- UCI Road World Cycling Championships 2022
- FIBA Women's Basketball World Cup 2022
- World Athletics Cross Country Championships (postponed to 2023 due to COVID-19)
- FIFA Women's World Cup 2023
- Netball World Cup 2027

The bid process for the Rugby World Cup 2027 is currently underway and the bid process for the Rugby League World Cup 2029 has not yet commenced.

The NSW 2022 UCI Road World Championships Wollongong Legacy Partnership Program was open to any eligible organisations located in the Illawarra region, which consists of the Wollongong, Shellharbour, Kiama, Wollondilly and Wingecarribee and Shoalhaven Local Government areas.

The Office of Sport did not make recommendations and the Minister for Sport did not approve grants under this program.

One of the resources developed by the Office of Sport was to consolidate information that was available on the all the sources of relevant COVID-19 financial assistance available to sport clubs from both the NSW and Commonwealth Governments.

In addition, the Office provided a dedicated email address where sector organisations could direct questions about COVID-19 restrictions and rules as well as resources and support available. The Minister for Sport and the Office of Sport provided regular livestream updates to State Sporting Organisations and other key sector stakeholders for them to disseminate information and advice to their clubs.

On 23 October 2021, the NSW Government announced the \$25 million Sport and Recreation Recovery and Community Rebuild Package, which included up to \$12.5 million for the Grassroots Sport Fund, targeted at local sporting clubs and associations affiliated with recognised State Sporting Organisations. This will provide payments of \$1,000 to sport clubs to assist them with recovery from the impacts of COVID-19 and the recommencement of community sport.

\$3.1 million to support participation initiatives focused on areas most affected by restrictions, including south-western Sydney and regional NSW

Upon offering a position within the NSWIS sport science team (which includes both sports scientists and strength and conditioning coaches), the NSWIS People & Culture team request evidence of all relevant qualifications and accreditations. These requirements are then also followed up annually to ensure they are not expired.

Employees are contacted prior to accreditation expiration dates and are led through the renewal process by a member of the People and Culture department.

The NSWIS People and Culture Team monitor the accreditation expiration dates regularly to ensure NSWIS complies with the relevant accreditation standards.
