Transport for NSW allocated \$245,000 for Pedestrian Safety in 2021-22 and committed to \$790,000 in 2022/23. Transport for NSW allocated \$235,000 for Bicycle Safety in 2021-22 and committed to \$575,000 in 2022/23.

In relation to bus safety, Transport for NSW delivers a number of further initiatives including the 'Be Bus Aware' campaign messages are delivered to key stakeholders and industry associations such as BusNSW. Transport for NSW has also developed a campaign 'Safety Around School Buses' to remind motorists to drive safely around school buses. Transport for NSW invested \$85,000, and has been recommitted to in 2022-23.

Bus Safety Week also raises awareness to improve bus safety for all road users. The advertising campaign consists of radio and digital social communication and is supported by Transport for NSW owned channels such as CCTV screens on buses and messages across electronic overhead boards across the road network.

During the financial year 2021-22, there were 13 crashes where a bus and a pedestrian were involved in the first impact. During the financial year 2022-23 to date, there has been one crash where a bus and a pedestrian were involved in the first impact.

During the financial year 2021-22, there were five crashes where a bus and a pedal cyclist were involved in the first impact. During the financial year 2022-23 to date, there have been no crashes of this nature.

These statistics are limited to those crashes reported to the NSW Police Force. Crash statistics are preliminary and subject to change.

Transport for NSW allocated \$245,000 for Pedestrian Safety in 2021-22 and committed to \$790,000 in 2022/23. Transport for NSW allocated \$2350,000 for Bicycle Safety in 2021-22 and committed to \$575,000 in 2022/23.

In relation to pedestrian and cycling safety around trains, Transport for NSW delivers a number of initiatives including Rail Safety Week targets local

communities and public transport passengers, encouraging safety within the rail and light rail environment. The event did not run in the 2021/22 financial year due to COVID-19 and the associated Public Health Orders, and total amount allocated in 2022-2023 is \$60,000.

Sydney Trains' Platform Gap Filler program is another safety initiative for all customers when moving on and off trains at railway stations. The total amount expended in 2021-2022 the program was approximately \$1.6 million. The total amount allocated in 2022-2023 is just over \$4.6 million.

There have been no collisions between trains and pedestrians or cyclists at level crossings maintained by Sydney Trains in 2021-22 or in 2022 to date.

Transport for NSW has developed marketing communications campaigns that support safety messaging for pedestrians and cyclists in NSW. These include paid advertising, events and activations to educate pedestrians and cyclists on safe behaviour, as well as raising awareness amongst motorists of safe road sharing behaviours.

A paid media campaign focusing on pedestrians, cyclists and driver safety was implemented to support the launch of CBD light rail. Information is publicly available on the Transport for NSW website. The aim of the campaign was to encourage customers to be aware and take extra care when travelling on public transport. The campaign rolled out on trains, buses, light rail and ferries.

In 2021-2022, there were five accidents where pedestrians, cyclists and light rail have come into conflict. There have been no accidents in 2022-2023, to date.

These statistics are limited to those crashes reported to the NSW Police Force. Crash statistics are preliminary and subject to change.
