Level the Playing Field

Q.1 – I am advised: The NSW Government will announce budget details of grant funding for the sport portfolio in the 2024/2025 NSW Budget.

Questions from Hon. Chris Rath MLC (on behalf of the Opposition)

Small Business

Engineered Stone

Q.2 - I am advised: The Minister for Work Health and Safety and SafeWork NSW are leading the NSW Government response to the prohibition on engineered stone.

This question should be directed to the Minister for Work Health and Safety.

Q.3 - I am advised: Work, Health and Safety Ministers will be working with the Commonwealth to deliver support as necessary. It should be noted that equipment such as wet cutters are required for many other materials outside of engineered stone. The Minns Government strongly supports the ban on use of engineered stone in Australia.

In opposition Labor promised that we would take the strongest possible action to protect vulnerable workers against the scourge of silicosis and we are delivering on that commitment.

As members would be aware on 13 December last year all Work, Health and Safety Ministers across the country agreed to prohibit the use, supply and manufacture of all engineered stone.

This prohibition will commence in NSW from 1 July 2024.

Work, Health and Safety Ministers also agreed that there is a need for a transition period for contracts entered into on or before 13 December 2023.

Details are expected to be settled by WHS Ministers at the next meeting in March 2024.

As outlined in the Communique provided after the 13 December meeting, Work, Health and Safety Ministers are scheduled to meet again in March 2024 to:

- settle arrangements for a transition period for contracts entered into on or before 13
 December 2023,
- endorse amendments to the model WHS laws to give effect to the prohibition,
- settle a national framework for working with previously installed engineered stone products,
- endorse policy parameters on stronger regulations for crystalline silica processes, and
- endorse a process for assessing products to be considered as exempt from the prohibition.

The outcomes of the March meeting will be communicated to both the public and industry immediately after the meeting.

Energy support for small business

Q.5 - I am advised: This NSW Labor Government understands small businesses are currently facing a range of challenges after being neglected by the former Coalition Government for 12 years.

The NSW Labor Government is delivering 'cost of doing business' relief. We have already delivered on our commitment to provide energy relief with a \$650 rebate to more than 320,000 small businesses using less than 100 megawatt hours per year.

We are also delivering toll relief to more than 700,000 families and businesses across the state, capping tolls at \$60/week.

The NSW Labor Government also launched the grants and funding finder bringing over 500 grants and rebates from 46 agencies into one place.

We want to make doing business easier, and we want to make help more accessible which is why we created the Service NSW Business Bureau. The Service NSW Business Bureau will be the focal point for business support.

The Bureau will deliver key programs and services, including

- Supporting businesses to navigate regulations,
- Tackling unproductive red tape
- Providing businesses with access support to grow their business, and
- Delivering greater access to government contracts and overseas markets.

The NSW Business Bureau will also provide businesses across the state with a direct voice to Government, because we want to give businesses a fair shot.

We have also delivered the Charter for Small Business, a first-of-its-kind agreement with the Business community to ensure we are working for the Small Businesses in this state, and they are considered at key decision points in government.

The NSW Labor Government wants to see small businesses grow and thrive. To help support this vision we are boosting NSW Government procurement from small businesses.

This includes:

- lifting the direct procurement threshold, from \$150,000 to \$250,000, meaning a greater share of Government business for small business
- simplifying contracts and process, giving time back to our time poor small businesses; and,
- adding a local supplier element to tender weighting, to ensure we are supporting our local businesses.

Unlike the former Government, the NSW Labor Government is ready to back local small businesses.

Q.7 - I am advised: Rural and regional businesses will benefit from the range of actions in The Charter and Action Plan, which have a state-wide application. Rural and regional businesses will benefit from the commitments under the Charter including reducing red tape, increasing procurement and export opportunities and free personalised support from the Business Bureau.

The Business Bureau was launched last year (in October 2023) and supports regional and rural businesses through its Business Concierge and business advisory services which are available across NSW. The Bureau works with businesses at a time and place convenient to them. The Bureau also provides a Business Profile personalised account for businesses to manage their interactions with the NSW Government in one place.

Q.8 – I am advised: The Service NSW Business Bureau will identify opportunities to reduce red tape. The Bureau will also reduce red tape through one-to-one advice to businesses on matters including starting a business and complying with regulation. Business concierges provide advice on regulatory requirements across a range of NSW agencies. The Bureau's Business Profile Licence manager enables businesses to manage their licences all in one place. These measures can save businesses time and effort and assist in avoiding duplication of processes.

