




Inquiry into the impacts of harmful pornography on mental, emotional and physical health

Objectives and methodology



Context and objectives

This report analyses anonymous, public responses made via an online questionnaire to an inquiry by the NSW Legislative Council Standing Committee on Social Issues.

This inquiry was established on 6 August 2024 to inquire into and report on the impacts of harmful pornography on mental, emotional, and physical health.

Contributions to the inquiry could be made by lodging a submission or completing an online questionnaire by 31 January 2025.

The online questionnaire comprised of 21 primarily open-ended questions devised by Committee members.

With 1,598 responses received, at the request of the Committee, the NSW Parliamentary Research Services sought the services of The Insight Centre as an independent research provider to conduct structured, thematic analysis of responses and provide a report on findings to the Committee.

Report objectives

Across all questions:

- Identify and quantify prominence of common themes across each of the open-ended questions
- Identify the full range of respondent perspectives in the dataset, including 'outlier' responses that reflect unique or uncommon perspectives

For each individual question:

- · Identify any question-specific themes
- Quantify the prominence (e.g. proportion of agreement/disagreement) of each theme among respondents
- Provide quotes from responses that reflect each theme

Methodology

Overview

Our approach was to identify patterns in the qualitative text responses to the online questionnaire. The final cleaned sample was 1,598 respondents and 30,626 valid (i.e. non-empty) individual question responses.

We conducted manual coding and analysis by experienced social researchers alongside the use of Large Language Models (LLMs) to:

- rigorously and efficiently process and code the large volume of textual data;
- validate the accuracy of coding across the dataset; and
- quantitatively measure the overall proportions of respondents who express specific views and sentiments.

In reporting for each question, we have also identified the proportion of valid responses which where either short (up to 10 words), medium (11-50 words) or long (51+ words).

The research process

- Researchers assessed a random selection of data across all questions to manually create qualitative coding frameworks and code responses by theme.
- Researchers prompted LLMs to use this
 framework to apply the relevant codes to a
 subset of data. We developed clear task
 definitions, gave specific coding instructions,
 and provided examples of desired output (i.e.
 the manually coded data), including constraints,
 exclusions and instructions for dealing with
 ambiguity.
- The initial LLM 'pilot' coding of the data subset was checked and validated for accuracy by our researchers, and prompts were refined before the full dataset was coded by the LLM.
- Random samples of LLM-coded data were manually reviewed and assessed for accuracy by our researchers, and additional coding and refinements applied.
- Key quotes for the report were manually selected by researchers based on representativeness of key themes and to provide diversity of perspectives where applicable.

Notes on our use of LLMs

- Data analysed by LLMs is not used or retained for model training, maintaining the privacy and confidentiality of data.
- Coding frameworks and a statistically significant sample of coded data are independently reviewed by researchers, ensuring validity and robustness of analysis.
- We do not use LLMs or other automated programs to write reports – reports are written and reviewed by researchers.
- We keep a detailed log of the prompts used, the LLM's responses, and any modifications made during the analysis process to ensure transparency and reproducibility.
- The specific LLMs used in this report were Gemini 2.5 Pro for the development of coding frameworks and Gemini 2.5 Flash for coding of individual responses.

Notes on interpreting this report

Understanding the findings

- The primary value of this research is the depth and detail it provides on the views of those members of the public who were motivated to submit to the inquiry via completion of the online questionnaire.
- The report identifies and quantifies the central themes and concerns that are most important to respondents based on qualitative analysis of themes present in their responses to questions.
- The 'common themes' identified in the report are based on analysis of all question responses in the dataset. However, binary questions include a higher proportion of very short (e.g. 'yes' or 'no') responses which are not attached to thematic codes. The percentage of responses featuring themes are therefore lower for binary questions.
- The selection of quotes in this report is purposive and is designed to illustrate the range and diversity of opinions and experiences within the respondent pool including professional and lived experiences with the issue, and a range of gender and age perspectives. As the survey did not include demographic questions to classify respondents, this was achieved using contextual analysis of response text (e.g. "they started to see us girls as...", "after my son got addicted...", "I was choked...", "now at [age] 60+...", "in my work...").
- · Quotes have been lightly edited for typographic errors and for length where required.

Notes on interpreting this report (cont.)

