The Draft Animal Welfare Bill proposes that the enforcement reports are to be tabled in both houses of the NSW Parliament. This is consistent with Recommendation 11 of the final report of the inquiry into animal cruelty laws in NSW. The details of what must be included in the enforcement reports are currently prescribed in the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals Regulation 2012 and will be subject to review as part of the development of regulations to support the Draft Animal Welfare Bill. The NSW Government intends to consult with stakeholders and the community in developing the details of those regulations. Supported in principle The Draft Animal Welfare Bill proposes a requirement for the enforcement reports of the approved charitable organisations to be tabled in NSW Parliament and includes amendments to clarify that the approved charitable organisations are subject to the requirements of the Government Information (Public Access) Act 2009 in respect of their animal welfare law enforcement functions.
