 4690)

The parliamentary process should not be used to attack a member's reputation. (PDp. 4673)

Reference to a member as "sexist" deemed offensive. (PDp. 6306)

To claim that non-disclosure of pecuniary interest is wilful is deemed offensive. (PDp. 6447)