Lands and Property

Crown Lands and Aboriginal Land Claims

Q.10 – I am advised: Crown Lands works in partnership with Local Aboriginal Land Councils to prioritise claims. This practice ensures Crown Lands can target its resources toward claims that deliver practical outcomes to Land Councils, in alignment with the intent of the NSW Aboriginal Land Rights Act 1983.

The majority of claims under active assessment have been prioritised by Local Aboriginal Land Councils.

Q.11 - I am advised: Please refer to answer for Question 12.

Q.12 - I am advised: As at 29 February 2024: 38,405

Q.13 - I am advised: The intent of the Aboriginal Land Rights Act 1983 is to provide compensation to Aboriginal communities for the dispossession of their land. The Act provides Local Aboriginal Land Councils and the New South Wales Aboriginal Land Council with the statutory right to lodge claims on Crown land. Crown Lands has no control over the number of claims that are lodged.

Crown Lands has assigned additional staff to work on land claim assessments.

The prioritisation of claims assessed has also been improved. Crown Lands collaborates closely with the NSW Aboriginal Land Council and Local Aboriginal Land Councils to prioritise claims.

Crown Lands is constantly reviewing and updating procedures on Aboriginal land claim assessments as case law evolves and feedback is received from Land Councils and other Stakeholders, which has increased efficiency in land claim determinations.

Crown Lands is also negotiating several Aboriginal land agreements, which may settle multiple Aboriginal land claims and return of land to Aboriginal people.

Q.15 - I am advised: The length of time taken for each claim is dependent on the complexity of each individual claim. However, as a rule of thumb from the date an assessment commences the average timeframe can be between 6 to 9 months. This allows for referencing to external stakeholders the mandatory 4-month appeals period required under Land and Environment Court rules.

Q.19 - I am advised: The Aboriginal Land Claims Assessment Team consists of 20 FTE. Of these 15 are assessment officers. The remaining 5 perform administration, reviewing and supervisory functions.

Q.21 - I am advised: Crown Lands has invested resources into a project to assess the oldest 1000 claims. This has assisted to address historical claims from the 1980s. There are two claims outstanding from 1984. Crown Lands is working with the relevant Land Councils on these two complex claims.

Q.22 - I am advised: There has been no reduction in staff. The team consists of 20 FTE. Of those 15 are assessment officers. The remaining 5 perform administration, reviewing and supervisory functions.

Q.23 - I am advised: Staff numbers are included in the annual reports of agencies and departments. Staff salaries are set by relevant awards, largely the Crown Employees (Public Sector –Salaries) award.

Q.24 – I am advised: Crown Lands' rent redetermination program is based on calendar years.

For the 2023 calendar year, 5,253 rent redeterminations were applied.

In the calendar year 2024, 2,331 accounts will have rents redetermined.

Q.25 - I am advised: For calendar year 2023, 5,253 accounts had their rents redetermined. Concessions expire and are reassessed when rents are redetermined. Of the 5,253 accounts, 1,192 accounts were granted a concession.

Q.26 - I am advised: For calendar year 2023, 5,253 accounts had their rents redetermined. Of the 5,253 accounts, 1,104 accounts were assessed for hardship and provided with either a form of waiver or payment plan.

Q.27 - I am advised: For calendar year 2023, the total increase in rents from the rent redetermination program was \$7.26 million, with a \$3.03 million increase in concessions granted resulting in a net gain of \$4.23 million.

For the 3-month period between 1 November 2023 to 31 January 2024, 873 accounts were redetermined resulting in a total rent increase of \$142,998 and net increase of \$96,809 after concessions were granted.

Q.28 – I am advised: The \$4.23 million in revenue has been deployed in offsetting Crown Lands operational costs including bush fire trail remediation.

Q.29 - I am advised: For calendar year 2023, the average rent increase was \$1,381 and the average net increase was \$805 after concessions were granted.

For the 3-month period between 1 November 2023 to 31 January 2024, the average rent increase was \$164 and the average net increase was \$110 after concessions were granted.

Q.30 - I am advised: Crown Lands' rent redetermination program is based on calendar years.

The calendar year 2024 rent redetermination program covers 2,331 accounts, this includes 1,666 accounts carried forward from last calendar year.

Government audit of public land

Q.31 – I am advised: Details identifying individual lots as part of the Land Audit are Cabinet in Confidence.

