

Who are we?

The New South Wales Apiarists' Association Inc. (NSWAA) is the state peak body for commercial beekeepers.

Honey bees are essential not just for the production of honey and other hive products, but also for pollination of the numerous food crops that feed us and our livestock – bees are the cornerstone of Australian agriculture.

Our Association plays a crucial role in ensuring that we have a viable and sustainable beekeeping industry in NSW, and any beekeeper can become a member.

What do we do?

Government and community liaison - the NSWAA Executive Council represents its members in liaison with government, media and the general community.

There are many problems faced by commercial beekeepers in NSW. Of particular importance to our members is secure access to floral resources and biosecurity.