Limitations of this report

- The sample of respondents is not representative, and findings cannot be generalised to the broader population in NSW, or even to all NSW residents affected by the issue of harmful pornography.
- The respondents are a self-selected group who were motivated enough to find and complete the questionnaire. Their views are likely to be stronger or more informed than those of the general public. The high level of consistency in responses and few outlier points of view further indicate that this sample does not provide a natural spread of community views.
- No demographic data (e.g. gender, age, education) except for postcode were collected, which limits capacity to understand the nature of the respondent sample and how demographic variables may impact views.
- The questionnaire design is likely to have impacted the density of themes across the dataset the thematic overlap or repetition of specific issues across some questions will have influenced the prominence of specific themes.
- The inquiry's ToR and the questionnaire responses relate to 'harmful pornography' specifically. However, 'harmful' as opposed to 'non-harmful' pornography is not defined for respondents. This means respondents will have applied their own subjective definitions to their responses, and responses cannot be interpreted as relating to pornography in a general sense nor to any specific types of pornography.

Overview of thematic analysis

Questionnaire overview

The data analysed in this report comprises responses to 21 open-ended questions. For the purpose of reporting and analysis, we have grouped these questions into three categories:

General response questions

7 questions exploring broad, open-ended perceptions of impacts, attitudes, and relationships concerning pornography

Binary response questions

9 closed-ended questions designed to gauge agreement, concern, or support for specific propositions, often answerable with "yes" or "no".

Specific response questions

5 action-oriented questions seeking concrete recommendations for policy, educational measures, support services, and future research.

A total of 2,009 questionnaire responses were received, with **1,598 retained for analysis** based on excluding those who did not respond 'Yes' to the screening question 'Are you a resident of New South Wales?'



Thematic analysis: Common themes

An analysis of responses to all questions was conducted to identify a set of 10 common themes which were present across the dataset. The chart below ranks these themes by how frequently they appear across all valid responses all questions in the dataset.

Impact on real life relationships & intimacy

Detrimental effects on the ability to form and maintain healthy, intimate real life relationships, including with family and partners.

Often stems from 'Distorted perceptions of sex & relationships' and 'Addiction & compulsive behaviour'.



I saw it destroy marriages and relationships. I talked to men who couldn't get it up with their partners anymore. Porn is a rot on society.

Young blokes see women more as objects to use for their own gratification. Young women fear vulnerability and abuse and see men as a threat to be managed. The combination is undermining the formation of marriages and healthy long-term relationships

Response #181

I know personally a young woman who had a partner addicted to pornography and it ruined their relationship. It causes men particularly to become discontent with real-world relationships.

Pornography traps their mind in a world of fantasy.

Response #28

A viewer often opts for that stimulation rather than seeking real relationships.

Distorted perceptions of sex & relationships

Exposure leads to unrealistic, warped, or confused understanding of healthy sexuality, intimacy, and interpersonal relationships.

Related to 'Impact on real life relationships & intimacy'.



Early exposure to pornography can lead to distorted views of sex and relationships, desensitization to violence, and potential issues with intimacy and sexual dysfunction later in life.

Response #5

Extreme, as being a former user of it, it completely warps your mind in a terrible and harmful way. It creates ways of deception of viewing others of both genders, it creates a serious and strong addiction that is incredibly binding to the soul.

I think it gives people unrealistic expectations of sex and removes the context of an actual relationship. It strongly prioritises selfgratification rather than the pleasure of the other person. Response #32



Erosion of consent & respect

Diminished understanding and value of consent, respect, and boundaries in sexual interactions and relationships.

A specific outcome of 'Normalisation of harmful behaviours & attitudes' and 'Objectification & dehumanisation'.



Viewing pornography can distort the attitudes of the people viewing it, communicating the message that violence is ok, that humiliating your partner is ok, that a woman's no can be ignored, and that it is normal for women to not participate in or enjoy sex.

When I first became sexually active, I was choked during it and spanked/whipped with a charging cord as that was what they had seen on porn and thought it was normal to want to hurt you during sex.

Response #1090

It creates the idea that sex is a right. Why wouldn't they think differently if viewing porn has been unrestricted and right in front of them for most of their life? So, sex from a woman you're close with is fair if she does not want sex, cry blue balls. Or do it anyways she probably won't say anything, that's what she's been taught to do by today's porn-ridden culture.

Many portrayals in pornography may neglect or misrepresent the importance of mutual consent, leading to skewed views about boundaries and respect in relationships.

Normalisation of harmful behaviours & attitudes

Acceptance or normalisation of harmful sexual acts, violence, disrespect, and non-consensual behaviour as a result of exposure.

