2. **Extract from Transcript (page 18):**

The Hon. JOHN GRAHAM: Firstly, in relation to the outlaw motorcycle gang incident, it was largely in Lake Macquarie. We are referring to the same incident?

Mr MURPHY: I think there were a number of different groups that were targeting these schemes across the Hunter and upper North Coast.

The Hon. JOHN GRAHAM: What other areas were involved? The initial police referrals were from Lake Macquarie. Is that correct?

Mr MURPHY: Lake Macquarie and the Hunter Valley, and a little bit further up north.

The Hon. JOHN GRAHAM: When you say the North Coast, where are you referring to?

Mr MURPHY: Do you have the details on that, Mr Bohnen?

Mr BOHNEN: No, I would have to take that on notice.

In our capacity as providing advice and resources to perform duties as the Strategic Investigations Unit (SIU) on behalf of both DCS and Service NSW, a key component of our role was to work with law enforcement to both receive, and refer, both suspected and actual fraudulent grant applications for investigation.

Throughout our engagement, we engaged and supported police investigations from across the state, including the State Crime Command as well as various Police Area Commands (PACs) and regions via our dedicated Law Enforcement Liaison role.

We supported two Strike Forces in the Lake Macquarie and Hunter/Cessnock regions as well as various PACs up and down the east coast of NSW.

For further information about law enforcement liaison, these should be directed to Service NSW as Core Integrity no longer has access to the relevant material as outlined above.
