Age Verification to Prevent Access to Pornography: A Survey of Young People

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Background and aims

• The Australian government has announced a trial of an online age verification program to restrict young people's access to internet-based pornography

Methods

- In 2023, 794 participants aged 15-29 living in Victoria, Australia completed an online survey
- Participants were asked about pornography and hypothetical age verification processes (both closed and open-ended questions)
- Internationally, these policies have received mixed support
- We aimed to understand young people's attitudes towards and preferences for age verification

Findings: attitudes towards age verification




strongly agreed or

was the **median age** that participants thought individuals should be allowed to access pornography

Findings: acceptability of age-verification methods



"I don't want my identity tied to my sexual preferences"

Bisexual/queer female, 25 years

"People will always find a way to get around access restrictions"

Pansexual male, 25 years

Discussion

- Young people broadly supported age verification. But, they were unconvinced by the proposed methods
- Concerns related to privacy, inefficacy, and impacts on sexual development
- Young people advocated for alternate approaches which focus on improving sexual education

Conclusion

- Significant consultation and education will be required before implementing age verification policies in Australia
- Young people have valuable insights and should be involved in this process



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




Results: Program Evaluation

Knowledge about sex and relationships demonstrated a statistically significant increase from pre- to post-program:

'They were definitely tuned in... and we had lots of relevant conversation that followed" - Teacher

Content was seen as highly relevant to the sexual health needs of students, and **inclusive** of diverse gender





Website Evaluation


Preliminary user evaluation shows that few young people have used the website outside of workshops, but those who have done so rate it highly. Majority reported the website was: The website is informative and appealing to young people, but there was limited engagement with the digital resource: only **346 visits** during the evaluation period.

Conclusion

• The Gist education sessions were **acceptable** and **feasible** for education services.