Closely related to 'Erosion of consent & respect'.



Extreme attitudes accepted as "normal" values. Young people newly confronting sexual situations cannot work out what is acceptable behaviour. Long-term and widespread this is likely to promote extreme, maybe violent behaviours as the confronting norm.

Response #107

Early exposure to pornography "normalises" sexual abuse across all public spectrums and particularly leads young males to view women as sex objects that do not deserve respect or dignity. (It de-humanises them.)

Response #182

Normalising sexual expectations in unhealthy ways to impressionable minds [...] This is particularly so in objectification of women, violence to women, sex on demand expectations, and what a woman must do to be 'attractive' and desirable.

Response #29

Gives young people and children certain expectations of sex and perhaps may teach harmful behaviours. For example, choking, which studies show can be dangerous, may be normalised in pornography.

Impact on child and youth development & innocence

Detrimental effects on children and young people's natural development, including premature sexualisation, loss of innocence, and distorted understanding of ageappropriate behaviour.



It damages a child's sense of wellbeing - the child will feel shame at seeing something they instinctively know is not appropriate but can often create a desire to want to see more.

Early exposure to pornography is associated with increased confusion and anxiety as young people feel pressured to behave in ways commonly displayed in pornography.

Response #28

My son began to pull away from normal relationships with his mother and sisters. He was unhappy. He didn't know that it wasn't normal to use people. He felt confused and afraid. He felt upset at the violence and clear violation of persons. He wasn't sure what was normal.

Increased risk of violence & aggression

Association between pornography exposure and an increased likelihood of engaging in or accepting sexual violence, aggression, and coercion.

Can be a consequence of 'Objectification & dehumanisation' and 'Normalisation of harmful behaviours & attitudes'.



Meanwhile your fantasies turn into actions and you abuse, hurt and even kill other people, young or old, male or female, there is no longer any respect for others, only a vessel to be used by the perpetrator. Porn leads to sexual predators and violent abusers.

From my reading of the research, early exposure to pornography contributes to condoning violence against women. There is a cumulative effect of attitudes, knowledge, practices plus the scripts and narratives of contemporary pornography in which aggression, objectification, roughness, non-reciprocity and assumed consent to all practices and partners is the default expression of hetero sex.

Violence against women is normalised by watching pornography. Young people then think its normal for violence in sexual relationships.

Objectification & dehumanisation

Individuals, particularly women and girls, are viewed as objects for sexual gratification, diminishing their humanity and worth.

Often linked to 'Erosion of consent & respect' and 'Increased risk of violence & aggression'.



During this time, they started to see us girls as objects and would treat us horribly. Calling us derogatory terms such as three-holes. I believe the impacts of early exposure to pornography is the dehumanisation of women and girls and the violence perpetuated from that at the hands of men.

It effects young ladies as they are looked at and treated like a piece of meat as males copy what they see in porn.

Response #410

Encourages both boys and girls to see girls only as objects of pleasure and not as whole people.

Response #3

Constantly looking at women as a commodity, it cons the brain into thinking 'no respect for anyone'.

Mental & emotional harm

Negative effects on psychological and emotional well being, including anxiety, depression, shame, guilt, confusion, and trauma.



I was exposed to pornography at 10 years of age. Those first images I saw are still burned into my brain. I cannot forget them, though I want to. I was just hitting puberty - I had no chance, I was addicted within months. It eventually led to and continually fed depression to the point of suicidality.

Correlates with pre-pubescent sexualised behaviours toward self and others; correlates with trauma-informed behaviours as the underdeveloped pre-frontal cortex cannot regulate let alone identify or decipher physical or emotional reactions which can cause confusion, isolation, shame, mistrust. When triggered, children's fight, flight or freeze response is enacted causing disruption, emotional pain and antisocial behaviours.

In my practice I see the generational trauma of porn addiction everyday, it is especially damaging when a parent exposed their children to porn. Devastating is an understatement.

Negative impact on selfesteem & body image

Adverse effects on self-esteem and body image due to unrealistic portrayals and comparisons.



It caused me to hate my own body because I did not live up to what I saw in the videos. This made a hatred of self develop that I still struggle with today.

How do I look - not like a porn star. How large are my breasts, my penis, my muscles, my backside. Leading people to think they don't really cut it - or that they are not sexually attractive or appropriate. Poor self-esteem.