Q.32 - I am advised: Following due diligence on sites and selection by the housing delivery agencies, transfers require a decision of Government. Subsequently, the housing delivery agency will undertake any further detailed due diligence required, inclusive of key stakeholder consultation, to enable realisation of the planning pathway identified to develop the site for housing.

Q.33 - I am advised: The release of land is dependent on decisions of Government.

Q.34 – I am advised: Delivering more housing for the people of NSW is not something the NSW Government can do alone. Improving housing supply in NSW will require all levels of government to work together in partnership with the private sector. Consistent with statements made prior to the

election, the NSW Government will consider partnering with the private sector to deliver housing where doing so represents value for money to the State and where it will deliver better outcomes than the State could deliver by itself. Housing delivered on surplus government land will be subject to the Government's election commitment that 30% will be social and affordable housing.

Catholic Cemeteries Trust

Q.35 - I am advised: The Crown Land Management Amendment (Reserve Trusts) Regulation 2024 came into effect on 23 February 2024.

It was accompanied by Parliamentary Counsel's opinion that the regulation could be legally made.

This regulation defers CMCT's transition day from 29 February 2024 to 1 July 2024.

Q.36 – I am advised: Given a judgment was expected in February 2024 and the regulation was due to expire on 29 February 2024 advice was sought in advance of the judgment being handed down.

Q.37 - I am advised: Yes.

Q.38 - I am advised: Please refer to answer for Question 37.

Q.39 - I am advised: The judgment *Catholic Metropolitan Cemeteries Trust v Attorney General of New South Wales* [2024] NSWCA 30 found that a charitable trust exists over the proceeds derived from burying the dead of the Roman Catholic denomination in the Catholic portion of Rookwood Cemetery. This charitable trust is not controlled by the State.

The extent to which the judgment affects NSW Treasury's assessment of CMCT's status is a question for NSW Treasury.

Q.40 - I am advised: This question is best directed to the Treasurer and NSW Treasury.

CMCT is the Crown land manager for the cemeteries at Rookwood Catholic, Liverpool, Varroville, Kemps Creek and Wallacia (CMCT Cemeteries). CMCT's financial statements for the year ended 30 June 2023 as filed with the Australian Charities and Not-for-profits Commission value the CMCT Cemeteries land at \$88.4 million, not \$370 million.

Q.41 - I am advised: No. CMCT is the only remaining transitional reserve trust.

Metropolitan Memorial Parks Board

Q.42 - I am advised: Please refer to page 87 of the transcript.

Q.45 – I am advised: The Public Service Commission determined the annual remuneration level for the board at \$70,000 for the chair and \$40,000 for members. This equates to a total remuneration cost of \$270,000 per annum or \$810,000 for three years.

Q.46 - I am advised: The cost of developing Macarthur Memorial Park is estimated to be approximately \$41.7 million to date. There will be no cost to the NSW taxpayer as the costs of developing the cemetery will be fully covered by CMCT.

CMCT is working towards an opening date of March 2025.

Q.47 – I am advised: A new Crown cemetery, Macarthur Memorial Park, is being developed at Varroville in Sydney's southwest which will create up to 136,000 burial plots.

More supply within Sydney is needed to meet community needs and expectations of affordable and accessible burial options. The NSW Government is considering opportunities to generate more supply at existing Crown cemetery sites and working to identify land that could be suitable for new Crown cemeteries within the Sydney region.

Q.50 – I am advised: The COMPLAN Response phase occurs in response to a situation that threatens community harmony. The response phase includes specific measures to counter divisive influences, limit harmful consequences, and provide support and relief for affected persons and communities. These measures are listed in the publicly available plan.

COMPLAN Response phase arrangements have been implemented in response to various situations since the plan came into effect in late 2017.

Multicultural NSW committed to reviewing COMPLAN as part of its 2021-2025 strategic plan, Stronger Together. The initial review found COMPLAN arrangements remain fit for purpose and has not recommended any substantial revisions.

GROW Pilot Program

Q.56 – I am advised: Staff numbers are included in the annual reports of agencies and departments.

Q.125 - I am advised: Venues NSW was allocated \$5 million in the 2022/23 NSW Budget to develop a business case for the installation of a retractable roof at Accor Stadium.

The former Liberal/National Government allocated no funds for the program in the four-year forward estimates. The NSW Labor Government made the responsible decision to continue the voucher as a means-tested program to ensure those that most in need of cost-of-living relief can access it.

