# GUIDE TO ENGAGING WITH THE MODERN SLAVERY COMMITTEE

### The Parliament of New South Wales Modern Slavery Committee would like to hear from people who have experienced modern slavery.

This document is a guide for individuals who are interested in meeting with the committee to share their experiences.

### What is modern slavery?

The term modern slavery covers a range of crimes in New South Wales, including forced marriage, forced labour, servitude, sexual servitude, human trafficking, debt bondage, deceptive recruiting, organ and tissue trafficking and online sexual exploitation of children.

### About Parliament and the committee

The Parliament of New South Wales represents the people, makes laws and examines the government's actions. The Modern Slavery Committee is a parliamentary committee made up of several members of Parliament from government and non-government parties. Its role is to make recommendations to the NSW Government about how to address and prevent modern slavery.

There are options available to participate confidentially if you wish.

If you would like to speak with the committee in person, you can do so confidentially or in public. If you would like to write to the committee, we can keep your submission confidential, publish parts of it, or publish it in full on our website.

Information you share publicly will be published on the committee's webpage and may be included in the committee's report, which will also be available online.

### What happens next?

If you have expressed interest in meeting with the committee, the secretariat will contact you to discuss next steps.

If you have made a submission, the secretariat will read it and call you to discuss any confidentiality matters. The secretariat will then provide your submission to the committee.

### What can the committee achieve?

The committee will learn from the experiences of people with lived experience to make recommendations to the NSW Government about how modern slavery laws and policies can be improved to stop and prevent modern slavery in the future.

We are not able to investigate or solve individual cases.

### Will support be available?

We know that talking about modern slavery may be difficult for some people. We have ways to support to people who want to speak with us. We can discuss this with you at any time.