Response #29

Issues around body image: these are especially harmful to girls and young women, leading to low self-esteem and an increase in harmful behaviours such as eating disorders, self-harm and desire for unnecessary plastic surgery e.g. labioplasty. Response #278



Addiction & compulsive behaviour

Pornography use leading to addictive patterns, compulsive consumption, and difficulty controlling urges.



ABSOLUTELY DISASTROUS!!! Life sentence to be chained to a horrible horrible addiction, with no human dignity whatsoever.

Response #165

Breaking an addiction to pornography is difficult and demanding, since pornography has been demonstrated to alter brain function. As with drug addiction, increasing amounts (and increasing levels of violence and perversion) are required to achieve satisfaction.

Response #1722

Pre-occupation with sex and sexual activity, to the exclusion of other healthy activities and relationships...Inability to engage properly in other pursuits due to the distracting desire for sexual simulation and gratification.



It creates a serious and strong addiction that is incredibly binding to the soul...it became all I could think about.





Theme	Summary description	Example responses
Distorted perceptions of sex & relationships	Exposure leads to unrealistic, warped, or confused understanding of healthy sexuality, intimacy, and interpersonal relationships.	"I believe it is extremely harmful as it solidifies the wrong perception of what a relationship is. It focuses a relationship purely on what "I" can get out of it or what "I" am missing." Response #124
Impact on real life relationships & intimacy	Detrimental effects on the ability to form and maintain healthy, intimate real life relationships, including with family and partners.	"Also pornographic sex is so easy to obtain, that a viewer often opts for that stimulation rather than seeking real relationships, and in my work I have seen them opting out of real life in order to indulge." Response#8
Impact on child/youth development & innocence	Detrimental effects on children's natural development, including premature sexualisation, loss of innocence, and distorted understanding of age-appropriate behavior.	"Children are being sexualised at an age where they should be enjoying the carefree innocence of childhood. The precious years of childhood are being stolen by pornography through the impacts on a child's immature brain and emotions." Response #686


Theme	Summary description	Example responses
Increased vulnerability to exploitation & grooming	Early pornography exposure can erode a child's personal boundaries and desensitise them to harmful or coercive interactions. This normalisation of inappropriate content can make them more susceptible to grooming tactics by predators, online exploitation (e.g. sexting, sharing of intimate images), and less able to recognise or resist abusive situations.	"Early sexualisation of minors by exposing them to sexual imagery has long been a strategy used by paedophiles to groom children. This strategy opens the child to accepting inappropriate sexual acts." Response#934
Lasting trauma & indelible imprint	Early pornography exposure can erode a child's personal boundaries and desensitise them to harmful or coercive interactions. This normalisation of inappropriate content can make them more susceptible to grooming tactics by predators, online exploitation (e.g. sexting, sharing of intimate images), and less able to recognise or resist abusive situations.	"It continues to haunt me even now @ 60+." Response #41
Neurological & cognitive impairment	Exposure, especially early and chronic, leads to detrimental changes in brain development, cognitive function, and neurological pathways. This can manifest as impaired impulse control, difficulty focusing, and brain changes comparable to those seen in substance addiction.	"Meta studies have indicated that pornography use results in cognitive development impairment and cognitive degeneration. MRI studies have demonstrated that chronic users of pornography have the same biological brain tissue atrophy evident as the MRIs of long-term heroin users." Response #529



Theme	Summary description	Example responses
Detriment to education & broader life engagement	Preoccupation with pornography, stemming from early exposure and potential addiction, can significantly detract from a young person's ability to focus on education, work, hobbies, and other healthy developmental activities. This can lead to decreased academic performance, reduced productivity, and a general disengagement from broader life pursuits.	"It will contaminate the mind and imagination of the young people and so they won't able to study well." Response #62 "Focusing on school or work or normal relationships in the good sense suffers badly." Response ID #173


Theme	Summary description	Example responses
Distorted perceptions of sex & relationships	Exposure leads to unrealistic, warped, or confused understanding of healthy sexuality, intimacy, and interpersonal relationships.	"It stuffed my marriage and made me feel like I had to perform like a hooker to be exciting enough for my husband. I hated me and him for it because I wanted to be loved and wanted by him." Response#883
Erosion of consent & respect	Diminished understanding and value of consent, respect, and boundaries in sexual interactions and relationships.	"The impacts on relationships, it takes away the respect and love for that person, consent can be potentially thrown out the window, certain acts maybe performed which could damage the partner permanently physically, emotional and mental abuse (rough handling) could also be implemented without the acknowledgement on the impact of the other person, this goes both ways, whether male or female." Response #12
Normalisation of harmful behaviours & attitudes	Acceptance or normalisation of harmful sexual acts, violence, disrespect, and non-consensual behavior as a result of exposure.	"Pornographic material sets up a lot of situations that play on fantasy, normalising sexualised abuse and criminal acts such as rape." Response#6