As the Active Kids and Creative Kids voucher programs have merged, delivery of Active and Creative Kids vouchers now falls within the portfolio of the Minister for Customer Service and Digital Government.

LANDS AND PROPERTY

Land Audit

Q.145 - I am advised: Two properties owned by Property and Development NSW have been nominated for exemption from the asset sales pause. These properties have a total area of approximately 8,149 square metres.

Q.146 - I am advised: A land audit of this scale is complex, and it needs to be done right to ensure land identified is fit for housing and associated amenities.

The NSW Labor Government is undertaking the largest change to Sydney's planning and zoning in decades. The previous Government offered 12 years of incompetence and created this crisis, and this Government is working hard to fix it.

This audit is a first-of-its-kind and requires the appropriate due diligence.

Details identifying individual lots are Cabinet in Confidence.

Land IQ

Q.155 - I am advised: Land iQ is a spatially-enabled land use evaluation tool that provides a single whole of government (WofG) platform to reduce duplication and costs across Government.

It integrates key data sets (e.g. from Spatial Digital Twin, ePlanning) and assessment frameworks (e.g. Movement & Place, Treasury Jobs calculator) to enable users to analyse land and property in a more consistent, transparent and evidence-based way.

Land iQ can be used to assess all land and property in NSW (not just Government-owned).

Q.156 - I am advised: August 2020.

Q.157 - I am advised: Development of a Minimum Viable Product (MVP) version of Land iQ commenced on 6 July 2021.

User Acceptance Testing (UAT) of the MVP version of Land iQ commenced in April 2022.

Q.158 - I am advised: Land iQ was formally launched to select NSW Government users in early July 2022.

Q.159 - I am advised: Land iQ was developed by Property and Development NSW (PDNSW) in partnership with WSP Australia, Giraffe and Aerometrex.

Q.160 - I am advised: As of 29 February 2024, there are 42 entities with access to the Land iQ system.

328 employees across the 42 NSW Government entities have access to Land iQ as at 29 February 2024.

Q.161 - I am advised: The following contract suppliers to the Land iQ system have access to the system:

- WSP Australia Pty Ltd
- Giraffe Technology Pty Ltd
- Endava Australia Pty Ltd (contractor providing services under WSP Australia Pty Ltd related to assessment of user interface and user experience improvements to Land iQ)

As of 29 February 2024, there are 22 non-government individuals who are employees of the above contract suppliers who have access to the Land iQ system.

Q.162 - I am advised: Land iQ project data (within the confines of the capability of the Land iQ system) is stored in a secured server owned and operated by the suppliers. Project data consists of identifiers used to load & save a project within the Land iQ system, alongside specific user-defined/created elements of the project (drawing layers depicting shapes/colours on a map, map-based labelling, user-saved search criteria, enabled data layers within a project, user-uploaded data layers).

Specific project data such as data in relation to the Land Audit (e.g. project documentation, property analyses, project timing and scope, project or property decisions, current project/property status, etc.) is stored on NSW Government servers and are only accessible by a restricted set of NSW Government employees.

Q.163 - I am advised: The Land iQ system was trialled with nine Western Sydney Local Councils in March 2023. Access to Land iQ is expected to be made available for all NSW Local Governments by mid-2024.

Q.164 - I am advised: The Land iQ platform requires login credentials to access. Different access rights are assigned to each user that govern exactly what a user is able to see within the platform. The individual user does not have the capability to create new login credentials for the Land iQ environment.

PDNSW maintains administrative oversight of data made available within Land iQ and can revoke a user's access to specific data if needed.

Upon issuing a license to a new user within Land iQ, users must accept the terms and conditions of use. For NSW Government users, this explicitly states that no information or outputs generated from Land iQ are to be distributed outside of the NSW Government without the prior approval of the Department / PDNSW.

In relation to the land audit, confidential data is not stored on the Land iQ platform itself and is instead held by the land audit team on secure NSW Government servers with restricted access.

Coffs Harbour Jetty Foreshore

Q.165 - I am advised: Much of the Coffs Harbour Jetty Foreshore Precinct is currently inaccessible for public enjoyment. While gravelled areas provide overflow parking, these do not reflect the potential of this foreshore. Residual railway land is fenced off and separated from public access.

