EDUCATION – KEY FACTS

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Key budget elements - Education Cluster

- 2019-20 Budget for the Education Cluster comprises an \$18.6 billion recurrent expenses budget, with a further \$2.4 billion provided for capital investment in NSW Government schools and in TAFE NSW.
- This funding is provided across to the Department of Education, the NSW Education Standards Authority (NESA) and TAFE NSW to support early childhood education, school education, and vocational education and training.

Key budget elements – Department of Education

- 2019-20 Department of Education Budget comprises an expense budget of \$18.2 billion and a capital expenditure budget of \$2.2 billion
- The total RAM (resource allocation model) loadings for 2020 is \$1.27 billion
- The total 2020 allocations for the four equity loadings are:
 - \$151.5 million delivered directly to schools for English language
 proficiency in 2020
 - o \$96.6 million allocated in the Aboriginal background loading
 - \$294.8 million delivered to schools in the Low Level Adjustment for Disability loading
 - \$432.9 million allocated to schools in the Socio-economic background loading
- The NSW Government signed the National School Reform Agreement and associated bilateral agreement in November 2018. Under these agreements, NSW will provide an additional \$6.4 billion in recurrent funding for government schools from 2019 to the end of 2027. This includes \$712 million in additional funding through the NSW School Equity Program from 2020 to 2029.
- Literacy and numeracy action plan \$340 million over four years commencing 2016-17.
- School planned maintenance funding the 2019-20 State Budget allocated \$449 million to clear the existing school maintenance backlog in all schools by July 2020, bringing the total investment into planned maintenance to more than \$1.3 billion over five years.
- 2019 election commitment to expand mental health and wellbeing support in schools through an \$88 million investment over four years from 2019/2020-2022/2023. Includes up to 100 school counselling roles, 350 student support officer roles, telepsychology and FIFO programs, scholarships to train school counsellors and school psychologists, and increased partnerships with mental health providers for programs in schools.
- The NSW Government has invested \$120 million to ensure that all parents of children at public primary schools that need before and after school care (BASC) have access to a service by 2021.

2019/2020 Budget Highlights

- The NSW Government's 2019-20 Budget includes \$6.7 billion over the next four years (capital expenditure for 2019-20 is \$2.2 billion).
- This \$6.7 billion investment will deliver more than 190 new and upgraded schools and create more than 3,500 new permanent classrooms and more than 65,500 student places.
- School planned maintenance funding \$1.3 billion over five years commencing 2017-18. This commitment is continued in 2019-20, with \$449 million allocated for planned maintenance in schools across the state. The NSW Government has committed to eliminate the school maintenance backlog in every public school across the state.

Infrastructure achievements since 2011

- The NSW Government's 2019-20 Budget includes \$6.7 billion over the next four years to deliver more than 190 new and upgraded schools. This will create more than 3,500 new permanent classrooms and more than 65,500 student places.
- Since 2011, 63 new or relocated schools and 180 major school upgrades have been funded. Planning will also commence on a further 32 projects.
 Since 2011, this Government has announced more than 274 infrastructure

- projects that provide more than 3,500 new permanent classrooms and more than 81,000 additional student places.
- As at 21 July 2020, 34 new and relocated schools and 103 major upgrades have been completed, delivering approximately 1,960 new permanent classrooms and over 36,800 student places.

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Before and After School Care (BASC) program

As at12 August 2020:

The NSW Government is investing \$120 million into expanding before and after school care to make places available to all parents with children at government primary schools that need it.

The package includes \$50 million for new facilities and equipment, \$40 million in rental subsidies and \$20 million for innovative solutions to meet the needs of smaller schools and particularly those in regional and rural NSW. A further \$8 million will create a specialist team to support principals in administering these vital services and \$2 million to create online tools for parents.

Across the state, from 1 July 2019 to 12 August 2020 we have:

- Grown the sector by 61 more services
- Expanded places at 149 existing services
- This has created 9,322 extra places, including mixed use places
 - o We know that at least 7,539 new places have been created, up to possibly 9,322.
- Created a net increase of 40 services and 6,932 places on NSW Government School sites
- Built the BASC Finder website, which went live on 17 December 2019
 - The website has had 11,554 unique page views
- Built the Vacation Care Finder, which went live on 9 April 2020
 - The website has had 493 unique page views

Between 1 July 2019 and 12 August 2020 we have approved 66 grant applications, at a total of over \$1,768,347, resulting in an additional 1,986 places and securing 237 ongoing places.

As a consequence of COVID-19 we have seen the growth of approved services and places plateau. We have also seen the temporary closure of before and after school care services, with work underway to support as many services as possible to reopen. As at 12 August 2020, 149 services had notified of a temporary closure related to COVID-19, with 143 of these services having been able to re-open. The operational impact of COVID-19 on before and after school care services continues to evolve. We will continue to monitor the impact of COVID-19 on the sector and work with services and the Commonwealth to secure the sustainability of the sector.

From 1 July 2019 to 31 December 2019, a parent survey *Have Your Say,* hosted on the Service NSW website, enabled parents to lodge details of their specific care needs and stay in touch with progress in the implementation of the program. This information will help prioritise funding to areas of greatest need. The survey has now closed and has been replaced by the BASC Finder. Parents are able to use a revised Have Your Say form (Expression of Needs Form: as at 12 August 2020 the form had 493 unique views and 93 completed forms returned) to continue to inform the roll out of the BASC Program if they are unable to find care using the BASC Finder.

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The Department has relaunched a new Have Your Say form to better understand the impact of COVID-19 on parents. As at 12 August 2020 there were 3,341 responses from 368 postcodes.

- 320 of 549 enquiries were from OSHC services/providers
 104 of 320 were inbound enquiries from OSHCs
- 125 of 549 enquiries were inbound from a range of stakeholders including schools, ECE services and family day care services.
- Network of Community Activities has provided 182 viability consultations for closed OSHC services and services at risk of closure as part of the COVID-19 OSHC Sector Emergency Rescue Package.

Capital Works Grants

Since 2013, more than \$90 million allocated for Capital Works to create additional community preschool places across NSW. This includes \$42.1 million for Capital Works as part of 2018-19 NSW Budget and \$20 million as part of 2019-20 budget for new and existing community preschools to build, renovate or extend their facilities to cater for increasing enrolments across the State. This funding will be committed over the forward estimates.

Compliance

The number of confirmed breaches in National Quality Framework (NQF) approved services in NSW has reduced marginally from 7,865 in 2017-18 to 7,773 in 2018-19. The number equates to 142 confirmed breaches per 100 NQF approved services in 2018-19 compared to 145 in 2017-18.
