1	Given the extraordinary and concerning nature of GWIC's "Proactive strategies which can be adopted ahead of final report of Select Committee", can GWIC please supply to the Committee a copy of its Meeting Minutes for the Senior Leadership Team Meeting on 17 June 2021 (12 noon) chaired by Mr Griffin and the associated document entitled "Strategies for Responding to NSW Parliamentary Select Committee"?	Although it is unclear as to how this request relates to the Committee's terms of reference, the Commission nonetheless provides the documents requested. The documents are attached as Annexure A. From Questions on Notice 6730 and 6809 asked in the Legislative Council by the Hon Mark Latham MLC and from reading his social media posts, it is clear that Mr Latham has already been provided with unauthorised access to the Commission's "Strategy" document which is now the subject of the Committee's request.

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
