2. Prof Mayes offered to provide further information on research on the policy objectives, uptake, motivations and consequences of parental leave for fathers.

This research includes work on parental leave schemes including leave for fathers in Norway (2002) and more recently in Spain (2013) and Korea (2019) (see references below). Findings point to outcomes that deviate from the policy objectives; the effects of a rights based approach; varying consequences for fathers across class lines; and the important role of organisational culture in shaping uptake, motivations and outcomes
