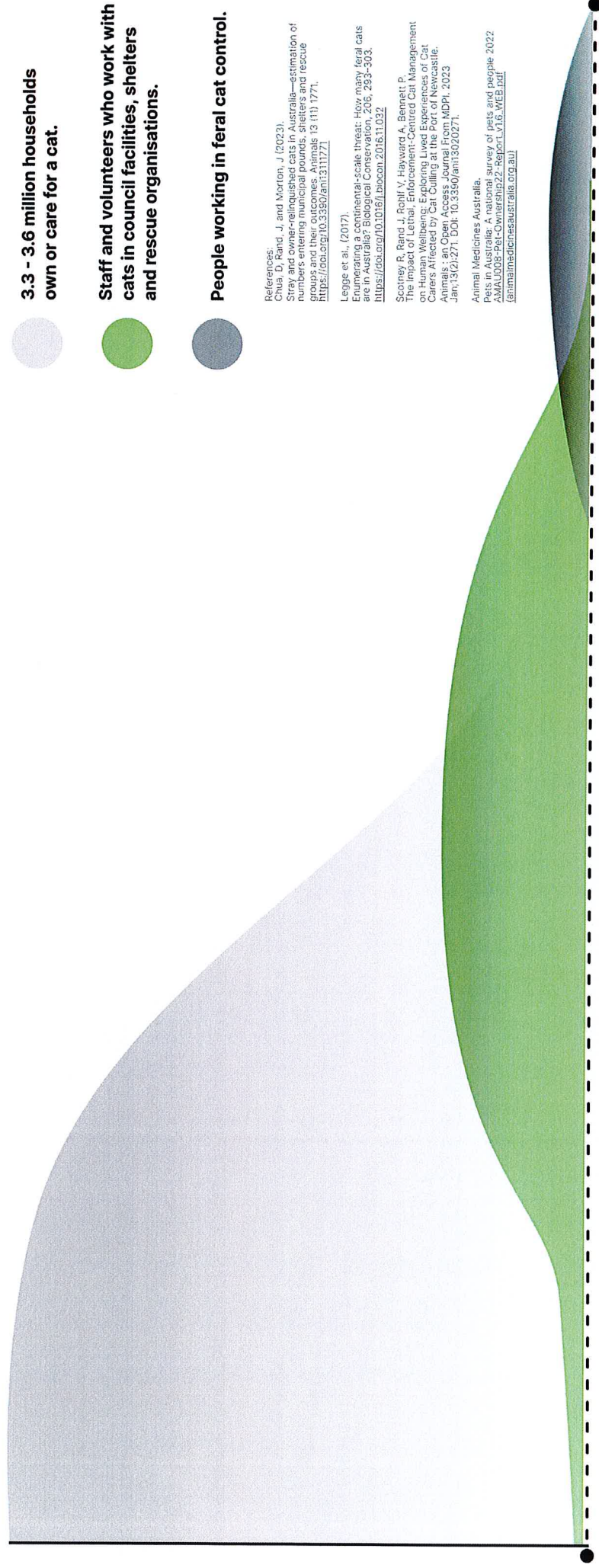


The Intertwined Lives of Cats and People.