The NSW Government seeks to use and celebrate the uniqueness and significance of the Coffs Harbour Jetty Foreshore Precinct to deliver government priorities consistent with the refined masterplan that was published in December 2022 following extensive engagement with the Coffs community.

Following extensive feedback, the masterplan provides an even greater focus on open space, support for local businesses and tourism and housing.

Q.166 - I am advised: Property and Development NSW determined Council's proposal does not present a unique opportunity, value for money, nor does it adequately deliver on the Government's priorities for the region, to support Coffs Harbour as a thriving regional city. The lack of detail in Council's land proposal, in respect to the future use and timing of improvements of the Jetty foreshore land, if the NSW Government accepted Council's proposal, was also an important consideration.

(a) Property and Development NSW is leading revitalisation of the Coffs Harbour Jetty Foreshore Precinct (the Precinct) on behalf of the NSW Government which owns land within the Precinct.

Property and Development NSW is working closely with Council, the Coffs community, industry and other government agencies to deliver the Precinct vision.

The only formal arrangement involving PDNSW related to the Coffs Community Building that was completed in 2023 and transferred to Coffs Harbour City Council control shortly thereafter.

Q.167 - I am advised: A business case has been prepared for the Coffs Harbour Jetty Foreshore program.

- (a) Revitalisation of the Coffs Harbour Jetty Foreshore Precinct provides the opportunity to fulfill multiple government priorities that will benefit the Coffs community including the need for more housing in Coffs Harbour, supporting a thriving regional economy, expanding tourism and hospitality offerings, and enhancing public open space as well as sustainable movement choices (active transport).
- (b) A cost benefit analysis forms part of the business case which is Cabinet in Confidence.
- (c) It is important to note that the NSW Government is not developing land for profit and has publicly committed on a number of occasions that all funds generated will be reinvested back into the Precinct including important civil infrastructure, protection of history, protection of the natural environment and enhancement of public open space.

Q.168 - I am advised: Consultation began with the Coffs community in 2018. The extent and depth of the consultation undertaken and the quantity and depth of responses received represents best practice in government-led engagement and a step change in planning efforts for the Precinct. The consultation process consisted of a wide array of actions to reach as many people as possible in the Coffs Harbour area including (and not limited to):

- an online survey to which over 3,600 responses were received
- nine pop-up information booths in various locations around Coffs Harbour where the team spoke to over 1,800 people
- nine stakeholder briefings and 4 youth engagement sessions, and
- three Indigenous engagement events.

This process has been extensive, and the refined masterplan incorporates the Coffs community's feedback.

Broad community consultation shows there is majority support for change at the Coffs Harbour Jetty Foreshore Precinct, provided that it secures public domain improvement as detailed in the masterplan.

(a) The community will be able to have their say again when the rezoning proposal is publicly exhibited as part of the statutory process.

Q.169 - I am advised: PDNSW continues to work alongside Indigenous-led consultancy Murawin to ensure engagement with Aboriginal stakeholders on the refined masterplan. Whilst this engagement has been best-practice, meaningful, inclusive and respectful, the engagement is necessarily ongoing and will continue as work on the Precinct continues.

Work with a cross-section of the local Aboriginal community saw a range of ideas gathered from a range of different voices and members of the Aboriginal community who mightn't otherwise have been reached if the approach utilised by PDNSW had not been adopted.

The NSW Government is continuing to work with the Aboriginal community on desired outcomes, servicing Ferguson's Cottage and Happy Valley; and inclusivity, recognition and celebration of Gumbaynggirr Country and culture.

The Murawin report forms part of the planning process and our ongoing commitment to caring for Country.

Q.170 - I am advised: PDNSW is forecast to have lodged a rezoning proposal for the Precinct with the Department of Planning, Housing and Infrastructure by Q2 2024.

Technical studies form part of the requirements of the rezoning proposal to be lodged.

Technical studies are publicly exhibited as part of the statutory process. These will be available to the community following the Department of Planning, Housing and Infrastructure's internal assessment of the rezoning proposal.

Q.171 - I am advised: The contract with Ethos Urban Pty Ltd for Town Planner Services is procured under SCM0005 – Prequalification Scheme: Performance and Management Services.

Q.172 - I am advised: The independently chaired Project Steering Advisory Committee informed the vision and masterplan process.

An inclusive and diverse committee comprised members from a cross-section of the community including Aboriginal representation, local small to medium businesses, landowners, leaseholders and community groups. Council also had two representatives on the committee (Cr Paul Amos and Cr George Cecato).