Question specific themes

Theme	Summary description	Example responses
Transactional or consumerist view of partners & relationships	Pornography fosters a mindset where partners or relationships are viewed as disposable commodities for fulfilling personal (often sexual) needs, rather than as individuals deserving of mutual effort, commitment, and emotional investment. This leads to a 'what can I get?' attitude and quick abandonment if perceived needs aren't met.	"People have a consumer attitude toward their partner. They tend to be in relationships for what they can get out of it rather than what they can give the other person. When relationships do not satisfy their perceived needs, they break the relationship and start looking for the next person to meet their needs." Response #144
Erosion of trust and inducement of betrayal	Pornography use, often involving secrecy, deception, or perceived infidelity, fundamentally damages or destroys the trust essential for healthy relationships, leading to feelings of betrayal for the partner.	"Even if not seen as cheating, porn can still cause a deep sense of betrayal and mistrust. The secrecy, shame, isolation, and mistrust that can be introduced into a relationship by porn consumption can then snowball into all kinds of problems." Response #1929
Communication breakdown and avoidance	Pornography consumption contributes to a deterioration of open and honest communication within relationships, as individuals may avoid discussing sexual needs, preferences, or porn use itself, creating barriers to intimacy and understanding.	"Pornography can lead to trust issues, and poor communication between partners. It can place significant strain on relationships over time as things are left unsaid and neither party understands how to fix it." Response#446


Theme	Summary description	Example responses
Distorted perceptions of sex & relationships	Exposure leads to unrealistic, warped, or confused understanding of healthy sexuality, intimacy, and interpersonal relationships.	"Fundamentally, I believe that porn teaches people that sexual relationships are primarily about selfish personal gratification, whereas a healthy sexual relationship includes a focus on gratifying your sexual partner." Response #34
Impact on real life relationships & intimacy	Detrimental effects on the ability to form and maintain healthy, intimate real life relationships, including with family and partners.	"It removes the capacity for empathy and others-focus which is in terms corrosive to long-term meaningful intimate relationships." Response #21
Normalisation of harmful behaviours & attitudes	Acceptance or normalisation of harmful sexual acts, violence, disrespect, and non-consensual behavior as a result of exposure.	"Sex seems to have become more violent. I hear young males talking about women liking it rough. I have heard young girls saying they don't want to have anal sex or be deep throated but it's expected of them." Response #1278



Theme	Summary description	Example responses
Devaluation and trivialisation of sex	Pornography cultivates an attitude where sex is cheapened, commodified, or seen as transactional, losing its perceived significance, specialness, intimacy, or sacredness, and is sometimes viewed as a casual or meaningless act.	"Cheapens sex into a commodity rather than an expression of a relationship between a man and wife committed to lifelong intimacy. Objectifies two people and distorts massively the nature of sex. Gives men the view that a woman is always ready for sex." Response #15
Sex as self- gratification	Pornography fosters an attitude where sexual activity is viewed primarily or solely as a means for the viewer's own pleasure and satisfaction, often disregarding mutuality, a partner's feelings, or relational connection.	"Pornography teaches a selfish and self-centred view of sex. It teaches that people are objects to satisfy my sexual needs." Response #102
Sex as performance and escalation	An attitude where sex is viewed as a performance requiring constant novelty, variety, and escalating intensity or extremity to achieve arousal or satisfaction, often driven by the content consumed.	"It increases pleasure threshold so that it's hard to experience arousal without increasingly extreme imagery." Response#170

Mental & emotional harm	Negative effects on psychological and emotional well being, including anxiety, depression, shame, guilt, confusion, and trauma.	"The cycle of guilt, shame, depression, use of porn leads to emptiness and self-loathing." Response #112












Q3. Does harmful pornography impact some groups in the community more than others?






Q10. Do you think there a link between harmful pornography and violence against women?






Q11. Does pornography teach consumers that "no" does not always mean no?






Q12. Do you think there is a link between harmful pornography and human trafficking?






Q13. Are you concerned that pornography can be used to groom children?












Q17. Do you support age limits for access to pornography?






Q18. Are you concerned about the presence of pornography on social media sites?







% of respondent answers that feature each theme