A probity advisor was appointed to oversee the process. Committee members were required to provide declarations of conflicts of interest with the independent chair.

Establishment of the Project Steering Advisory Committee was directed by the Coffs Harbour Jetty Foreshore Precinct Action Membership Framework that detailed selection criteria, terms of reference, selection criteria, member selection process, appointment process and code of conduct.

Q.173 - I am advised: Four key strategic drivers have been identified by State and Local Government:

- 1. Evolving tourism offering (CHCC LSPS, 2020)
- 2. Delivering the regional economy (CHCC LSPS, 2020; CH Economic Development Strategy, 2017)
- 3. More Sustainable movement choices (CHRCAP, 2021; CHCC, 2020)
- 4. Need for more housing due to population growth (CHCC LSPS, 2020)

The masterplan for the Precinct was developed with consideration of these requirements and the rezoning proposal takes further account of the need for the Precinct to fulfill the area's long-term strategic direction and needs.

Q.174 - I am advised: Embedded in the natural and social history of this place, the Jetty Foreshore will be recognised for creating a new regional identity for Coffs Harbour built from the natural character of its site. Informed by community consultation, the key drivers for the refined masterplan include:

- no change to the size, scale and use of the existing Foreshore Park (including the protection of littoral rainforest)
- an increase in the amount and types of public open space across the Precinct, and
- improved connections between new public open space with the existing Foreshore Park.

Evidence of Property & Development NSW's concern for the natural environment is provided by the recently completed Coffs Community Building which includes native planting and protection of the adjacent dune structure.

Aboriginal Land Claims

Q.175 - I am advised: Crown Lands expects to resolve up to 700 claims this financial year. The majority of claims currently under assessment are clams prioritised by Local Aboriginal Land Councils through the Local Aboriginal Land Council priority program.

Q.176 - I am advised: \$61.1 million of the reported \$366.5 million is to support the Roads to Home program. As the remaining amount is the responsibility of other Ministers, please refer to other Ministers within the Department of Planning, Housing and Infrastructure for further information.

Q.177 - I am advised: Crown Lands has returned more land to Local Aboriginal Land Councils in the past five years than in the preceding 36 years since the inception of the Act.

Crown Lands works in partnership with Local Aboriginal Land Councils to prioritise claims that will result in the most immediate outcomes decided by the Local Aboriginal Land Councils.

- (a) See answer to question 175. Crown Lands is also working toward the Statewide Closing the Gap targets for the return of land.
- (b) Yes.
- (c) The intent of the Aboriginal Land Rights Act 1983 is to provide compensation to Aboriginal communities for the dispossession of their land. The Act provides Local Aboriginal Land Councils and the New South Wales Aboriginal Land Council with the statutory right to lodge claims on Crown land. The Department has no control over the number of claims lodged. Assessment of land claims is a complex process with a number of review points and interested parties to be consulted. This results in an ebb and flow in the number of determinations across any given financial year.

Q.178 - I am advised: ALAs are binding agreements made under the NSW Aboriginal Land Rights Act 1983 (ALRA) between the Minister for Lands and Property and a Land Council for the transfer, exchange, or lease of land to the Land Council and the resolution of land claims.

The Department is negotiating 17 ALAs across NSW, each at different stages of negotiation.

Q.179 - I am advised: Please refer to my answer to Question 178.

MULTICULTURALISM

Hindu Council of Australia

Q.180 – I am advised: The NSW Faith Affairs Council is established to improve the NSW Government's understanding and competency in relation to policies, programs and services that affect religious communities and people of faith in New South Wales.

Mr Surinder Jain was nominated for the NSW Faith Affairs Council by the Hindu Council of Australia, as one of 12 organisations representing the 12 largest faith groups in New South Wales.

Membership of the Faith Affairs Council is time-limited to ensure a diversity of representation over time.

A series of complaints have been made to Multicultural NSW about the Hindu Council of Australia. In the opinion of Multicultural NSW, those complaints include highly selective and partial information. I am advised that, having reviewed this information, Multicultural NSW is not satisfied that Mr Surinder Jain or the Hindu Council of Australia as an organisation should not have the opportunity to engage in NSW Government activities, including the newly formed NSW Faith Affairs Council.

This Government introduced new laws to make religious vilification unlawful. Any actual evidence of religious vilification or discrimination should be reported to the appropriate authority, which is Anti-Discrimination NSW.
